

Iron Ore Output Down During July

OTTAWA (CP)—Iron ore shipments by Canadian mines in July declined 2.6 per cent to 2,520,215 tons from 2,587,577 in the same month last year, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics said Tuesday.

Shipments in the January-July period increased 2.4 per cent to 14,922,003 tons from 14,288,500 a year previous.

Ore shipped for export in the month dropped to 3,072,548 tons from 3,791,286 in July, 1962, while shipments to Canadian consumers rose to 232,438 tons from 232,291.

In the seven-month period shipments for export fell to 12,643,522 tons from 12,923,614, while the movement to Canadian consumers increased to 1,999,971 tons from 1,374,893.

National Gallery Planning 12 Exhibitions For Season

OTTAWA (CP)—The National Gallery of Canada is organizing 12 exhibitions this season that will range all the way from art treasures of ancient Egypt to the new "pop art" movement in the United States.

The gallery will honor two veteran Canadian artists, John Lyman, 57, and Marc - Aurele Fortin, 75, both of Montreal, with one-man shows.

The Lyman retrospective exhibition will run Oct. 4-22 and will be shown later at the Hamilton Art Gallery. The exhibition will begin a three - week

tour of the country, visiting the University of Toronto, the University of Western Ontario, and the University of Alberta.

The Fortin retrospective exhibition will run Oct. 17 to Nov. 17. It will be shown at the University of Toronto, the University of Western Ontario, and the University of Alberta.

The season's top attraction likely will be an exhibition of archaeological and historical objects from the Egyptian golden age. It has been breaking attendance records at all U.S. galleries where it has appeared.

The art treasures were discovered in 1922 in the tomb of King Tutankhamun and are on loan from the Egyptian museum in Cairo. This show is scheduled Feb. 14-March 15.

"Pop art," a recent U.S. fad that features ultra - realistic paintings without any message, will be included in an exhibition of 15 contemporary U.S. painters and sculptors, Nov. 8- Dec. 1.

QUEBEC (CP) - Graydon Knights of Pembroke, Ont., a post graduate student in structural engineering at Queen's University in Kingston, Ont., has been awarded the \$100 top prize in an annual competition sponsored by the Canadian Construction Association.

JFK Signs Bill To Aid Building Medical Schools

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Kennedy signed "with great satisfaction" today the \$28,000,000 bill to help build new medical and dental schools and to help students attend such institutions.

The president asked for the bill in his heart's message to help avert what he said could be "particularly serious shortages" of doctors and dentists in the next decade.

He estimated that even to continue present ratios of service would require a 50-per-cent increase in the number of medical school graduates and a 100-per-cent increase in dental graduates in the next 10 years.

The bill would help an estimated 10,000 students with loans of up to \$2,000 over the next three years and also make it possible to build several new medical and dental schools, and to expand and modernize some existing ones.

Foreign Vehicles Entering Canada Show Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—More foreign vehicles, mainly American, entered Canada in August and the first eight months of 1963 than in the corresponding periods last year.

The Dominion Bureau of Statistics said Tuesday that travellers' vehicle permits issued to admit foreign vehicles rose 5.9 per cent in August to 1,646,972 from 1,557,167 a year earlier. In the January-August period they increased six per cent to 5,958,639 from 5,279,613.
