Four Islanders Are Decorated

Four members of the Canadian Army resident in P.E.I. were included in the lengthy list released yesterday by Eastern Command Headquarters, Halifax, as recipients of the Canadian Forces Decoration.

Those receiving the medal for 12 years exemplary service were: Major M.E. Campbell, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island Regiment; Capt. R.L. Molison, Summerside, Royal Highlanders of Canada (Black Watch); Staff-Sgt. J.L. Marsh, Charlottetown; P.E.I. Regiment; and Pte. H.E.R. Hawkins, Royal Canadian Army Service Corp.

CANDIDATES MUST AGAIN FILE PAPERS

SOURIS — Nominations for candidates to fill a vacancy on the town council will be received at the town clerk's office until four o'clock this afternoon.

The vacancy was caused by the resignation of John J. MacDonald. Although the bye-election had originally been scheduled for last Monday, storm conditions caused the cancellation, and under the Town Act, such a situation necessitates the holding of a re-nomination.

The original nomination produced two candidates, Michael LaVie and George MacEachern, both of whom are expected to renominate today.

Formation Of New Law Firm In Charlottetown Announced

Announcement of formation of a new law firm was made this morning with the taking into partnership of Bert G. Campbell with Peake and Nicholson with whom he has been associated for several years.

The new partnership will be known as Peake, Nicholson and Campbell and will be located in the same quarters as the former firm at 175 Grafton Street.

The new member of the firm was born at Winsloe, P.E.I., Dec. 29, 1922, son of the late Otto W. Campbell and Mrs. Campbell. He received his preparatory education at Dalhousie University and his legal education at the same institution. He is a member of the Law Society of P.E.I. and has been clerk of the city police court since 1960. Mr. Campbell was admitted to the

Bar of Prince Edward Island, Aug. 19, 1953. He was articled with John P. Nicholson on Aug. 19, 1958.

Arthur H. Peake, was born in this city March 18, 1915, and was admitted to the bar here in 1947. He received his preparatory education at the University of King's College, where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1939, and his legal education at Dalhousie University where he was granted his degree as Bachelor of Laws in 1941.

Mr. Peake is a member of the Canadian Bar Association and the Law Society of P.E.I., of which he is a past president, having served in office in 1959-1961. He has been District President Advocate of the Department of Veterans Affairs since 1952. He is a son of the late

Mr. Peake and Mrs. Peake. His partner since 1951, John P. Nicholson, was born in this city Nov. 16, 1922, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert H. Nicholson and was admitted to the bar of the province in 1948. He received his preparatory and legal education at Dalhousie University where he obtained his Bachelor of Law degree in 1947.

He is a member of the Law Society of P.E.I. which he has served in the past as secretary-treasurer 1952-1957, and as president in 1960. Mr. Nicholson served as Crown prosecutor, Queens County, from 1949 to 1959, and is currently serving his second term in the City Council of Charlottetown.

The new partnership will continue the general practice of the past of trials and appeals, corporations, probate, real estate and insurance law.
