MY FRIEND IRMA GOES WEST IS HILARIOUS COMEDY SMASH

—There may have been funnier comedies, but at the most this reviewer can't remember laughing louder or longer than he did yesterday at the Capitol Theatre where Paramount's "My Friend Irma Goes West" blew in and brought the house down with its delightful hilarity.

Packed with zany situations, this riot continues Irma Peterson's nutty adventures. Marie Wilson, the perfect "Irma," repeats her radio and screen role and John Lund and Diana Lynn are back as her shiftless boy friend Al and her sarcastic but patient girlfriend Jane. The wonderful wild antics, Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis are very much in evidence, and funnier than ever, as Steve and Seymour. Also headlining the all-star cast is the luscious French eye-ful, Corinne Calvet.

It's one belly-laugh after another as Irma and her friends set out for Hollywood to launch Steve on his acting-singing debut in movieland. It turns out that Steve signed his contract with an escaped lunatic, not a movie producer so the train trip west serves as the colorful backdrop for many mad shenanigans. Steve is pursued by the French beauty as he chases after Jane, swearing in his love. Irma is close behind Al, trying to keep him honest. Although "My Friend Irma Goes West" is only the second picture for Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis, it's this reviewer's opinion that when these two uninhibited screwball comics take their place with the all-time comedy "greats" of entertainment history.
