THE ice in the River Moira, London, Ont., moved down stream on the 16th inst., doing great damage to property. The water rose to a great height, flowing in cellars. Many persons were imprisoned in their houses. The loss will not be less than \$50,000.

The steamer Princess of Wales, Captain Cameron, will probably attempt to make a passage to Pictou to-morrow. A large quantity of ice is still in the bay, but it is liable to shift at any moment, and make a clear way for the boat.

The warmer weather is bringing out—with other vices—the corner loafers. Last evening the streets were infested by them, and ladies and gentlemen returning from church subjected to frequent insults. Of course, it is no use calling the attention of the Police to this nuisance.

Is it not time the Park Cricket Club were fixing up their grounds on Victoria Park? The cricket season will be upon us before many days, and what a howl will be raised if the ground don't hold stumps. It would be well for the energetic Secretary to see to the matter immediately.

We regret to learn that Mr. James A. Fraser, of Summerside, one of the sufferers of the Capes disaster, was obliged to have another operation performed on his frozen foot. On Saturday Dr. Garruthers amputated part of the first joint of the second toe of the right foot. This will end Mr. Fraser's troubles so far as amputations are concerned, and we hope to see him all right in a short time.

ON Saturday the window and window-sash of a vacant house on Spring Park Road, next to Mr. John Currie's, owned by J. W. Mitchell, Esq., was smashed in, and last evening the large window and sash in the shop of Mr. James McLeod was broken in the same way. A clue to the guilty parties has been obtained. Of course it is no use to call the attention of the Police to this matter.

ON Friday last we called the attention of the police to a pile of bricks on Pownall Street, extending right across the sidewalk, and asked that a few planks might be put down for the convenience of citizens. This was a reasonable request, seeing that the obstruction is in contravention of the law. But it has not been attended to. It is no use now-a-days to call the attention of the police to anything. Neither the Mayor nor Stipendiary Magistrate, nor any other live man has, apparently, any control over them—though we have no doubt that if the obstruction were at the end of St. Peter's Road or on Water Street, in the path of His Worship, it would have been removed long since.

REGARDING the pictures of Mr. R. Harris at the Montreal Exhibition, the Gazette says:—"To a person entering the room two products of Mr. Harris's brush stand prominently forth. Of one of these the excellent portrait of Mr. Andrew Allan (74) some notices have already appeared in our columns. The other (40) is a portion of the harvest of suggestion gleaned by the artist during a visit last summer to the Gaspé region. A Jersey fisherman in his boat talking to his sweetheart 'on the shore of Gaspé Bay' is the idyllic subject and the scene and the sentiment are in admirable keeping. The expression on faces of the lovers—earnest and impassioned, yet with a shade of rustic reserve in the man's, and revealing unbounded love and trust yet with sweet modesty in the woman's—adds greatly to the charm of the picture. 'Sympathy,' a young man comforting an older friend who seems bowed down with grief is also Mr. Harris's. And the Herald says:—"There are in the exhibition some very fine portraits, works which show that portrait painting has made great progress in Canada during the last few years. The portraits of Mr. W. Ogilvie and Mr. Andrew Allan, by Robert Harris, would do credit to any picture gallery, and the same may be said of the portraits of Mrs. Abbot Brown, the Rev. Abbot Brown and the Rev. Henry Wilke, by Miss Maria Brooks. A portrait by Mr. John C. Phinney is remarkably good. It is a spirited production. The face is full of expression and the painting is done with a bold hand."

One Hundred Prisoners Drowned.

A despatch of the 17th inst., from the City of Mexico says: "When the troops of the Colombian Government finally entered Colon, after it had been burned by rebels under the leadership of Preston, they captured several squads of rebels. During the past ten days the number of these prisoners have been considerably augmented by receipt of straggling rebels captured in the surrounding districts. It is not known now just how many rebels were held prisoners at Colon but good authorities place the number at about 400. Authentic information reached this city that the officers of the Colombian government selected 100 of the worst rebels imprisoned at Colon, and placing them on board a steamer, carried them out into the bay, where the entire 100 were thrown overboard and drowned."
