WE'RE ALL TO BLAME FOR THIS DELINQUENCY

It is a very difficult matter to ascribe causes and to lay blame for juvenile delinquency because its existence is always related somewhat to the still mysterious depths of human nature. We know that a "delinquent" may come from a model home just as a saint may come from the most depraved family and the most sordid environment.

Nevertheless, it is possible and profitable to examine and review elements of society which are factors contributing, consciously or unconsciously, to its growth and maintenance.

Neither the small town nor the country is free from delinquency but the incidence of it is consistently higher in the crowded conditions of urban and industrialized society.

This means responsibility on several sets of shoulders: real estate developers must not be greedy; civic officials must be conscious of the obligation to foresee and prevent social ill by insisting on good municipal planning, and especially that big residential areas be corrected and that good low-cost housing be available, as well as adequate supervised recreational facilities; schools, churches, social groups, etc., should be alert to the role of prevention that they can perform, especially by sensitivity to the needs of youth.

RESTRICT LIBERTY
Those who fear excessively that there is danger to free people in any suggestion for controlling manifestly degrading literature so that its sale and circulation among the impressionable young might be reduced seem to be overly-tender guardians of liberty.

We submit to many restrictions of liberty in order to have an orderly free society; certainly an honorable free people can legitimately define what it will NOT permit as well as what it must permit in order to remain free.

Such tender people might profitably acquaint themselves realistically with first-hand knowledge of the human wreckage promoted or permitted by their ardent defense against a most re-

Henry Gallant who is employed at Summerside spent a day at two at his home here making his hay.


