GOVERNMENT VS. CANADIAN PACIFIC.

Victory for the Government

The Onderdonk Matter Settled.

OTTAWA, Oct. 19. The claim by the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, in the matter of the Onderdonk contract, was originally \$10,000,000. This was afterwards reduced to \$6,000,000, and during the progress of the arbitration to \$3,500,000. The arbitrators have now made an award of \$570,000, which, by order of the referee, must be expended in improving the defective sections of the line. Each party pays its own costs. The award is regarded as a splendid victory for the Government.

The Storm in Britain.

UNPRECEDENTED IN SEVERITY

QUEENSTOWN, Oct. 19. Since three o'clock on Saturday afternoon heavy rain, with wind, has prevailed. This was accompanied by an abnormally high tide, which flooded the Custom House. Many craft have been swamped and the admiralty pier and docks are greatly damaged. The cross-channel steamers report the severity of the storm unprecedented.

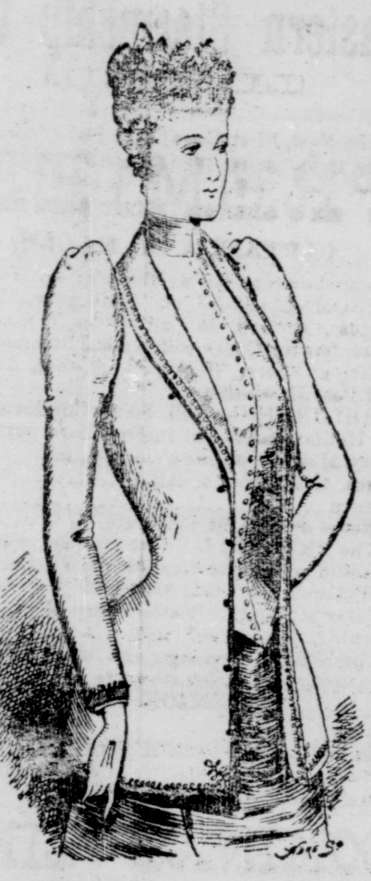
