

Appeal Case In Supreme Court

In the Supreme Court yesterday before Mr. Justice J. G. Tweedy, the case of Albert Edward McInyre of Mt. Stewart, an appeal from the sentence of Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, was heard and sentence was reduced from 30 days in jail to a fine of \$50, or 30 days. The offence was that of obstructing a police officer.

The appeal of Oliver Sterling Smith who had received a similar sentence for a like offence was also heard and the sentence reduced to a fine of \$30, or 30 days.

Mr. Allison Gillis represented the appellant in both cases, Mr. J. P. Nicholson for the Crown.

In the appeal from conviction under the Excise Act of Loyola Feehan of St. Stewart, by Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, the appeal was dismissed and sentence confirmed. Mr. Lester O'Donnell appeared for the appellant, and Mr. J. P. Nicholson for the Crown.

Question of Early Season Control of Potato Crop Is Discussed At Eldon

The question of what control the selling agency would have over the early potato crop occupied the attention of the potato producers meeting held at Eldon last night where Mr. Donald A. MacDonald was the principal speaker. Mr. James Halliday of Eldon presided.

Following Mr. MacDonald's speech, the meeting was thrown open for a question and answer period and it took a lot of prompting from chairman Halliday to get the audience to participate. Mr. Halliday asked the first question of Mr. MacDonald: "What control will the selling agency have over the crop of potatoes which are harvested for the early market in July, August and September?" The chairman explained to Mr. MacDonald that a great many of the potatoes grown in that section of the country are for the express purpose of catching the early market, particularly in Nova Scotia. He noted that these potatoes usually brought a much higher price than those shipped on the fall market and wanted to know whether they would be subject to the same pool regulations as those shipped later.

He felt that if such were the case, it would be unfair.

In answer to this question, Mr. MacDonald stated that he had been waited upon by several producers concerning this matter and he told them that they would not be subject to any control from the Board. He said that the early market represented only a small portion of the overall crop and he was quite willing to see a grower dispose of his potatoes to his best advantage where ever he chose. "It has not been the policy of the Board to interfere with this particular phase of potato marketing in the past and I can see no reason why that policy should be changed."

"But you might interfere?" said a voice from the audience, to which Mr. MacDonald replied, "The Board does not make regulations that are not in the general interest of the grower."

A voice of mouth is no good, nor worth a thing," Mr. MacDonald went further to explain that the selling agency exercises control only during the pool

Fund Passes One Million Dollar Mark

The value of boats insured with the Fishermen's Indemnity Fund in the Maritimes has passed the one million dollar mark for the first time since the inception of the insurance scheme almost 15 months ago. The announcement was made in Halifax by the Federal Department of Fisheries.

A total of 607 boats valued at

\$1,021,977 are now covered under the Fund in the three Maritime provinces. These figures compare with Newfoundland where the value of boats insured totals \$912,617 for 1,048 vessels, and British Columbia where 375 boats with a value of \$1,430,391 are insured.

The Fishermen's Indemnity Fund was set up in July 1953 to provide fishermen with a low cost insurance against damage to, or loss of their boats and lobster traps. Net premiums collected in the Maritimes on all boats insured since the Fund began total \$12,353.
