DENTISTS DINE

Impaired Charge Brings \$125 Fine

Willard P. Bernard, Hunter River, pleaded not guilty to a charge of drunken driving but was convicted on a charge of impaired driving in City Police Court yesterday before Magistrate A. James Haslam, OC. City Police officers Alfred Arsenault and Roland Diamond testified for the Crown while the accused, represented by Charles McQuaid, took the stand on his own behalf. On completion of his testimony the Magistrate remarked the witness could have been either too drunk to remember events related by the police officers or was perjuring himself. However, because of an element of doubt he convicted him of the lesser charge and fined him \$125 and costs with the option of 30 days in jail.

Brendon Campbell, New Wilshire, represented by Lester O'Donnell, entered a not guilty plea to the charge of drunken driving but guilty to the lesser offence of driving while impaired and fined \$125. Joseph Redmond, Charlottetown, had a charge of driving while his license was suspended or cancelled withdrawn, but was convicted of driving without first obtaining a license. He was fined \$10.

Passenger Vehicle Increase Reported By CN Ferry Service

Record traffic trends during the summer tourist season have carried into September on Canadian National's Bordet-Cape Tormentine ferry service. Last month's traffic across Northumberland Strait has shown increases over the number of passengers and vehicles handled in September 1964, according to figures released today by J.G. Davis, manager of CN's Maritime area. The ferry service carried 66,341 passengers and 26,664 vehicles to and from Prince Edward Island last month. The totals represent increases of 4,985 and 1,717 passengers and vehicles respectively. Rail passengers, including those travelling by CN's charter bus service, increases by 573. The Abegweit made 364 strait crossings with passengers during the month; the Prince Edward Island, 149 crossings and the Confederation, 332 crossings for a total of 845. Passengers, excluding rail and CN charter bus, totaled 63,262. Vehicle traffic consisted of 22,543 cars, 2,210 trucks, 1,232 tractor trailers, 226 buses, 55 motorcycles and 368 passenger trailers.

person who had done business with Lamothe and "changed his cheques from Quirion lumber." "There was a question of \$30,000," said Boulet. Boulet testified about arranging a meeting with Faucher on a deserted road and about an argument between Faucher and Lamothe. Figuring in the exchange were statements about "Faucher's girl" and her changing of cheques. "Lamothe got out of the car with Faucher and I heard four shots," said Boulet. It was dark, and, with a flashlight, Boulet and Lamothe dragged the body into the woods where it was given the caustic lime treatment, Boulet said. Lamothe said both he and Quirion agreed Faucher "had to go" and that Quirion had requested the killing. **KILLED WITH HAMMER** Lamothe said Boulet killed Faucher with a hammer. "We did not have a revolver," testified Lamothe. He said that in a car in the woods at St. Gilles—the last stop on the death ride—Boulet slugged Faucher and continued doing so after dragging the battered man from the vehicle. Lamothe quoted Quirion as also saying Faucher was wanted by police and that he might be pressured to talk. In Quebec, no charges are laid in violent deaths until after a coroner's inquest. Once charges are brought, a preliminary hearing is held, and then comes a voluntary statement, a stage in Quebec legal procedure where the defence can present evidence aimed at getting the charges dismissed before trial.



MR. FLEMING
Flemming Here To Address Meet

Hon. Hugh John Fleming, minister of national revenue in the last Progressive Conservative cabinet, arrives in Prince Edward Island today for two speaking engagements. Mr. Fleming will speak tonight at a public meeting in Kings County Progressive candidate M.J. McQuaid and Thursday night will be a guest speaker at Mount Ryan with Heath MacQuarrie and J. Angus MacLean, Queens County PC candidates. Thursday afternoon at 2.30 he will pay an official call on Premier Walter R. Shaw at his office in the Provincial Building. Mr. Fleming and Mr. Shaw are personal friends. Mr. Fleming, PC member from Victoria-Carleton in the last Parliament, was first elected to the House of Commons in a by-election in 1960, and was for a time minister of forestry. In 1962 he was named minister of revenue. Prior to turning to federal politics, Mr. Fleming was Pre-

minister of New Brunswick from 1962 until his resignation in 1960. His father was also premier of New Brunswick from 1911 to 1914. Mr. Fleming was first elected to the New Brunswick legislature in the general election of 1944 and re-elected in each subsequent election up until his resignation from the government to enter the federal field.

Dief Declares Would Consider Water Diversion

NORTH BAY, Ont. (CP)—Northern Ontario's Grand Canal scheme to divert water running into James Bay southward to the Great Lakes will receive "sympathetic consideration" as part of a Conservative government's national water resources policy, Progressive Conservative Leader Diefenbaker said Tuesday. "Our water is a resource that must be preserved for the benefit of Canada and our future generations," Mr. Diefenbaker said in an interview. "I know all about the Grand Canal. It would be for the benefit of the people within the country and would be one of the schemes which would receive the most sympathetic consideration." He said the Conservative water policy includes diversion of waters which would otherwise be lost in the ocean, in Manitoba, as well as Ontario. "Another thing that will benefit you greatly here when we take office is the removal of the 11-per-cent sales tax on building materials imposed by the Pearson government."

a proclamation, charging the Smith government with rebellion and ordering the Rhodesian governor, Sir Humphrey Gibbs, to assume control of the government to the extent of his ability. However, it is likely that Smith would place Sir Humphrey under house detention just as he ordered former prime minister Garfield Todd into house detention when Todd decided to fly to Edinburgh to participate in a university "teach-in" on Rhodesia. Todd is in favor of giving the 4,000,000 Negroes in Rhodesia a full vote.

IMPRESSED PUBLIC

Wilson is reported to feel that Smith left a popular impression with the British public following his recent visit here but that Smith may have overplayed his hand by restricting Todd. However, there is grave doubt in British political quarters that harsh measures against Smith would be acceptable to the British voter. In the event of illegal independence, Britain, Canada and other Commonwealth countries would withdraw Commonwealth preferential tariffs from Rhodesia and perhaps ban trade altogether. But Smith argues that such a move would hurt the Negroes even more than the whites. The Negroes would lose their jobs and go hungry.

More Refugees Head For Fla.

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — More Cubans bobbed across the choppy Florida Straits in small craft Tuesday while efforts stepped up toward importing the would-be exiles wholesale. A boat skipper who made a refugee-pickup round trip said a three-mile line of 170 assorted craft lay at Camarico, Fidel Castro's port of embarkation for exile in America. Havana Radio said one was a vessel capable of carrying 200 persons.

British Businessmen Urged Link With Canadian Partner

LONDON (CP) — Canadian industrialist Victor Oland told British businessmen Tuesday the best way to increase trade with Canada is to establish a business there with a Canadian partner. Noting Britain's need to increase exports, Oland told a largely British audience at a luncheon meeting of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in Great Britain. "I'm a great believer in the idea that trade follows investment." He said "colossal" United States investment in Canadian industry is one reason for the success of U.S. sales in Canada. "I would suggest that if you want to invest in Canada, get yourself a Canadian partner. You'll save a lot of trouble—you can combine your know-how with his knowledge of the market." Oland, prominent Halifax businessman, said he and other Canadian businessmen want to see British exports to Canada increased. **CALL TO BUILD HERE** He warned that British failure to manufacture in Canada could result in a decline in sales of British products there because of increasing competition. In automobiles, for example, Sweden's Volvo is already assembling cars in Nova Scotia and Japanese, Italian and Austrian car makers will be assembling there within a year. French cars are to be assembled in Quebec.
