JULY MAGAZINES.

THE CANADIAN
 The July number of "The Canadian Magazine" is a bulky number, and bears the marks of prosperity. It opens with a beautiful picture of Brock's Monument, and has as its leading article a thoughtful contribution from T. Arnold Haultain, entitled "Complaining of the Tools." The illustrated articles in this issue are: "Picturesque St. Pierre," the pretty little French island in the Gulf of St. Lawrence; "A Glimpse of Norway," being the first of four articles on the rugged scenery of that country; "The Premiers of New Brunswick Since Confederation," by James Hanway, of the St. John Telegraph; The Royal Grenadiers' Colours; "The Queen Victoria Niagara Falls Park," and two illustrated stories by Ella S. Atkinson (Madge Merton) and Esther Talbot Kingsmill. The sub-departments: Current Thoughts, Literary Chat, and Books and Authors, are filled with bright work and decidedly taking features. The announcement is made that the August number will be special fiction number, and that in that same issue will be commenced "Hagar of the Pawnshop," a continued story by Fergus Hume, author of "The Mystery of a Hansom Cab," "The Lone Inn," etc. This story is said to be very much like the best work of Charles Dickens, and should add much to the value of each number of our national Magazine.

THE NATIONAL

July issue of the National shows a decided step to the front under the impetus of its new management. The National now ranks with the best of the ten-cent illustrated periodicals and is rapidly proving itself to be a magazine with a future. The current number from cover to cover is stocked with the most reading. The leading illustrated article is "The American Tourists in Switzerland," by R. H. E. Starr, giving an account of how the average American "takes in" the little mountainous republic. Scenes at Ellis Island, New York Harbor, the successor of Castle Garden, are described in the illustrated article, "The Landing of Emigrants," by Joanna R. Nicholls. Dr. Edward Everett Hall continues his entertaining reminiscences this month by a sketch on "The Prehistoric Newspaper." The remarkable religious serial, "Christ and His Time," so popularly treated and attractively written, and illustrated from the famous paintings of the world depicting Christ's life, enters upon its ninth chapter in the July issue. The two other illustrated articles are "Some Chicago Stories," by Harriet Hayden Hayes, and "The Chinese Literary Graduate," by W. T. Gracy. The humorous department, under the head of "Twixt Smiles and Tears," contains two or three cleverly written sketches. The fiction of the number consists in four short stories that are decidedly good reading: "Bites of Philadelphia," by Hayden Carruth; "The Cat and the King," by Helen F. Huntington; "The Knighthood of Tony," by Myrtle Red, and "The Return of Dick Weemine," by L. Frank Baum. A new department which the National has just instituted is "Club Women and Their Work." It is of close interest to every club woman in the country. It will be a regular feature. The National in its July issue announces a "Free Trip to Europe" offer for 300 subscriptions. This proposition, as outlined in the particulars, is certainly the most genuine and straightforward of any premium offer that has ever been made. "THEOSOPHY."

Improvements continue to be made in Theosophy (published at 144 Madison Avenue, New York, price 20 cents.) Last month its size was doubled and now its cover has undergone a marked change, which gives the magazine a really artistic and striking appearance.

One of the most remarkable features of this issue is an article entitled: "The Problem of the Pyramid," by Major D. W. Lockwood, Corps of Engineers, U. S. A., giving the relation between the pyramid, cube and sphere. The learned author refers particularly to the Pyramid of Gizeh making a simple Euclidian construction for cubing the sphere and squaring the circle. This is a most remarkable feat and is the first successful solution of a problem which the greatest mathematicians have failed to master. The article should be intensely interesting to all students of mathematics, as well as to those who seek the real meaning of the symbolism used in secret societies. Perhaps the gem of this number is the beginning of a series called "Visions of a Life," written under a nom de plume. The illustrations suggest the seer is a woman. An original and fascinating view of the hidden side of nature is presented in these views.
