

Sudden Death of Retired C.N.R. Train Conductor

The death occurred suddenly at his home on Park Street of Gerald David Burgoyne, retired conductor on the Canadian National Railways, in his 62nd year. Mr. Burgoyne had retired last February on account of ill health and although a heart condition from which he was suffering restricted his activities, he was in his usual health until 8 o'clock Tuesday evening, when after driving his car home, he complained to his wife of not feeling well. She called his doctor out in spite of all medical aid he passed away a half hour after he was stricken.

The late Mr. Burgoyne was born in Granville, P.E.I., the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. William Burgoyne. He became employed with the Railway in 1922 and was a 30 year member of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen. As a public servant he was well and favorably known for his many acts of courtesy to the travelling public.

He was twice married. His first wife, the former Matilda Mae Ferguson, predeceased him some years ago. From this union one son, Maurice, a C.N.R. trainman survives. His second marriage was to Olga Elizabeth Ferguson, who with her two sons David 9, and Clarence Russell 8, are left to mourn his passing.

The funeral of Mr. Burgoyne, who was a member of Trinity United Church, will be held from his late residence on Friday at two o'clock. Interment will be in the People's Cemetery.

ROY BRYANTON

The sudden death occurred at his home in Burlington on Nov. 11, 1934, of Roy Bryanton in his 43rd year.

The late Mr. Bryanton was born at Burlington, son of Elijah Bryanton and his late wife, Lydia Champion.

Mr. Bryanton spent his lifetime on P. E. I. and was well and favorably known having been engaged in farming and carpentry up until his illness six years ago. Despite all that the best of medical skill could do he succumbed to the One who gave him life.

In 1934 he married Mary Meek. They were blessed with two children, Shirley, Summerside and David Roy, who was his Dad's constant companion.

Although being in ill health for a number of years, he was able to oversee the farm, which at the time of his death he had been instructing his son in some farm work.

Of a quiet home loving disposition his happiest hours were those he spent with his family about him, who will mourn his passing. Left to mourn besides his wife and family are his father, Mr. Elijah Bryanton, one sister (Reta) Mrs. J. E. Cooper, Dorchester, Mass.; two brothers, Elmer, McAdam, N. B., and Elvin, Burlington. One brother, Harold predeceased him some years ago.

Funeral services were held from his late residence followed by service in Kensington United Church and were conducted by his pastor, Rev. L. M. Murray.

Beautiful floral tributes banked the casket.

Hymns sung were: "The Lord's My Shepherd," and "Abide With Me."

A solo, "Saved By Grace," was beautifully rendered by Mr. Roscoe Walker.

Funeral was under the direction of Mr. J. L. Davison, followed by burial in the People's Cemetery, Kensington.
