British Tanker Bombed And Burned In Indonesian Port

SINGAPORE (Reuters) — The 12,278-ton British tanker San Flaviano was bombed and burned out Monday by unidentified planes as it lay in the Indonesian port of Balikpapan in East Borneo. The attacking planes, presumably belonging to anti-government Indonesian rebels, just missed another British tanker, the 8,139-ton Daronia. The San Flaviano's all-British crew of 50 was picked up by the Daronia, which headed for Singapore. There were no casualties. Balikpapan, an Indonesia government oil port on the Straits of Macassar, was target of rebel planes two weeks ago. It lies 160 miles west of the Celebes, a stronghold of the rebels fighting President Sukarno's Jakarta regime. NEW TANKER

Britain Still Interested In Free Trade Pact With Canada

By ROBERT RICE Canadian Press Staff Writer MONTREAL (CP) — Sir David Eccles said Monday Britain is "still interested" in a free trade pact between Canada and the United Kingdom. Sir David, president of the British board of trade, a government department, told a press conference here that such a bilateral trade agreement "might" be discussed at the full Commonwealth economic conference next September in Montreal. The cabinet minister, in Canada to see the touring British trade mission "off to a good start," also announced he is to meet Trade Minister Gordon Churchill and Finance Minister Donald Fleming. On the free trade plan, first proposed by Britain at last year's Montreal economic conference of Commonwealth finance ministers, Sir David said: "There are some attractions for Canada which may not have been apparent when the proposal was first put forward." Canada more or less dismissed the free trade idea when it was thrust forward at the Montreal conference. Sir David flew to Canada to join the 11-man delegation led by Sir William Rostes in Montreal. The trade mission is making a cross-Canada tour in an effort to increase Anglo-Canadian trade. The board of trade president said the dollar area needs particular attention from Britain because it offers a worthwhile reward. "We want to buy some stock in a company that is doing well," he said. "That's what we feel about Canada." Asked about the effects of the recession in the U.S. on Britain, Sir David said only felt a "small rise" in unemployment, which now is about two per cent of the British working force, compared with eight per cent out of work in the U.S.
