Congratulations To E. Blake McInerney

Former St. John Man Appointed to Important Royal Bank Position in Paris, France

ST. JOHN, N. B., June 29.—Hearty congratulations from his many St. John friends are pouring in on E. Blake McInerney, who is spending a few days in the city, the guest of his brother, His Honor Judge H. O. McInerney, prior to sailing for France, where he will assume the important and responsible position of manager of the Royal Bank of Canada's Paris office. Since leaving the Royal Bank's King street office, here in 1915, where he had held the position of accountant, Mr. McInerney's progress in the bank has been marked by constant promotion, until today, at the age of thirty-three, he has again been honored with still greater responsibilities. That this is so speaks in itself the great confidence placed in Mr. McInerney's capacity and integrity by his superiors.

Successful From Start.

Mr. McInerney, who is a son of the late George V. McInerney, K. C., left St. John's, Newfoundland, some days ago, visiting his mother at Charlottetown, P. E. I., en route. He will leave here today for Montreal, from where he will proceed to Paris with his wife and children and his sister, Miss Grace McInerney, who will join him at Montreal about July 5.

Mr. McInerney entered the Royal Bank of this city in 1904, when about fifteen years of age. The acting manager then was A. O. Hornsby, now of Havana, and who is at present visiting his mother on Prince Edward Island. The present manager of the Royal Bank R. E. Smith, was at the time Mr. McInerney entered the bank a member of the staff, the bank premises then being situated at Chubb's corner, where the Eastern Trust Company's offices are now. Later, the present building at the corner of Canterbury and King streets was constructed. Mr. McInerney finally became accountant there, the late T. B. Blair, being manager at the time. Mr. McInerney left here in the year 1915 for Montreal, where he took over the post of accountant of the main branch; a year later he was appointed accountant in the main branch at Toronto, where he remained for something over a year, when he was appointed third agent of the bank in New York City. In August of last year he was appointed manager at St. John's, Newfoundland, and while there was a few weeks ago notified of his appointment as manager of the bank in Paris, France.

Mr. McInerney was married in the year 1916 to Miss Nellie Foster, niece of Mrs. Frank Foster, Paradise Row. They have three children.

Druggists Meet In Amherst

AMHERST, June 28.—Thirty Nova Scotian druggists gathered this morning in the Council Chamber of the Town Hall, where the annual conference of the Provincial Pharmaceutical Association was conducted. H. D. Madden of Liverpool, presided and after making a brief address submitted his report for the past year. Mr. Madden in his remarks declared that the society was in a most flourishing condition and gathering strength yearly.

After a lengthy discussion of general business the following members were elected as the council for 1922: E. S. MacKenzie, New Glasgow. G. B. Burgess, Halifax. Fraser Robinson, New Glasgow. G. B. Slavin, Sydney. S. R. Balcorn, Halifax. Charles Munroe, Amherst.

A report of the yearly examinations were submitted to the conference and it was ascertained that nine graduates had passed successful examinations, while several had failed on one paper alone. Supplementary examinations will be provided for these.

This afternoon the session concluded with a vote of thanks extended to Mayor D. W. Robb, and the citizens of Amherst. The druggists left by motor later in the afternoon for Moncton where tonight they will be in a joint conference with the druggists belonging to the association on Prince Edward Island and in neighboring province of New Brunswick. The meeting will conclude on Thursday.

The council will meet at a later date, when officers and committees for the year will be appointed.
