Her diamond-studded imperial state crown glittered under the lights of television cameras as she slowly read the speech from the throne in the House of Lords.

S' Side May Benefit By New Federal Gov't. Aid Program

Definite possibilities for the implementation of the plan for federal aid to municipalities exist in Summerside, Mayor W.A. Currie said yesterday.

Although the Mayor and Town Council have not yet had time to fully study the implications of the plan, His Worship suggested that it could possibly be of assistance in the water and sewer work of the new housing development where considerable labor costs are expected.

The mayor thought also that a number of Summerside streets earmarked for future paving might also fall under the conditions laid down by the federal government.

The federal program was announced a Regina Monday night by Prime Minister Diefenbaker as a plan to create winter employment. By it the government would underwrite 50 per cent of payroll costs incurred by municipalities from December to April for work that would not normally be done in the winter months.

Unemployment Offenses Bring Fines In Court

SUMMERSIDE — Three men charged with infractions of the unemployment insurance regulations appeared in Magistrate's Court here Tuesday before Magistrate R.S. Hinton, Q.C.

An O'Leary man was charged with making false statements in applying for unemployment insurance. He was fined \$25 and costs. He had repaid \$120 he had gotten from the unemployment commission.

A resident of Central Bedeque and a Summerside man were charged with drawing unemployment insurance while working and not declaring their earnings.

The Central Bedeque man was fined \$36 and costs and the Summerside man \$20 and costs. The former had paid back all \$216 he had received from the commission and the latter \$15 of the \$97 he received.

J.K. Elderkin, enforcement officer of the Unemployment Insurance Office of Moncton, prosecuted.

A Summerside man pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of liquor not purchased on his individual permit and was fined \$40 and costs.

Another Summerside man pleaded guilty to a similar charge. His case was adjourned to Thursday.

A Lennox Island man pleaded guilty to being intoxicated on an Indian reservation. He was fined \$10 and costs.

Three Lennox Island men appeared on charges of assault causing actual bodily harm. Two pleaded guilty and one not guilty. The pair that pleaded guilty were remanded to Thursday for sentence. The third man had his case adjourned to Thursday also.
