Most Punishing Fire In 47 Years

TORONTO, July 28 — (CP) — Fire chief Albert Steen described a fire that gutted the basement and ground floor of a downtown warehouse today as Toronto's "most punishing" blaze in its 47 years of service.

Yellow smoke and fumes from blazing plastic electrical wiring and other appliances knocked out 30 firemen fighting the three-alarm fire that caused damage estimated at \$150,000 to the four-story Burns Building on downtown Wellington Street. Forty more required strong whiffs of oxygen as the pungent smoke swirled about them, driving onlookers away.
