Keep Abreast Of Changing Scene SCA Convention Delegates Told

"Accountants of today should be ready to cope with the growing complexities of their field, including the tremendous strides made in the applications of the computer." This warning is issued by J.N. Allan, RIA, Hamilton, Ont., executive vice-president of the National Society of Industrial and Cost Accountants and guest speaker at a luncheon at the Charlottetown Hotel Saturday.

Mr. Allan said, "Self improvement is very important — it is necessary to keep abreast of the changing scene. The future of its members is the future of the SICA."

He stated that the RIA course is designed to provide the technical competence necessary to perform the duties of accountants in industry. The course is under a constant state of study to keep the students up to date. The number of student members in Canada is 85,000, 14 of these coming from P.E.I. These students are attending 22 Canadian Universities.

NAME CHANGE HINTED

Another speaker at the luncheon was R. Syme, RIA, Winnipeg, president of the national SICA. He stated that a reorganization planning committee of past presidents and correspondents has been formed to discuss problems of the society, the most pressing being its name. The word "cost" in the society's name gives an ill-informed impression, he said, and members are not considered for certain positions because they are thought of first as a cost accountants and not industrial accountants.

Mr. Syme stated the possibility of inserting the word "management" into the society's name. He said "it is a dynamic period — much change is coming."

again spoke out against any continued spread of such power and repeated that the United States will "continue to work for an ending of all nuclear tests of every kind by solid and verified agreement."

The Chinese Communists proposed an international summit conference to ban all nuclear weapons.

The Russians also are talking of halting all nuclear tests by international agreement.

Johnson again emphasized the Communist Chinese nuclear explosion was no surprise and American defence plans were formulated to take full account of it.

The United States will continue to support the limited test-ban treaty, now a year old, he said, calling on those countries which haven't signed to do so.

There's as much in the Soviet interest as in the United States to continue the struggle against nuclear spread, and "we will be ready to join with them and all the world in working to avoid it."

Summing up, Johnson said the upheaval in the Kremlin and the explosion in Communist China are large and full of meaning.

"Yet," he said, "they do not change our basic policy — they reinforce it."
