

Exhibition Notes.

The Prize List for the Provincial Exhibition, 1880, is in the hands of the publisher, and will be ready for distribution in a few days.

The prize list for the Provincial Exhibition of Nova Scotia for 1880 gives the names of a number of enterprising merchants, who have offered special prizes for various articles, not included on prize list. Among those names, we see A. J. Cox, Jeweller, who has offered a silver-plated double pickle castor, value \$6.00, for best dozen assorted house plants, grown by lady amateurs. This jeweller's donation is followed up by a second and third prize for same plants by other parties. Again, we see that the enterprising James Vick, seedsman, of New York, offers a "Florence Vase" value \$4.00, for the best "4 Foliage and Variegated Plants," competition open to amateurs only. Others have followed Mr. Vick's example by offering prizes in various classes of this Exhibition, to be held at Kentville, N. S., on the last week in September next. Surely special prizes, on the same principle may be had from men of enterprise in this Province. To foster and encourage every branch of industry is the duty of all who have the means, by contributing towards rendering as interesting as possible an Exhibition—the object of which is to develop the industries and productions of all classes. Of recent years our exports have shown that eggs have formed no inconsiderable part of our products. Will some gentleman offer a small prize for say the best collection of hen eggs, one dozen of each sort—describing the different breeds of poultry which produce those samples. Such collections would be very interesting, and prove beneficial to those interested in the egg trade. We might name other branches of industry that might, in like manner, attract the attention of those who are desirous to promote and encourage our industries.

Leopold and Louise.

A DESPATCH of the 19th inst., from Quebec announces that Prince Leopold and Princess Louise will sail for England next month. The Princess is continually suffering from the effect of injuries received by the accident last winter, and the Prince, it is officially stated, met with a slight accident while salmon fishing and sprained his leg. Both, therefore, leave Canadian shores indisposed. The Princess, following the advice of her physician, will visit the watering places of Germany, and on returning will stay for a time in England. It is to be hoped that the bracing sea air, and German mineral waters, will have a good effect on the Princess, and that after a few months rest she will regain her strength, and return to Canada with renewed spirits.

The Jesuit Decrees.

The French Government proposes to enforce the anti-Jesuit decrees, preemptorily, and has ordered prefects to enforce the expulsion of all members of the order from France. If this command is carried out, private houses, where Jesuit Fathers are now staying, will be broken into and clergy-men taken by force to the frontier; but curiously enough, there is nothing to prevent them from at once returning, even on the same trains and the same cars, with the officers who took them to the frontier, and the process of this nominal expulsion may be considered ad infinitum. There is no law by which a man can be prevented from living in France simply because he is a member of the Society of Jesuits. He may be forbidden to reside in a house belonging to the order, but otherwise he has a right of living in France, and if he is expelled, he can come back again without incurring any penalty. The Jesuits in Lyons have made arrangements to remove their educational establishments to England, probably going to join their brethren at Longhurst.

Great Britain was thrown into a social ferment recently over a sentence pronounced by a Magistrate in the Clerkenwell Police Court, of London City, upon Catherine Connolly, who had visited her husband in the Clerkenwell House of Detention, and supplied him with a quarter ounce of chewing tobacco concealed in a tart. A sentence of twenty-one days at hard labor was imposed upon her, and this involved the separation of the mother from her child six years old. Within twelve hours every London journal blazed with an indignant leader on the subject, and petitions for mercy began to pour into the Home Office. Of course Sir William Vernon Harcourt issued a pardon as soon as red tape would permit.

A HUGE FRAUD ON WORKINGMEN.—From a New York despatch received this morning, it appears that the builders of the mammoth hotel at Rockaway Beach are in difficulties. Over 1000 mechanics and laborers are employed on the hotel, and these have not been paid since June 1st. They consequently have some \$60 apiece coming to them, or \$60,000 in all, and the contractors want to compromise at 20 cents on the dollar.

Turkey and Greece.

The uncertainty of continued peace between Turkey and Greece, has not yet been lessened. Late despatches state that Turkey is prosecuting preparations for war, and Greece of course will claim the territory awarded to it by the Berlin note. A Constantinople despatch of the 20th says:

All that can be said at present with anything like certainty is that to the military demonstration of the Greeks, backed merely by the moral support of Europe, the Turks will never yield. They are firmly convinced they can easily repel any regular Greek force, and it is thought Albanian Bashi-bazouks can easily destroy the irregular forces.

A Vienna correspondent of one of the London papers says:

I am able to state positively that no formal proposition for a naval demonstration in Turkish waters has yet been made. The powers have been merely sounded on the subject. Austria and Germany are willing to participate in such demonstrations.

The King of Greece is still on his tour of the European States. The Queen, it is said has gone to Copenhagen, and the King will meet her there.—Since the above was written, the press despatches bring the news that Greece is to mobilize her army.

Mutual Divorce.

A COOL WAY OF DOING THINGS AT THE CAPITAL.

OTTAWA papers publish the following account of a mutual divorce which took place on the 20th inst.:—"Some time ago a couple named Morgan resided on Murray street, and although they promised to 'love, honor and obey each other' at the hymenial altar, their dispositions were so very opposite that it seemed almost impossible for them to exchange a kind word. The wife was a prepossessing woman, a brunette of almost faultless figure, and graceful in movement, with piercing black eyes and a pleasing smile, so pleasing in fact that she captured a rather handsome young man. They had clandestine meetings, the result of which was that the young man determined on seeking an interview with the husband and making a full and complete confession; he carried out his plans and having finished, the husband asked if the love was reciprocated. The answer came in the affirmative. The young man modestly asked if a monetary consideration would suffice to obtain sole possession of those piercing black eyes. The husband hesitated for a moment, and then solemnly said, 'Young man, if you love this woman and she loves you, there is no reason why a ten-dollar bill will not debar me from the enjoyment of her company in the future.' The young man produced the legal tender, and the husband sat down and wrote out the following receipt:—"Received from (blank) \$10; in consideration of which I hereby renounce all right and title to (blank), my lawful wife, and from this day forth she is the charge of the said (blank) and forfeits all claim to my bed and board. Almost a Centenarian.

THE FIRST U. E. LOYALIST CHILD BORN IN CANADA STILL ALIVE.

A correspondent writing from Pelee Island, Ont., says: "There is now living on this Island an aged lady, Mrs. Mary McCormack, who was born in 1792, in July of that year, at Sandwich, Essex, the child of John and Mary Cornwall, both U. E. refugees, and the first of whom was the first member of Parliament ever elected in the old western district of Ontario. Mrs. McCormack was married at an early age to William McCormick, for many years M. P. for the same district, and a leading man in the west. Mrs. McCormick is still perfectly clear in all her faculties, and in excellent health. She is the mother of thirteen children, and an active worker and thinker to this day. She saw from the Canadian shores the battle of Lake Erie, in September, 1813, and with painful sadness knew which side victory had declared for when after the battle the fleets stood southward in Put-in-Bay. She knew Gen. Hull and all the Americans in command at the time, also Gen. Brock, the brave Tecumseh, and all the worthies of that period; last but not least, Simon Girty, the notorious Indian trader, whose dare-devil deeds cover so many pages of imaginary American literature, but who was really a rough, wild, but kind-hearted man.
