The training ship Charlydis on July 6th spoke the bark Joe Reid, from Miramichi bound to Belfast, all well, lat. 52 12 N., long. 35.30 W.

A PARTY of Acadians, to attend the festival at Memramook, left Tignish yesterday morning in a special train for Summerside, making the run in three hours.

An Ottawa-despatch says that Sir William J. Ritchie, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, has been appointed deputy to the Governor General.

The Prince of Wales recently visited the Canadian department at the agricultural exhibition at Derby, and manifested great interest in the Dominion exhibits.

On the 18th inst., John Briscoil, employed on a gravel train on the Fitchburg railroad, was instantly killed by the cars. He was about 60 years old and from St. John, N. B.

The training ship Charlydis arrived at Sydney, C. B., on the 18th inst. She will take in bunker coal and water and proceed to St. John at the first favorable opportunity.

MR. W. C. LOND HELLWELL (one of the sufferers by the accident on Island Railway last August) arrived last evening, and is staying in his old quarters at the Revere.

The special train which conveyed Sir Alexander Campbell and family from Charlottetown to Summerside made the run in an hour and forty-five minutes. Not bad for the narrow gauge.

The Prince of Wales' friends, who have been sounding supporters of the Government with a view to prevailing upon Gladstone to vote a lump sum for the payment of the Prince's debts, or an increase in his annual allowance, have been unsuccessful.

On the 15th inst., the Pope convoked an extraordinary council of the cardinals to consider the recent riots. After a prolonged discussion Cardinal Pecci's proposal to delay all action was agreed to.

The entrance examination of the Prince of Wales College will be held on Wednesday, the 17th day of August next, commencing at nine o'clock, a. m. All applications for admission must be made before the 10th of August.

MARY McKINNON, of Mount Stewart, was, to-day, summoned, by the Inspector of Licenses for Queen's County, before Theoph. Des Brisay Esq., J. P., for selling liquor without license, and fined in the sum of sixteen dollars.

It is said to be the intention of the Crown to arraign Mr. Goldstone for manslaughter in the case of Mr. Creighton, who died from the effect of the wound inflicted by Goldstone at Montreal. Great dissatisfaction exists in Montreal at the manner in which the inquest in this stabbing case was conducted.

The Minister of Customs, the President of the Council and the Commissioner of Customs, left Charlottetown early this morning in a special train for Souris. They arrived there at 8.45 o'clock, and left again at 10.30 for Georgetown. They will stay at Summerside to-night.

In order to avoid the crush usual to excursions by the over-crowding of cars, the Superintendent has arranged to despatch two special trains for Alberton to-morrow, the first of which will leave here at 7 o'clock, a. m., and the other at 7.50. Sufficient car accommodations will be provided to ensure the comfort of excursionists.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

EUROPE AND THE EAST.

LONDON, July 18.

The Daily News says that one of the rules of the House of Commons provides that a petition may be brought into the House by a deputation of ten persons, and it is believed that when Bradlaugh says that in his threatened visit to demand his Parliamentary rights he will be accompanied by a large number of deputations, each leaving one or more petitions. Several hundreds way thus consider that they are entitled to enter the precincts of Parliament. The whole subject is now under consideration by the officers of the House.

The News this morning says:—"Besides the efforts now being made by the British Government in behalf of our correspondent at Merv, the Russian Government has ordered the Russian authorities in Central Asia to ascertain what means there may be of intervening with the object of procuring his liberation. Prince Lubanoff has shown the kindest interest in the matter."

PARIS, July 18.

Don Carlos has formally protested against his expulsion from France as being uncalled for by any act on his part.

LONDON, July 18.

Patrick Egan has purchased the Dublin "Irishman," thus placing the whole of the national journals in Ireland under the control of the Land League.

LONDON, July 19.

Dean Stanley is dead. Dean Stanley's sister, Canons Farrar and Jones and several members of the Dean's household were present at his death-bed. He remained for some time in a semi-unconscious condition before he died. The "News" this morning says no living divine will be more deeply regretted or more widely missed than Dean Stanley.

UNITED STATES.

NEW ULM, MINNESOTA, July 18.

The people here are organizing for the work before them, and will commence rebuilding immediately. Workmen from St. Paul, St. Stephen and Mankato are on hand. The Government guards are on duty protecting property. There is not a building here but is more or less damaged. A partial list of the killed and wounded here shows five killed and seventeen wounded—several fatally. At Cairo, four miles Northwest, five were killed; also five at West Newton.

CHICAGO, July 18.

The journeyman bakers struck on Sunday, but went to work again upon most of the bosses agreeing to their terms, namely, a reduction in the day's work to twelve hours, and an increase of \$4 per week in wages, so that the men can board themselves instead of boarding with the bosses. It is thought this ends the trouble.

WINONA, Minn., July 18.

Paul Helda, a Swiss emigrant who lately bought a farm in Eagle Creek Valley, became insane through a failure of crops and home-sickness. On Sunday morning he was found dead in the front room of his house. His wife and two children were dead in the next room. Three children were dead in bed upstairs, and the two the eldest boys in the hay loft mortally wounded. All had been shot in the head. One boy may recover. The revolver was found in the house.
