The Lobster Interest.

ST. PETER'S BAY, Aug. 24.

To the Editor of the Examiner.

SIR.—Under any circumstances, I am reluctant to obtrude myself on public notice, and still more so, to go outside of the strict limits of the office which I have the honor to hold. This is outside my office.

But having personally visited almost all the Lobster Canning Establishments in this Province, I think the time has come for the persons who expend capital and enterprise in that industry, to form themselves into a Guild or Association for their self protection. Several newspaper paragraphs, English and this side the Atlantic, have been recently brought to my notice tending to bring discredit on the P. E. I. brand.

Would the capitalists engaged in the prosecution of our very valuable lobster fishery, allow me to suggest that before this year's three millions of P. E. Island lobster cans are thrown on the English market, something—perhaps a strong resolution of the suggested Guild to the effect that Island Lobsters are really thoroughly sound,—should be made public in the principal English and other European papers. John Bull is particularly sensitive as to the wholesomeness of his dinner. It would be a pity if one unfortunate shipment of "trash" (see recent papers) which, perhaps, never went from this Province, were to peril a quarter of a million pounds sterling coming to the Island.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Aug. 25.

A despatch from Candahar states that Gen. Brook, whose death was previously reported, was shot during the late sortie from that city, while attempting to bring in Capt. Cruikshanks who was wounded.

CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 25.

The collective reply to the Porte's note on the Greek question is declined on the ground that the line fixed by the Berlin conference was unanimously accepted by the Powers.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 25.

There has been more severe fighting in Dolirdja between the Roumanians and Bulgarian insurgents. Many of the latter were killed or captured while pillaging villages. Many rifles, the same as used in the Bulgarian army, were captured, which the Government considers a direct proof of the support of the Bulgarian Government.

KILLA ABDULLA, Aug. 25.

Large numbers of Ghazis are flocking down to join Ayoub Khan, who could not now retreat if he wished as the Ghazis are determined to fight to the last.

UNITED STATES.

CINCINNATI, Aug. 25.

The deaf mutes of America are holding their first convention here to-day, there being a fair attendance of deaf mutes from all parts of the United States and from Canada. The proceedings were all carried on by signs. Permanent officers were chosen, the President being Robert McGregor, of Cincinnati. Addresses were made by Rev. John Chamberlain, of New York, Edmund Booth, Mr. Holmes, of Mass., and others. The session will continue two days longer.

LONDON, Aug. 25.

In the Commons to-day the Savings Bank Bill was passed through committee. The report upon the Hares and Rabbits' Bill was agreed to, and the third reading of the Bill fixed for Friday. TUCSON, Nev., Aug. 25.

Sheriff Butner, with a posse, last night intercepted the Mexican brigand Regyes and band in the vicinity of Batner, eight miles from the town. A fight ensued and the Mexicans fled.

SOUTH AMERICA.

PANAMA, Aug. 25.

The Government of Costa Rica have protested against the validity of the contract for the construction of the Inter-Oceanic Canal to be concluded in Managua, Nicaragua, May 25. The Nicaragua Government of Columbia has addressed an ultimatum to Costa Rica on the question of State boundary.
