THE British steamer "Phiny," from Rio Janeiro, was driven ashore in a storm and wrecked at Deal Beach, New Jersey. The passengers, among whom was A. B. Stewart, Esq., of the firm of Hickey & Stewart, of this city, were rescued with great difficulty.

A DESPATCH from Ottawa says:—The Governor-General will go to Halifax a week hence, and will stay in the Lower Provinces till the arrival of Princess Louise. His Excellency is not expected to return to Rideau Hall for six months.

An extended notice of the Militia Concert is unavoidably crowded out. His Honor, the Lieutenant-Governor and staff, with Capt. Maxwell, B. N., and other gentlemen, were specially interested in the militia, were present, and, though the weather was unpropitious, there was a fair audience. Concerts, under Mr. Earl's masterly direction, usually pass off smoothly and pleasantly, and this was no exception, though there was far too much animation in the heels of many of the audience.

We are informed that the Liberal Reform Club, at Montserrat, held a meeting extraordinary on Saturday night last, to consider whom they should run for the Dominion election. Some were in favor of L. H. Davies, Esq., perhaps fearing there is not a man of their party with either brains or force enough in their own country. If report be true, the members of the Association forgot their late ardor for the Sabbath; for some found it difficult to rise early enough to get breakfast over before noon on that day.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, May 21.

Michael Davitt, addressing a meeting of Irishmen at Manchester, said nobody lamented the recent murders more than he, and nobody was readier to prevent such crimes in future. He declared that without the presence of police and military, the property of Irish landlords would not be worth a moment's purchase. He said there could be no alliance between Irishmen and English whigs until landlordism was completely abolished. The government could not grapple effectually with a secret movement, when it was made to appear that such movement was only for protection of a wronged people. He declared that Mr. Gladstone was in earnest in his efforts to suppress crime, he must go to the source of all agrarian outrages and remove landlordism, sweep away Dublin castle, and show that he could repose the same confidence in Ireland as in Canada. The leaders of the league oppose Mr. Parnell's contemplated resignation of his seat, though he has strongly urged his desire to reside on the Continent for some time.

LONDON, May 23. It is understood that private despatches received from Egypt state that the situation is becoming alarming.

Sir Wm. V. Harcourt stated in the Commons this afternoon that Davitt is subject to the conditions of his ticket of leave, which will be revoked if he speaks contrary to law and order.

On motion to go into Committee on the Repression Bill, Joseph Cowen (Radical) moved an amendment declaring that while the House was desirous of aiding the Government in detection of crime, it disapproved of the restrictions on free expression of public opinion in Ireland. Charles Thompson and Charles Russell (Liberals) supported the amendment. Right Hon. D. R. Plunket, Conservative member for Dublin University, supported the bill. He alluded to the inhuman sentiments enunciated by O'Donovan Rossa. A motion by Dillon to adjourn the debate was agreed to.

LONDON, May 23. The News' Dublin despatch says it is surmised that Michael Davitt intends to proceed to America immediately.

The authorities have received information of proposed attempts on the lives of several well-known politicians in London. Police are guarding the residence of all Ministers.

A Constantinople despatch states that the Porte made representations to the Greek Cabinet in regard to the despatch of Greek men-of-war to Egypt.

In the Lords, last evening, Marquis of Waterford gave notice of, and postponed, his question relative to the Kilmainham compact. Earl Granville protested against such notice, as the Speaker of the Commons had ruled a similar one out of order. An adjournment of the House to June 1st was then agreed to.

PARIS, May 23. It is thought that President Grevy will refuse to accept the resignation of Leon Say, Minister of Finance. The Chamber of Deputies will have an opportunity of reconsidering its action to discuss the proposal substituting a duty on alcohols for a duty on wines and beacs, which is opposed by Say.

NEW YORK, May 23. A London special says "there is a crisis in the Cabinet owing to a difference of opinion between Harcourt and his colleagues on Coercion. Harcourt threatens to resign, unless the Government carry through the Crime Prevention Act in its original form and undertake to enforce its provisions rigorously. The new trouble is caused by Michael Davitt's speech at Manchester, which is regarded as a menace to obstruct the pacification of Ireland, and it has destroyed all hope of obtaining any modification of the Coercion Act.

A PUBLIC Temperance meeting, as previously intimated, was held last evening, Queen's Birthday, at Milton. Richard Wise, Esq., was called to the chair. The Rev. Dr. Read, and Dr. Leeming sent word regretting unavoidable absence. After singing "Hold the Fort" the meeting was ably addressed by J. J. Chappelle, G. S.; G. W. Bentley, G. W. P.; D. W. Henderson, G. T.; James Easton and John Bryenton, after which "Milton Star" Division, No. 129, was formally established with 27 charter members. The officers are:—
