Kensington Federal Building Project May Start This Fall Work may begin this fall on a new Federal Building for Kensington, it was reported yesterday. An amount of \$75,000 for this was included in the estimates tabled in the commons in March. It is expected the structure will be a two-story brick affair, with the lower floor used as a post office and the upper floor divided into offices for the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the Department of Agriculture. The drafting of plans is scheduled to begin immediately and a contract may be let by September. The building will be erected on the south-west corner of the junction of the road leading to Summerside with the road to Charlottetown on the property to be acquired from Mr. Fred Arsenault and Irving Oil Company Ltd. The Irving Oil Co. now own the property formerly owned by Mr. J. Bradford Millman, the former site of Treeshome Tourist Home. There is only one building on the property at present, a house owned by Mr. Arsenault, and this will have to be removed. This new post office building will provide much needed expanded facilities for the people of Kensington as the present post office is much too small to properly handle the heavy traffic. — S.

FINE RECITAL Continued from page 5 solos, accompanied by Bethany MacDonald, Miss Blake has been heard in many recitals, and her stage appearances have given her a confidence which combines with her personality for a very charming manner before an audience. Her voice has great clarity and purity of tone, and she sings effortlessly with such excellent enunciation that even when singing in French, the audience was able to catch every word with ease. She was heard in "Ouvre Tes Yeux Bleu," by Massenet, and "The Winds in the South" by J. P. Scott. Another group of piano selections followed. Norma Jean Gay played "Lander in A" by Schubert; Betty Lou Doyle "For Elise" by Beethoven; Vera Hynes "Dance Caprice" by Greig; Pauline Noonan, a difficult Contta Dance by Beethoven which she performed with skill and precision; Suzanne Francis "Soleil-griette" by Bach; Audrey Gallant, a "German Dance" by Beethoven, rendered with a warm, intelligent interpretation; "Waltz," Opus 70 No. 3 by Chopin, played with a precise, light touch by Laurende Wood; and "Romance" by LaFarge was played by Marideth MacDonald who shows definite promise as a pianist. A group of high school girls, Patricia Smith, Mary Gillis, Roma McCloskey, Mary D. Gillis, Noreen McDonald, Frances McCarville, Jean McConnell and Florence McCabe, dressed in identical organy costumes in pleasing pastel shades, performed two dances with an original and clever interpretation for which their director is no doubt responsible. In the first dance, Spirited of Spring, their graceful movements produced a delightful effect. Their second number was a folk dance, Tancuj, a gay, light hearted dance whose mood was reflected in their movements and expression. Sheila McInnis opened the next portion of the program with "Hungarian", Op. 39 No. 12, a lively piece which she executed with skill. Miss Patricia MacDonald, who is a cousin of Bethany MacDonald and shows much of the same promise as a pianist, followed with a moving rendition of "Jesus Christ, the Son of God" by Bach, arranged by Rummel, played with a great deal of feeling and sensitivity. Miss Maureen Blake, whose musical talents are by no means confined to vocal music, but shows an excellent technique as a pianist as well, played Brahms' Rhapsody in G Minor, and was warmly applauded for her fine performance. Miss Bethany MacDonald, A.R.C.T., who is well known as one of the finest pianists in Charlottetown, and who has often performed before Charlottetown audiences, played the difficult "Chopin in G Sharp", No. 39 by Chopin. Her supple interpretation, combined with a great deal of warmth and a fine artistic precision, made this number one to be long remembered. The Notre Dame Choir, a chorus of 45 voices, closed the program with four selections, "Ye Fields of Light" by Franck, "Young April" by Gulesian, "Ah, Si Mon Moine" a French Folk Song, and "Follow Me Down to Carlow" a Scottish Folk Song. Although they were not directed, and sang "Ah, Si Mon Moine" without accompaniment, they sang as one voice, and their performance bespeaks very fine training. After the musical portion of the program, diplomas and silver medals of the Royal Conservatory of Music of Toronto were presented. Presentation of an A.R.C.T. diploma was made to Bethany MacDonald, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard MacDonald of Brighton Road. She has already received two silver medals for having obtained the highest marks in the Maritime Provinces, and plans to continue her studies in music. Silver medals were presented to Sheila McInnis for Grade IX piano, and to Janet Gay, Grade IX piano, for the highest standing in the Maritimes.

Prosecution Of Dr. Endicott Seen Unlikely OTTAWA, May 2 (CP)—External Affairs Minister Pearson today said there seemed little likelihood of prosecution of Dr. James Endicott of Toronto or any Canadians who have visited Communist countries, and allegedly made untrue charges about Canada and her allies. He told the House External Affairs Committee that he had as yet no definite legal opinion to report. But Dr. Endicott had been asked in a letter either to confirm or deny reports that he said while in China that Canada was implicated in alleged germ warfare in the Far East. Dr. Endicott had not replied yet but was due in Canada today and asked by cable for an interview with the Minister. Mr. Pearson said he had not replied pending an answer to the written request waiting Dr. Endicott on his return to Toronto.

Sees Serious Market Outlook For Livestock WINDSOR, N. S., May 2 (CP)—The foot and mouth disease outbreak in the Canadian West has further aggravated the serious livestock market situation in the Maritimes, Roy Grant said at a farm forum group at nearby Brooklyn. Mr. Grant, secretary of the Maritime Federation of Agriculture, said "just where we go from here is hard to say." He stressed the importance of organized marketing. The government bonus on premium hogs was being withdrawn and this might pave the way for buyers "to play one club against the other" in price competition.

Butter, Cheese Stocks Increase OTTAWA, May 2 (CP)—Stocks of creamery butter on May 1 amounted to 11,275,000 pounds compared with 11,678,000 on April 1, and 4,204,000 on the corresponding date last year, the Bureau of Statistics reported today. Holdings of cheddar cheese totaled 14,364,000 pounds as against 14,607,000 a month earlier, and 9,182,000 on May 1 last year. Cold storage holdings of eggs increased to 175,000 cases from 125,000 on April 1 and 54,000 a year ago. Stocks of creamery butter by city, with totals for May 1 last year in brackets: Quebec, 749,000 (1,300,000) pounds; Montreal, 5,296,000 (1,046,000); Toronto, 1,847,000 (1,010,000); Winnipeg, 753,000 (474,000); Regina, 54,000 (57,000); Saskatoon, 408,000 (142,000); Edmonton, 312,000 (945,000); Calgary, 71,000 (165,000); Vancouver, 1,785,000 (541,000).
