\$258,191 OBJECTIVE

United Fund Campaign Underway This Morning

The 1966-1967 United Fund Campaign with an objective this year of \$258,191.00 gets underway this morning. Last night the 2000 volunteer workers who will be handling this year's campaign met to hear last minute instructions. Heading up this year's campaign is Edwin C. Johnstone of New Haven. Mr. Johnstone has had considerable experience working with voluntary organizations and is a former mayor of Charlottetown.

There are thirty-four agencies in this year's campaign. The objective being sought this year is some \$23,000 less than the objective set last year, but is \$16,000 more than was actually raised last year. The reduction in the objective was made possible by the expected advantages from the introduction of the Canada Assistance Plan. Although agencies are not sure exactly what this plan will mean in terms of dollars for Prince Edward Island, it was felt that some relief would be forthcoming and they therefore reduced their requests from the public.

TEAMS OF CAPTAINS
The United Fund organization involves chairman for Summerside, Charlottetown and for the 16 regional high school districts. Each of these chairmen have recruited teams of captains heading up the various elementary school districts and the different urban divisions. Meetings are being held under the general direction of the public relations committees with Jim Wilson as provincial public relations chairman.

Quotas have been set for each region and these quotas are felt by United-Fund officials to be the most realistic since the fund was organized in 1962.

The quotas this year are: in the regional high districts — Alberton — \$3,000; Atholville — \$3,200; Central Queens — \$2,400; Charlottetown Rural — \$14,500; Ellerslie-Bideford — \$1,250; Englewood — \$2,800; Evangeline — \$1,200; Kensington — \$5,000; Kinkora — \$1,950; Miscouche — \$1,150; Montague — \$10,000; Miramichi — \$2,400; O'Leary — \$2,850; Souris — \$5,000; Stella Maris — \$1,350; Tignish — \$1,500.

Summerside: advance gifts — \$12,000; payroll — \$15,000; professional — \$3,000; residential — \$3,500.
Charlottetown: advance gifts — \$43,100; national corporations — \$21,000; payroll — \$40,550; professional — \$10,500; residential — \$11,000; federal service division — \$34,000; provincial government employees — \$15,000.

PLEDGE CARDS
An idea of the size of the United Fund Campaign can be gathered from the number of items that have to be prepared for use by the various campaign committees. These include 30,000 pledge cards and 30,000 receipts are prepared and enclosed in 5400 canvasser kits, 5,000 items are prepared for the advertising program and there are 8,000 instruction sheets, 3,000 sheets of questions and answers, 4,000 lists of the agencies all pre-

Magistrate Adjourns Impaired Driving Case

Magistrate James B. Johnston adjourned the case of Glenn James McCabe of Ina to September 28 at 2:30 p.m. when he appeared in Magistrate Court yesterday morning on a charge of driving while impaired. The accused was represented by Lester P. O'Donnell who pleaded not guilty on behalf of the accused.

Gordon Carr of Victoria, who appeared before Magistrate Johnston on a similar charge, pleaded not guilty and was remanded until Friday, September 23 at 2:30 p.m. Carr was also represented by Lester O'Donnell.

Maurice Mullin of Vernon Bridge pleaded not guilty to a charge of loitering in a public place on information placed before the court by Myrna Dougherty. The accused was represented by Mr. O'Donnell and the informant was represented by Charles MacQuaid, Q.C. The case was adjourned until Wednesday, October 5 and 10:30 a.m.

PLEADS NOT GUILTY
Reuben John Donnelly entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of leaving a motor vehicle on the highway in a manner which could cause an accident. The accused was represented by Kenneth MacDonald. The case was adjourned until Friday, September 23 at 10:30 a.m. to fix a date for trial.

The case of Louis F. Francis Cairns was adjourned to September 26 at 9:30 a.m. for judgment by Magistrate Johnston. Mr. Cairns, who was represented by Bert Campbell, was charged with driving without due care and attention. Glen Martin Gambia of Craup elected trial by magistrate when he pleaded not guilty this morning to a charge of having a peace officer, namely Cst. Alan Burchill of the Borden detachment of the RCMP, embark on an investigation with intent to deceive. The investigation in-

olved charges that a William Godfrey Stewart had left the scene of an accident. The accused was represented by Kenneth MacDonald and the crown attorney is John P. Nicholson, Q.C. The case was adjourned until Wednesday, October 12.

Carl Mayhew of Lady Fane pleaded not guilty this morning to a charge of assault on information laid by his wife, Ella Mayhew. The case was adjourned until September 30 at 10:30 a.m.

Accident Sends Five To Hospital

An accident near Peakes on the Peakes Road caused five people to be rushed to the Kings County Hospital late Sunday night. The accident occurred when a car driven by Leonard Cluney of Bristol was in collision with a truck operated by John MacLean of Peakes. It is thought Mr. MacLean was working on his truck at the time and the impact of the car may have forced the truck over his body and legs. He was rushed to the Montague Hospital where he was examined by Dr. M.L. Bonnell who had him transferred by ambulance to the Prince Edward Island Hospital. He was reported to have broken hip or leg.

In the car with Mr. Cluney were his wife and two children all of whom were rushed to the hospital.
