The men were two days in the dory before their providential rescue.

A P. E. ISLANDER CHARGED WITH MURDER.—On our first page is published a paragraph taken from the *St. John Telegraph*, in reference to the murder of Rosalie Hilton, by her husband, Wm. McNeill. It appears that McNeill is a P. E. Islander, and served his trade as a shoemaker in this Province; he was divorced from his first wife, and married Miss Hilton in St. John, N. B., in November last. CAPT. DECOSE, of the schr. *Heather*, at Halifax from St. John's, Nfld., reports that the steamer *Daisy* ran into the schr. *Raven*, of P. E. Island, and sank her. The crew were saved and brought to Canoe. The vessel and cargo are a total loss; valued at \$4,000. The *Raven* was owned by Capt. James Power, of this city. She was valued and purchased by the owners of the tug which sunk her.

The temperance men of Queens County will be glad to learn that the petition, praying for an election under the provisions of the Canada Temperance Act, 1850, was to-day, in due course of law, withdrawn from the office of the Registrar of Deeds and forwarded to the Secretary of State at Ottawa. The petition bears the signature of 1,776 qualified electors of Queens County—about 200 more than is required by law.

THE WALKING TOURNAMENT.—Quite a crowd assembled on the Common, Halifax, on Saturday evening last, to witness Tasse training for Friday's walk. The *Herald* says, considering the rough track, he made good time, doing five miles in 30m. 10s. Private Corners, 101st Regiment, is training quietly, and will no doubt sustain the sporting reputation of his regiment. The other military, naval and civilian pedestrians are getting into form for the contest. John Fransham leaves to-morrow to take part in the tournament. He is in splendid condition, and walked to Mount Stewart and back yesterday for exercise—35 miles.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

NEW YORK, June 7.

The *Herald's* Richmond despatch says: The rumor yesterday is now quite well authenticated, that a duel was fought yesterday near Richmond, between William C. Elam, editor of the *Whig*, and Thomas, son of ex-Governor Wm. Smith. The duel was fought with revolvers. Elam was severely, probably fatally, wounded in the mouth. Smith cannot be found. All parties are extremely reticent.

PARIS, June 7.

The editor of the Paris *Voltaire* fought a duel on Friday with a member of the Jockey Club. The former was wounded.

CABUL, June 7.

It is believed that Abdul Rahman Khan feels uncertain of his power in Turkestan, and also desires to understand exactly what will be required of him if he accepts the Amership. He has not yet paid his troops but they are well fed and content. In the failing of Abdul Rahman Khan the name of the ex-Ameer, Yakoub Khan, is mentioned as the most powerful in Afghanistan.

CANADIAN, June 7.

News from Herat is of continued anarchy and vacillation. Ayoub Khan's troops are still encamped outside the city and disputing who should lead the van, the Cabulis or the Heratis.

PERA, June 7.

Mr. Goschen, the British Ambassador, has promised the Sultan to submit a memorandum setting forth the English proposal regarding administrative reforms.

MADRID, June 7.

The political situation in Spain is getting cloudier daily. The mistakes of Canovas del Castillo's Cabinet are increasing.

DUBLIN, June 7.

Another week of reasonable weather has made still brighter the prospects of the coming harvest in Ireland.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 7.

The Empress died when asleep, and none of the Imperial family were present, as they were not aware that her death was so near. On Saturday the remains were conveyed to the Palace chapel in an open coffin, borne by the Czar and eighteen Grand Dukes. The remains of the Empress were removed to Petropaulovsk Fortress to-day. The Emperor and Grand Duke followed the hearse on horseback.

LONDON, June 7.

A Paris correspondent telegraphs that the Government has resolved to close all Jesuit establishments on the 13th, without further warning.

It is rumored that Prince Napoleon is seriously ill.
