THE MINISTERS' LAME DEFENCE

NEITHER Mr. Fielding, nor Mr. Paterson, nor Sir Louis Davies, last evening, attempted to meet in a manly way the charge of having broken their pre-election pledges to the people.

In the light of this comparison it will be seen that Mr. Fielding tried to convince his intelligent hearers that the identical rates of duty which under Mr. Foster were "highly protective," were "for revenue only" when imposed by himself!

Before the election, Sir Wilfrid Laurier said, "If the Liberals are successful they will cut off the head of protection at the neck, and trample on the body," and Sir Richard Cartwright said, "Our policy is to protect, our policy from now to last has been to destroy this villainous system of protection which has been grinding the vitals out of this country."

In proof of his contention that the present tariff is for revenue only, Mr. Paterson declared that Sir Charles Tupper had received it with great alarm for the manufacturers, and that every Conservative newspaper in the country had condemned it on the ground that it would injure the industrial interests of the country.

Mr. Fielding contends that activity of business and prosperity have been caused by the operation of his tariff, while nothing but hard times and ruin resulted from the tariff of his predecessors.

Having shown that the ministers failed to put in a good defence in respect to their broken promises, protection and other matters, we shall deal with the Government's increased expenditures, Preferential Trade and other matters in a further issue.

PREFERENTIAL TRADE.

It is timely and striking contradiction of the statement of the ministers, last evening, that there is "no chance" of obtaining preferential trade with Great Britain and the rest of the Empire, we have the report that Mr. A. E. Kemp, President of the Toronto Board of Trade, has returned from the congress of chambers of commerce of the Empire in London with the report that the preferential trade idea is making good progress and may easily be brought within range of practical politics.

A SHREWD MAN.

THE Hon. Mr. Fielding is one of the shrewd premiers who refused to come out in 1896 and assist Laurier in his fight. But when Laurier won, he came off the premiership of Nova Scotia and became Financial Minister of Canada.

"That was a pretty thin speech" was the remark of a listener to Mr. Fielding last evening. "Altogether too thin" was the correct reply.

So the Ministers didn't defend themselves against the charge of having broken their pledges. The glib deceivers imagine that they can brazen it out!

If the ladies and boys and supporters of the opposition were taken out of the meeting of last evening a very small audience would have been left to the New Liberal missionaries.

The man who received the greatest applause at the meeting last evening was Mr. Joseph Wise, who is well known as having recently renounced the New Liberal party.

Maine and Vermont have given good Republican majorities in the state elections, and the confidence of the Republicans concerning the result of the Presidential contest, in November, is increased.

Sir Louis Davies scoffs at the idea that the British Government will agree to Mutual Preferential Trade; but he has scoffed at several other grand ideas which have afterwards materialized!

Mr. Paterson appealing, last evening, to the old Liberals not to withdraw their support from the promise breakers because real Liberals had in the past brought about great returns was really funny.

The ministers forgot, when talking about the purchase of the Drummond County Railway, last evening, to say that the Senate saved nearly a million of dollars on that account. But the public won't forget.

Mr. Fielding is the man who bartered away the coal mines of Cape Breton and is responsible for the increased cost of coal. Yet he had no word of explanation or excuse last evening, for the simple reason that no excuse could be given.

Mr. Paterson admitted last evening, that the Government had been confronted by "an able opposition." Yes, and next year the "able opposition" will be on the Government side of the House, ably directing the public affairs of the country.

Mr. Davies—beg pardon, Sir Louis—had much to say last night in favor of Sifton and Blair; but not a word about his dear friend Mr. Tarte. Too bad, that the Master of the Administration was, for the nonce, forgotten by his obedient follower.

Sifton officials are prominent among those mentioned as Liberal candidates in the Northwest. The fact is, as the Gazette remarks, a sign of the times. It points to a scarcity in the Laurier ranks of men that make good standard bearers. As the Yukon administration has shown, Sifton officials are not chosen for their moral shape.

The Montreal Gazette remarks that "There is as much being said in the Liberal press about the relative positions in the Conservative party of Sir Charles Tupper and Mr. Hugh John Macdonald, as it mattered to their opponents who will wear the crown that their leader is evidently afraid of having knocked off his head. Both men understand the situation and the course of their opponents also."

The Finance Minister intimated, last evening, that the election might be held soon or it might be held later a year hence,—if the Government found that they were unpopular. This is in accord with the New Liberal's idea of government by the people. "We'll hold on as long as possible, if we think the people are against us"—is the patriotic resolve of the Laurier-Tarte Administration. Great Liberals, these!
