Six-Year Old Girl Fatally Injured

ELLERSLIE — A six-year-old child, Cynthia Pearl Gillis, daughter of William Gillis, died instantly when struck by a passing car on the highway in front of her home here last night.

The accident occurred at approximately 8 p.m. when it is believed the child darted in front of the late model vehicle driven by commercial traveller, James MacLeod of Moncton, New Brunswick.

The car, at the time of the accident was proceeding west on the Ellerslie Road.

Attending physician was Dr. G. E. Robinson of Tyne Valley.

Coroner Dr. Charles Dewar of O'Leary empaneled a jury of five to determine the cause of the death. The inquest was adjourned to a later date.

Members of the jury are: Douglas Emile LeBlanc, foreman; Edward Roy Hutchinson, Ernest Clinton Hutchinson, George William Noye, all of Ellerslie; George William Ford, Tyne Valley; Bud Stanley Williams, Ellerslie; Elmer Harry Cotton, Northam.

The Summerside RCMP detachment investigated the fatality.

\$140,000 Loan Given For Alberton Centre

OTTAWA — A federal loan of \$140,000 towards the cost of the Alberton community centre was announced here Tuesday by Solicitor General J. Watson MacNaught.

Earlier, Mr. MacNaught had been able to announce that the Alberton project would qualify for assistance under the municipal inventive winter works program but he realized that the major portion of the money needed for lumber and other building materials was a substantial sum requiring further consideration.

The further loan announced Tuesday will enable work to proceed immediately with the community centre and the centre will not only provide recreation and sport facilities for West Prince but will aid farmers in their annual exhibition by providing an arena or possible cattle and livestock auctions.

Mr. MacNaught pointed out that the project has taken on a beneficial flavor by being named after the Jacques Cartier Arena and it is hoped it will be developed as a tourist attraction.

Members of the Alberton committee in charge of the project have expressed themselves as being very pleased to have the matter taken in hand and brought to a successful conclusion said Mr. MacNaught.

The foundation for the arena was laid earlier under the winter works program but work has been stalled for several weeks awaiting word on whether the loan would be made by the federal government.

License Swap Ends In Fine

SUMMERSIDE — For permitting another person to use his driver's license, Donald Joseph Bourque, Sea Cow Pond, was fined \$20 and costs or 15 days by Magistrate Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County magistrate's court yesterday.

Thomas Joseph Bourque, Case Bald, N.B., was given a similar fine when found guilty of operating a vehicle while using another person's license. The charge arose from the same incident.

Bourque was also fined \$20 and costs for possession of liquor not purchased from a vendor.

Lionel Francis Gaudy, S. I. Nicholas, was found guilty of care and control of a motor vehicle while impaired and was fined \$15 and costs.

Charged with stealing a car battery, Daniel Alexander MacLean of Summerside, had his case adjourned for one week for sentencing. The Crown had asked for a jail term as the accused had a previous record.

For driving without due care and attention in a 40 m.p.h. zone, Sheldon Wilson 111, Summerside, was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

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SEAL HUNTERS USE MODERN AIRCRAFT

Three light ski-equipped planes worked all day yesterday transporting men and seal hunting equipment from Alberton to Tad North in the Magdalen Islands in preparation for the annual seal hunting season which opens Thursday. A total of 21 seal hunters from the Alberton and Tigris areas left for Eastern Provincial Airways plane from Charlottetown yesterday and another 13 are scheduled to leave this morning for the Magdalen, near which a huge seal herd is located. The first plane to arrive in Alberton drew large crowds of spectators. They were flown by Douglas C-47s.

HEATH MACQUARRIE, MP for Queens, has expressed satisfaction at the appointment of a permanent superintendent for the Prince Edward Island National Park.

The House of Commons during the past session was urged upon the department of northern affairs and national resources, the appointment of a permanent administrative head for this important park.

C. Arsenault fired a brace while the losers and B. Bagtie picked up a singleton.

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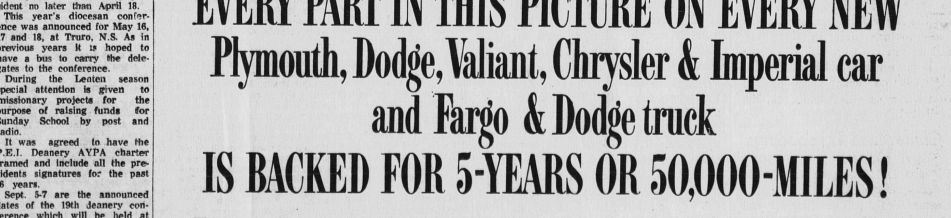
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S'ide RCA Has Acting CO
