Editorial Notes.

Sir Peter Lumsden has asked the promoters of the movement to secure for him a sword of honor, to suspend action till his relations with the War Office are settled.

The following telegram has been received by Lieut.-Col. Oumet, commanding the 6th Battalion and the Edmonton district:

BATTLEFORD, May 28, 1885.

To Lieut.-Col. Oumet, Commanding Edmonton District.

It being the intention of the Government to organize a force to remain on duty in the Northwest for a short time after the suppression of the present troubles, officers and men desirous of volunteering for such service will at once send in their names by their commanding officers to the Assistant Adjutant General.

As soon as the force is organized it is to relieve those who have been engaged in the campaign from the beginning. Some of those will, no doubt, accept the proposition, with the view of settling in the country after awhile, but others are anxious to return, now that the fighting is done.

The Herald is to the rescue of the liquor dealers and the unlawful liquor traffic. The Herald is extremely nice and careful in its choice of terms. It says "as it takes two to drive a trade, the purchaser is a liquor dealer as well as the seller." The Herald is right on this point, we admit. The fate of the liquor dealer who purchases and drinks in excess is definitely described and set forth in the New Testament Scriptures. Should the editor of the Herald require fuller and more particular information on the point, he will no doubt receive it on application to the Bishop or a Priest of the Church. But THE EXAMINER referred to the liquor dealer who sells such stuff as killed Mrs. Vance, etc., in defiance of the law of the land. The death of Mrs. Vance would not have occurred had not the law of the land been violated. This being so, the loss of her life is due to a violator or to violators of the law. Consequently the violator or violators of the law with respect to her caused her death, and are, therefore, guilty of a heinous crime. Even the Herald will not dispute these facts or this conclusion. But further, it is a notorious fact that the case of Mrs. Vance is not singular. Every liquor seller knows that modern liquor, such as is every day sold in Charlottetown, may and will, from time to time, kill those who drink it; and, if so, are we to be charged with "frenzied fanaticism" because we say that, should there be degrees of punishment for the damned, eternal justice will certainly doom the modern liquor dealer to the lowest and hottest pit in hell? Let the public judge.

Supreme Court, Summerside.

SUMMERSIDE, June 17, 1885.

Much interest was shown to day in the trial of Ellen Dalton for stealing the child of Peter Cain. The prisoner is a widow of between 45 and 50 years of age, and the mother of six living children. Her husband died seven years ago.

She was defended at her trial by Mr. Stewart, during which the following curious story was elicited from the witnesses examined:

The prisoner was well known around Lot 7, and was in the habit of working in the farmhouses in the vicinity. It was rumored among the neighbors that she was on rather intimate terms with a young man named McDougall, at whose house she often worked, and would not at all object to having him as a stepfather to her children, and her stay and comfort in old age. On Saturday, the 18th of October last, she visited the house of Richard Cornish, of Bloomfield, Lot 6, and there inquired about the family of Peter Cain, the prosecutor in this suit. She asked the age of his youngest child, and remarked that she had a young child in Charlottetown and was going there to get it, and on that account "was going to have either a man or his money this winter." Cornish thought she referred to McDougall. She then left the house, and during the next night a child, aged seven months, was stolen from the house of its father, Peter Cain. Early next morning the prisoner came to McDougall's but was refused admittance. She then went to her sister's, Mrs. Colper, and brought with her a child, which she said was her's. That evening she went away, taking the child with her, and was arrested on the following morning. On being asked where she got the child she said she bought it from a squaw and paid \$2 for it. The child was taken from her and returned to its parents.

Assuming that she stole the child, the motive assigned is that she wished to persuade McDougall that it was his.

Mr. Stewart made a stirring appeal to the jury, with the result that a verdict of not guilty was returned.

The case of McNitt and Lefurgey against Matilda Crawford, an action of ejectment, was tried this evening. A verdict was given for the plaintiffs.

The New British Ministry.

LONDON, June 16.

The composition of the British Cabinet is practically settled as follows: Marquis of Salisbury, Prime Minister and Foreign Secretary.

Sir Michael Hicks Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer.

Lord Randolph Churchill, Secretary for India.

Sir Richard Assheton Cross, Home Secretary.

Right Honorable Edward Gibson, Lord Chancellor of Ireland.

Right Honorable William Henry Smith, probably Secretary of War.

Col. Frederick Stanley, Secretary for the Colonies.

Earl Carnarvon, or Viscount Cranbrook, Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland.

Sir Stafford Northcote, President of the Council.

It is said the Queen is determined to induce Mr. Gladstone to accept a Peerage.

Her Majesty will offer him a title, and in the event of his refusing it she will confer one on Mr. Gladstone.

Opinions of the Press.

LONDON, June 18.

The Times says Gladstone's refusal to accept an Earldom makes an appeal to the imagination of men that will not remain unanswered.

The Pall Mall Gazette has an editorial couched in angry terms. It says that unless the Marquis of Salisbury wishes to deepen the conviction of Russia that his ministry is a menace of war, he will cancel the appointment of Randolph Churchill as Secretary for India.

The Russians already regard the Marquis of Salisbury's Cabinet with such suspicion that any sudden hitch may cause such a rupture of negotiations now in progress as will result in war.

Sir Vernon Harcourt in a speech said the Tories had at last overthrown the Government by an alliance with the Parnellites with whom they had nothing in common, and were now in an embarrassed position. He hoped the Tories would not negotiate with Russia in the spirit of the late speeches of Lord Randolph Churchill and the Marquis of Salisbury.

Sir Vernon gave assurance however that the Tories should have fair play, and if they labored for peace they should have the support of the Liberal party.

The Tories, he said, might squabble about their leaders, but the Liberals were mobilizing their forces for a great campaign. They would fight for the old causes, and with the old leader, upon whose honored head would be placed a crown of final victory.

Blake on the C. P. R. Loan

OTTAWA, June 18.

Blake spoke last evening six hours against the proposed aid to the Canada Pacific Railway, contending that the company ought not to come to Parliament and ask for readjustment of security for last year's loan, or for the new short loan of the government credit asked for now; but should, on the contrary, take the money deposited with the Government to secure the guarantee of dividends and put it on the road, trusting to the future to provide money for dividends in the future.

He argued that the company had already received several millions more than the total cost of the road.

The Nova Scotia Conference.

LUNenburg, June 18.

The Nova Scotia Methodist Conference commenced its session here yesterday. Rev. John Cassidy was elected President of the Conference and Rev. Cranwick Jost was elected Secretary.

Rev. M. Teasdale goes to Brunswick Street Church, Halifax; Rev. John Lathern, D. D., goes to Amherst; Rev. A. Rogers to Windsor and Rev. Joseph Gaetz to Yarmouth North.

Presbyterian General Assembly.

MONTREAL, June 18.

The Standard Committee yesterday evening reported to the Assembly 72,000 families and 123,450 communicants, of which 3,900 were in Prince Edward Island. The total increase was \$1,574,200, an average of \$12.72 per communicant.

The Sunday Schools contributed to missions during the year.

A German General's Sudden Death

BERLIN, June 18.

Field Marshal Montzenff, Governor General of Alsace-Lorraine, and one of the most famous German generals, died suddenly. On hearing the news, Emperor William said mournfully: "All my old friends are dying."

Cholera in Spain.

MADRID, June 18.

Over five hundred new cases of cholera are reported, and two hundred and ninety deaths have taken place in Spain yesterday. There has been seventy-nine cases and forty-seven deaths in this city up to date.
