Newsprint Production Up

MONTREAL (CP)—The Newsprint Association of Canada Friday reported Canadian newsprint production in August amounted to 4,088,904 tons, an increase of 36,394 tons, or 7.2 per cent over August, 1954.

In the first eight months of the current year, production totalled 4,088,904 tons, an increase of 3.6 per cent over production of 3,944,830 tons in the corresponding period of the previous year.

Canadian shipments in August were 534,621 tons, an increase of 15,777 tons over August, 1954. Total shipments in the first eight months of this year were 4,083,309 tons, against 3,897,086 tons last year.

U. S. SHIPMENTS UP
Shipments to United States, the largest importer of Canadian newsprint, increased 5.5 per cent to 437,776 tons in August and 3.1 per cent to 3,326,637 tons in the eight month period, compared with similar periods in 1954.

In August, total exports amounted to 499,697 tons, against 466,475 tons in August last year. Shipments to the British Isles, Central American and Caribbean were about 16 per cent lower, in August.

Thoughts For Our Time

TOO MANY QUESTION DIVINE WISDOM
At the root of much of our limitations through suffering in its many forms.

However, God allows even the innocent to suffer from physical evils and from the malice and stupidity of others. This is a stumbling block to those who think that God ought to deal with us in the way we think best; and it drives others to despair even of the existence of a merciful God and to consider such a notion as foolishness.

The crowning mercy of God is the answer He gave to this problem. The answer was given in terms that we can understand but which always become more meaningful to us in proportion to our sincerity in meditating upon it. The answer is the triumph of the Innocent One who suffered upon the Cross on Calvary.

DIVINE "FOOLISHNESS"?
The Cross has always been a stumbling block to those who expect God to help them in their way not in His; and it has always been foolishness to those who are too timid to think of it as an expression of the love and generosity of a merciful God. God alone can instruct us adequately.

When people are led by the facts of evil and suffering, to deny the existence of a merciful God they often try to substitute other values and ideals in their lives and usually these relate to me freedom or other. If they would but consider seriously our most basic freedom, freedom of choice, freedom to love or not to love, they would see that the evil they resent is the price of that freedom.

In God there is freedom, not with regard to Himself for He must know His own infinite goodness, but with regard to creatures. In creating us after His own image and likeness, God is so generous that He creates us in a state in which it is possible for us to reply freely to His generosity.

HE trusts us so much that He postpones the vision of His compelling splendor and so gives us an opportunity to be generous with Him as He is with us. We are given a chance to share in a limited way in God's free creativity. Our freedom and independence is limited by the fact that as creatures our happiness is to be found outside of ourselves in God and can be achieved only by His guidance and help.

However, our freedom to accept that help or not, is so real that God respects our refusal and so precious that, rather than diminish that freedom in any way, God prefers to correct our presumption by letting us suffer the consequences of our own mistakes—that is, by having us learn
