TALL SHOOTING!

Success of Canadian Team!

LONDON, July 25. Canadian riflemen can well afford to throw up their caps and cheer for their representatives over here who have been doing some tall shooting yesterday and to-day. Although beaten by the Mother country for the Kalopore cup, the Dominion riflemen being second, scooped in \$400, the prize offered by the Maharajah for the highest Colonial team. In the Corporation of London match the Canucks had it all their own way. The grand Silver Cup, valued at \$100, was won by Private J. E. Hutcheson, of the 43rd battalion, and becomes his exclusive property. In the same match Lieut. Smith, of St. John Rifles, won \$100; Staff Sergt. Ogg, of Guelph, and Capt. Bishop, of Halifax, \$75 each; Major Garrison, of Halifax, Private Hora, of 14th Kingston, Capt. H. H. Gray, of the Guards, Ottawa, and Sergt. Hall, of the 79th Batt., Wanderloo, Quebec, won \$70 each; Sergt. Henderson, 62nd, St. John, \$10; Capt. Busted, 3rd Victoria, Private Windall, of the 44th Bowmanville, Private Davies, of the Royal Grenadiers, and Corp. Morris, of the 13th Hamilton, \$25 each. In the Maritime Association match, Major Garrison, of Halifax, won \$10; and in the Graphic match, Capt. Busted, Sergt. Ogg and Lieut. Smith won \$10 each. In the All-comers' aggregate Corp. Morris and Capt. Gray won \$10 each. In the grand aggregate Smith, Hutcheson and Ogg won \$25 each; in the Association prizes Busted won \$15, and Hutcheson, Lieut. Manning, 62nd St. John, N. B., Bishop, Garrison and Henderson \$10 each. In the Pavilion match Henderson \$10, Ogg \$10; in the Penbright match Garrison \$10; in the R. bin Hood match Hutcheson \$15; in the ladies match Ogg \$25; in the Cunningham match Capt. Longworth, P. E. I. Artillery, \$20. The total winnings of the Canadian team for the two days aggregate nearly \$1,800.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, July 25. The exports for the past twelve months reach the grand total of \$94,389,000, an increase of \$8,375,000 in the year. This is better than any year since 1883. The return of imports will not be known for several weeks, but the value of goods entered for home consumption, exclusive of British Columbia is \$107,969,000, an increase of two million and a half. Applications for railway legislation next session are commencing to come in. Adam Brown, commissioner to the Jamaica exhibition will visit the Maritime Provinces in about three weeks time.

Prisoner Escaped.

DORCHESTER, N. B., July 25. Beloni Cyr, sentenced at Madawhake to two years in the Dorchester Penitentiary, escaped this afternoon. He was working with an outside gang and had but five months left of his sentence to serve. The guards are in hot pursuit.

HALIFAX, July 25. The Boston, the new steamer of the Yarmouth Steamship Co., leaves Glasgow on Friday next and will call at Halifax with passengers.

QUEBEC, July 25. Col. L. G. Desjardines was to-day elected in Montmorency by a small majority, somewhere about 69.

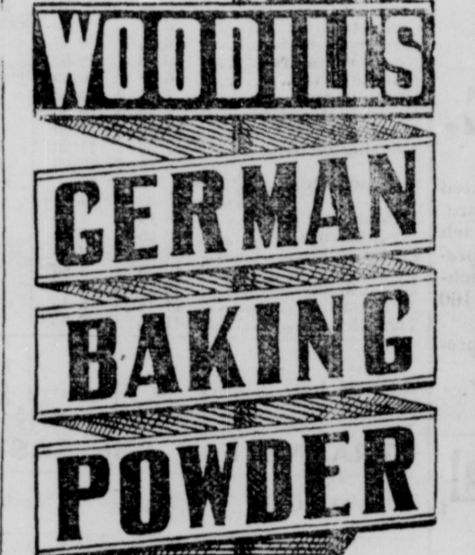
