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The Administrator's Speech.

The following draft of the Speech of His Honour the Administrator of the Government, to be delivered at the opening of the Legislature to-morrow, contains a great deal more truth and wisdom, and fewer grammatical errors, than are usually found in speeches from the throne:

Mr. President and Honourable gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and gentlemen of the House of Assembly:

The continued and lamented illness of His Honour, the Lieutenant Governor, necessitating his absence from the Province, is a lucky thing for the Government; for if he were here to-day it would be his duty to clearly explain to you why he reserved and practically vetoed the Garryman Mortgage Vote Bill. This would be decidedly awkward for the Responsible Advisers, who, despite the effort they were given, continue to hold on to office.

The harvest of the past year was not up to anticipation. Crops of wheat and oats were, alike, somewhat disappointing to our farmers; and their neglect to comply with the provisions of a statute familiarly known as "The Bug Act," resulted in the loss of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor. Hay and other crops were, however, excellent, and prices were rather higher than the averages. For these and all other blessings and benefits I ask you to give thanks.

An impetus has been given to the dairy industry by the Dominion Government, and a number of cheese factories are to be erected and operated. I regret that my ministers have not fulfilled their promise to supply a travelling dairy. The Government have supported an important Durham bull of excellent pedigree and admirable physique. The heroic exertions of my Ministers, have, however, been rewarded. There will be the usual number of calves for distribution over the three counties.

The public accounts of the past year are not yet to hand, though an act was specially passed to provide for their early publication and distribution. You are not, therefore, in a position to judge of the actual financial position of the Province. I may, however, inform you (confidentially, of course) that though my ministers did as little as they could do—the principal public work of the year being the erection of a shed at the end of Prince Street Ferry Wharf—the deficit at the close of the year was upwards of \$50,000. All the debentures issued by my Government have been sold at prices lower than those obtained by the City of Charlottetown. Yet the Provincial Building has not been repaired according to promise and the accounts at the Banks are considerably overdrawn. As a consequence of your persistent refusal to reduce the cost of legislation and of the loss of revenue from the Land Office, which has been wrecked and demoralized by reason of unfair and reckless discounts, you will be required to provide for direct taxation, in the future, amounting to about \$100,000 a year. I ask you, as you value the independence of the Province, to prepare a measure providing against such a union with New Brunswick or Nova Scotia.

Mr. President and Honourable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council: Mr. Speaker and Honourable Gentlemen of the House of Assembly: I trust that the truths which I have imparted to you will sink deeply into your hearts; and that, relying upon Divine Providence, you will at once manfully endeavor to rectify, as far as possible, the results of past follies and neglects, to the end that the continued independence of the Province, which we all hold dear, may be preserved.
