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## Policy Participation Of Youth Stressed By Liberal Leader

Provincial Liberal Leader Alex Campbell said last night his party places "important stress" on the participation of youth in forming the policies of the Liberal party. He was addressing a meeting of the Fourth District Liberal Association at Eldon Hall. Mr. Campbell, however, emphasized that participation of youth "was not to preclude the advice and experience of age." He went on to remind the meeting that statistics indicate that the youth of the province "play an extremely influential role in any election." He said that about 40 per cent of the voters are under the age of 25, according to a national survey. Mr. Campbell also called for a "complete review of the taxation structure of the province," "with particular emphasis on detailed study" of the rural land tax set-up. "Money must come from somewhere," said Mr. Campbell, "to finance the government services but it is quite conceivable that a more equitable system of taxation may be the product of study by specialists in the taxation field."

### Wishing Well Yields \$1,209

The "Wishing Well" constructed by Col. E.W. Johnston at his home, "Woodleigh" in Burlington, and designated by him as a means of raising funds for the Red Cross in this province, produced the sum of \$1,209.50 during the past summer, according to Red Cross officials. "Woodleigh" has now become one of the Island's leading tourist attractions, and the well produces a larger amount of money each year for Red Cross as the result of the increase in the number of visitors. In the past fourteen years since Colonel Johnston set up the "Wishing Well", it has been the means of raising \$7,293.97 towards Red Cross activities in Prince Edward Island. Each year since 1952, the sum from the well has almost doubled. In 1965 it was \$116.63 and reached its peak in 1964 when it produced \$1,271.47. "It has truly been a goldmine for Red Cross in this province," was the comment made by a Red Cross representative.

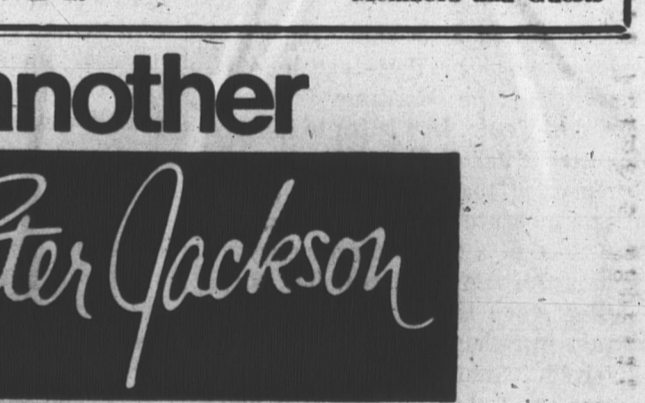
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
