An increase of 24 in the number of accidents reported in the province for the month of July this year, as compared with the same month in 1955 is indicated in a release of accident statistics by J. A. Gallant, Registrar of Motor Vehicles.

During the month 103 accidents were reported as against 79 last year. A breakdown by counties as compiled by P. W. Barlow, Examiner indicates that 43 accidents occurred in Prince County, including Summerside, 28 in Queens, 18 in King's and 14 in Charlottetown. It may be noted that Charlottetown and elsewhere in Queens totals 42.

A further classification of the accidents shows that one was fatal 32 non-fatal and 70 resulted in property damage only. Two American and two Canadian cars from outside the Province were involved.

In July 1955 there were two fatal accidents, 23 non-fatal and 54 resulted in property damage only. Commenting on the situation Mr. Gallant said that the great majority of the accidents were caused by human error. "Many could be avoided if drivers would be more careful and use more courtesy in driving on the highways."

Stevenson Calls Republican Tax Cut Promise Only Talk

By ERNEST B. VACCARO LIBERTYVILLE, III. (AP)—Adlai Stevenson Wednesday dismissed Republican tax reduction promises to "just so much election talk" and a reversal of President Eisenhower's own opposition cuts.

The Democratic presidential nominee, warning up for a "person-to-person" stump tour covering every crucial state, also contended the Republicans are putting a "balanced budget" ahead of education, defence, agriculture and the "menace of communism in the world" in their effort to reelect Eisenhower.

He said that the national debt had been increased by \$13,000,000,000 under the Eisenhower administration and former Democratic president Truman reduced it by \$12,000,000,000 while he was in office.

WEARS FADED JEANS
The former Illinois governor, again wearing the faded blue jeans which mark his regular attire at his farm home near here, let loose his onslaught against the Republican national convention from the recreation room of his home.

His daily press conference preceded the visit of James A. Finnegan, his campaign director, and Chairman Paul Butler of the Democratic national committee to wrap up plans for a flying tour of the country next week to lay the groundwork for an uninterrupted election drive leading right up to the eve of the voting in November.

Actual campaigning will get under way Labor Day, Sept. 3, when he will speak in Detroit under the auspices of labor organizations in that area.

But he is counting heavily on lighting the fires for Democratic hopes in conferences starting next Monday with state and local leaders and even ward workers aimed at getting out the party vote.

'GHOST' STOPS WEDDING

ASTI, Italy (AP) — The priest was at the altar and the organ was playing Mendelssohn's wedding march as Veglia Bonis, 34, entered the church to wed Giuseppe Tabacchetti, 42. Suddenly the bride shouted and ran out. She said she had seen an apparition of her deceased father, warning: "Go back, go back, unlucky girl." The ceremony was cancelled. Miss Bonis said she had changed her mind about getting married.

WINNIPEG (CP)—The federal government's "do nothing attitude" is systematically driving farmers into bankruptcy, Jake Schulz, chairman of the Interprovincial Farm Union Council said Tuesday.

In a press statement on his return from a 10-week organizational tour of the West, Mr. Schulz said:

"Our Canadian farm communities are gradually heading for economic collapse, an obvious and serious condition which is being carelessly disregarded by a government that apparently has neither sympathy nor feeling for the men of the soil."

The federal government acknowledged its responsibility to the fisherman by making the self-employed eligible for unemployment insurance, "but when will they remember the forgotten farmers, who have in the past five years been reduced to the position of walking an economic tightrope, and do something to establish farm prices that have a fair relationship with other prices?"

Farmers in northern Saskatchewan are leaving "like rats off a ship," Mr. Schulz said.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The navy reported Wednesday night that one of its patrol planes was shot down by "unidentified aircraft" 160 miles north of Formosa.

The announcement said that the P-4M1 Mercator patrol plane was on "routine flight" about 32 miles off the China coast, "over international waters" when it reported it was under attack.

The P-4M1 normally carries a crew of nine.

Some Insects More Civilized

MONTREAL (CP) — Some insects are more civilized, socially speaking, than others. The distinction holds true even among various branches of the so-called social insects.

The female is the organizer. Scientists at the 10th international congress of entomology Wednesday heard some details of social life evolution of bees, wasps, ants, termites and allied insects.

All these to greater or lesser degree live in groups or colonies composed of parents and offspring, and labor is divided.

One apparent rule: If several female bees of certain types get together, their queen have the house-keeping and other chores split up.

Dr. Charles D. Michener of the University of Kansas at Lawrence said it appears that the evolution of social behavior in the bees is the result of parent co-operation rather than parent-child co-operation.

Some bee types lived alone. Others lived in small groups, sharing guard duty, foraging for food and each having separate egg clusters. In other colonies, one female laid the eggs while perhaps the older females gathered food and the younger one stood guard. Sins and spinsterhood might have some part to play in labor tasks.
