N.B. Conservative Leader To Retire

FREDERICTON, Oct. 26 (CP)—Hugh Mackay today announced his intention to retire as leader of the Progressive Conservative Party in New Brunswick after next year's session of the Legislature.

He made the announcement at the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Progressive Conservative Association, his successor may be chosen at a convention next summer.

Mr. Mackay said he would attend the 1951 Legislative session. The matter of resigning his Kings County seat would depend upon the political situation when a new party leader was chosen.

Mr. Mackay was first elected to the Legislature in 1939. He became Opposition leader in the House the following year and was chosen Provincial party leader at a general convention in 1942. He is 62 years old.

Ralph C. McInerney, Saint John, was elected president of the New Brunswick Progressive Conservative Association at the annual meeting. He succeeded E. C. Atkinson, K.C., Fredericton. Mr. McInerney was a Saint John City member of the Legislature from 1939 to 1948.

Labor Income At New All-Time Peak

OTTAWA, Oct. 26 (CP)—Canadian labor income, boosted by more work and higher pay rates, hit another new all-time peak in July.

The total of \$691,000,000 registered a new high for the second successive month, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics reported today.

It compares with the previous high of \$683,000,000 in June and with \$649,000,000 in July of last year. All industrial groups shared in the rise in labor income.

The total for manufacturing advanced in the month from \$214,000,000 a year earlier to \$231,000,000. In utilities, transportation, communication, storage and trade, the July figure stood at \$122,000,000, as compared with \$172,000,000. The construction figure for July was \$34,000,000 compared with \$46,000,000 for the previous July.

Labor income in agriculture, logging, fishing, trapping and mining in July increased to \$62,000,000 from \$51,000,000 in July, 1949, but declined in the seven-month period to \$315,000,000 from \$328,000,000.

(Continued from Page 1) arly follow that allocation and priority controls provided for in the pact will be carried out to the same extent in Canada as in the U. S.

It was only the "end result" that had to be similar. How Canada achieved that result was a matter for Canada to decide by consultation with the U. S.

"Canada," he said, "is a more compact country and does not require the same controls machinery."

Wherever there were signs of scarcity controls would be instituted. There were growing signs of scarcity in aluminum and nickel and the latter commodity already was under a voluntary form of control, the Minister noted.

The U. S. plan applies generally to any structure designed for "amusement, recreational or entertainment purposes." It covers such things as theatres, race tracks, ball parks, summer camps and ski lodges, pool halls and football stadia.

Immediate Protest

There was an immediate protest from the Associated General Contractors of America. The contractors claimed the order—which carries a notice of possible further curbs—jeopardizes "all construction" and is "far more drastic than anything in the Second World War."

The National Production Authority was also busy on other segments of the home front. A possible 20-to-30-per-cent cut is being studied in the use of aluminum, copper and nickel in civilian goods such as radios, television sets, refrigerators, washing machines and vacuum cleaners, the agency announced.

At the same time, N. P. A. issued a compulsory allocation order requiring the steel industry to ship 310,000 tons of steel monthly to car builders to provide upwards of 10,000 new freight cars a month.

A warning of further toughness to come was issued by N. P. A. administrator William H. Harrison. In a statement he said: "It will be the policy of N. P. A. to further limit or prohibit construction of additional types of projects which do not further the defence effort or increase the nation's productive capacity."

Island Oysters To Be Featured At R.A.C. Function

Several boxes of Prince Edward Island's finest oysters have been forwarded to the Royal Automobile Club of Canada, Montreal, by Brig. W. W. Reid, director of the P.E.I. Travel Bureau and will be featured on the menu at the Club's annual oyster party this afternoon.

Several years ago Mr. Justice A. E. Arsenault instituted the practice of presenting the Club with a shipment of Island oysters and the resulting annual oyster parties have been attended every year by officials of the C.N.R. and C. P. R., the leading steamship companies, representatives of Provincial and municipal governments, executives of hotels, bus lines, Chambers of Commerce, consulates, etc., as well as executives of the Montreal Tourist and Convention Bureau and R.A.C. Club directors.

The publicity has been highly valuable in popularizing the superior quality of Island oysters in Central Canada.

In acknowledging receipt of the Island oysters this year, Mr. George A. McNamee, the Club manager, has invited Brig. Reid and Judge Arsenault to attend this afternoon's function, and it is understood that they are both planning to do so.

Arrangements are also being made by Brig. Reid to have an Island Oyster Party in Montreal early in December.

Errol Flynn Is Ordered To Bed

NICE, France, Oct. 26 (AP)—Doctors today ordered Errol Flynn to bed for five days to give his bruised back a chance to heal.

The 41-year-old actor slipped and fell on a rain-swept dock Tuesday night while boarding a motorboat with his bride, the former Patrice Wymore. Flynn's injury was described as painful but not serious.

A spokesman at Gen. MacArthur's headquarters, from which come all the Allied orders in this war, commented only: "The mission of the United Nations forces is to clear Korea."

The U. S. Far East Air Force gave a further check, announcing it had moved its "bomb line" in Southwest Korea up to the Manchurian border from the former line drawn 12 miles south.

Chinese In Action?

A U. S. Eighth Army spokesman made a qualified statement on South Korean reports of Chinese Communist participation in the Korean fighting.

The spokesman said "there is no evidence of overt or open support of North Korea by Chinese Communist forces."

A Korean republican spokesman had quoted two prisoners he said were Chinese that three Chinese Red battalions were fighting South Koreans near Onjong, 50 miles inside Korea.

The Eighth Army spokesman said the prisoners were in North Korean uniform. But he added that the Eighth Army was carefully investigating the prisoners' statements that Chinese Reds were in the fight and that 20,000 of them had entered Korea from Manchuria.

Eighth army officers said thousands of Koreans have lived for generations in Manchuria and served in the Chinese Communist Army.

(Continued from Page 1) taken place. The Schuman Plan (by Foreign Minister Robert Schuman of France) is a radical departure from current developments in Europe."

Commerce Secretary Charles Sawyer of the U. S., who also participated, said a "pooled effort is our objective." He told reporters that for all purposes the restrictive "buy" act of 1934, which in the American act of 1934, which in the past has obstructed the U. S. from placing arms orders in Canada, now can be forgotten.

The notes were signed by Hume Wrong, Canada's Ambassador to the U. S., and State Secretary Dean Acheson, as movie cameras rolled and photo flashlights popped.

The principles signed are these: 1. All barriers which impede the flow of arms and equipment between the two countries will be removed "as far as possible."

2. A co-ordinated program of requirements, production and procurement will be developed "in order to achieve an optimum production of goods essential for the common defence."

3. As it becomes necessary, both countries will "institute co-ordinated controls over the distribution of scarce raw materials and supplies."

4. The Canada-U. S. emergency controls will be "mutually to achieve comparable effects in each country. Consultations will be held whenever one country institutes controls which may affect the other."

5. Technical knowledge and productive skills, involved in joint defence production, will be "freely exchanged" where feasible. Howe said this did not include atomic energy "at the moment."

(A comparatively-free post war exchange of atomic information has taken place between Canada, the United States and the United Kingdom. However, a general tightening-up in this exchange took place last year when it was discovered that a British atomic spy, Dr. Klaus Fuchs, had passed secret atomic data to the Russians.)

6. If implementation of the agreement causes financial or foreign exchange problems, these will be the basis for consultation by "appropriate agencies" of the two governments.

Acheson, in a statement, recalled the successful development of the 1941 Hyde Park declaration between the late Prime Minister MacKenzie King of Canada and the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt of the U. S.

That declaration, written on the back of an envelope, opened the way for increased U. S. arms orders in Canada, providing Canada with more dollars with which to buy American arms.

The group of six principles, now developed, "reaffirms, reinvigorates" the principles of the war-time agreement, which "played so vast a part in enabling our two countries to make a common effort in the last war," Acheson said.

Howe said the Canadian Government welcomes the agreement, "a major step in our joint effort to strengthen the defences of North America and the entire free world."
