Funeral Of Mrs. Ernest D. Peake

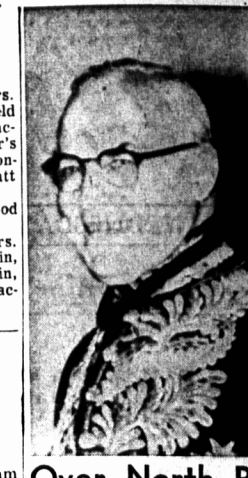

(Continued from page 1) hopes that there will not be any lengthy delay in bringing this social service to our people.

"The matter which we now wish to discuss is one of a controversial nature and one which has a number of serious and important aspects. The situation existing in the Province last summer after a number of our towns went on fast time in defiance of Provincial legislation was most annoying and unsatisfactory to rural people in particular. In our opinion the offending towns acted in contempt of Parliament and their Town Councils set a most unfortunate example of disregard for law and order.

"There are conditions and situations which may at times justify the use of fast time. These conditions likely exist in wartime. In peacetime workers in large cities where much time is being lost in going to and returning from work may have a valid claim for consideration. Cities which are located in the Eastern portion of a Time Zone may receive some benefit but we would point out that neither of these conditions exist in this Province and would suggest that our towns are confusing their wants and their needs."

all phases of the farming operation. This will, of course, include efficiency in marketing. Efficiency in marketing will not only give the farmer a fairer return for his product but will, in addition, provide the consumer food at prices uninflected by unnecessary costs and inefficient practices.

"There is a great volume of work to do in servicing, promoting, and extending the Island Institute programme. We know that present and past officials in the central office have been tireless workers and have in many cases given far more of their time and energy than the normal call of duty would dictate. We understand that certain replacements on the Staff are imminent and would suggest the very best is none too good for this service. We feel that the most experienced and most capable people should be employed and that cost should not be the deciding factor with respect to providing Staff for the administration and servicing of the Women's Institutes in this Province.

"No one questions the importance and value of education either for young or old. The tremendous increase in the sum total of human knowledge during the past twenty-five years and in the complexity of modern civilization suggests to us the importance of continuing education for those who received a minimum of formal and academic education in their youth. We believe that society has educational responsibilities so far as the adult is concerned and it is a necessity to provide adult education for our rural people in the most generous manner possible.

"The variety of groups and organizations that are interested in adult education suggests the importance of having a person trained in this field to assist in coordinating and directing these activities. For these and other reasons which need not be enumerated in detail, we would hope that the position of Director of Adult Education would be filled at an early date with the most interested and competent person available.

Malenkov Will Visit Britain

LONDON (Reuters)—Britain in the next few weeks will play host to three of Russia's top political leaders, it was disclosed Tuesday when the foreign office announced that Georgi Malenkov, former Soviet premier, is expected here next week.

Plans were already set for a visit by the present premier, Marshal Nikolai Bulganin, and the secretary of the Communist party, Nikita Khrushchev, who are due in Britain April 18.

Malenkov, now minister for electric power stations, will head a delegation of electrical experts who will study the British system. He also will discuss with British authorities the impending visit of his chiefs.

SOME PROTESTS

The British government is proceeding with plans for the tour despite some public protests against entertaining such an outspoken critic of the British way of life as Khrushchev. Arrangements have been made for them to be received by Queen Elizabeth during their eight-day visit.

FORMER PM

Malenkov is not known to have visited any western countries before. He resigned a year ago as Soviet prime minister, a post he had held for almost two years following the death of Stalin. He still appears to have a prominent role in Russia's "collective leadership."

The Russian delegation will visit all British major power projects during a visit lasting about three weeks. It will arrive on or about March 18.

SNOW REMOVAL

Mr. MacKay said that the present winter was quite a lot different from that which the Province has been used to during the past few years. He said that there were people who would urge that working road machinery be kept working as late as they could in the Fall and there were others who criticized the Department when the machines were not in operation as snow plows when the storms came.

He told of the increase in the snow fighting equipment from three plows in use in 1936 to 20 now in use today. He said that the value of the machinery now owned by the Department totalled over \$2,000,000. He said, "we have more roads per capita and more plows per capita than any other Province in Canada and I know that we are doing a far better job of keeping our roads clear than in any other Province."

TWO WAY RADIO

Speaking of the installation of radio phones in snow plows Mr. MacKay said that when this matter was first brought to the attention of the Department, it was given careful consideration and it was decided that any advantages gained therefrom would be outweighed by the interference that would result from their use.

He predicted that every one who thought they had a need for snow removed would be trying to contact the plows. He said it was difficult enough now trying to look after the plows but if the phones were installed they would be all over the country.

To Bench

MARKETING

In regard to marketing, Mr. Cullen said, "We should have a Marketing Act that will set up a definite marketing agency or a board will operate. When these conditions are met, the board would be a farmer's board with no interference from the Government."

REFORESTATION

Mr. Cullen said that in 1952 the Government had planted beds of pine and larch trees so that the corner of the Province of these trees available for planting throughout the Province. He said that an advertisement would appear in the press shortly. A small charge will be made for the trees but not enough to deter anyone from buying them.
