##### SAPPER FURZE'S GOOD WORK IN TYRO MATCH.

##### An Indian Mummy.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 27.—Harlan I Smith, who represents the American Museum of Natural History in New York, has been on the coast for three months looking up Indian relics. He arrived here yesterday afternoon from the Harrison lake district, where he made the strangest find of all—a well preserved mummy, which he says may be over a thousand years old. He says it is without doubt a dead Indian chieftain. He sent the body to New York. The discovery was made two days ago, when he came across a stone bearing a hieroglyphical inscription. It did not take him long to ascertain that this was the door of a hermetically sealed cave. The cave had been cut out of a rock. The body was preserved in just the same manner as an Egyptian mummy.

##### Chamberlain Accused

PARIS, Aug. 27.—The Temps accuses Mr Chamberlain, the British Secretary of State for the Colonies, of attempting to force a war with the Transvaal. It says that every time the Government at Pretoria takes a step forward, the Uitlanders take two backward, so it seems impossible for a settlement to be reached.

##### GOLD-SEEKERS IN NEED

Lured to Desolate County by Tales of Wealth, They Lose All.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 27.—Though not paupers, forty-eight middle Western men whose search for gold in the Kotzebue Sound district reduced them to physical and financial distress have asked the Seattle Chamber of Commerce to use its influence to give them half-rate transportation to their homes. All of them have had the scurvy, either in violent or mild form.

A terrible story of hardships endured on their way overland from the Cowak river to transportation connection with St. Michael is told by A. A. Weaver, leader of the party.

He says he personally knows of the death from scurvy, starvation and drowning of 93 of the 950 men who went to Kotzebue Sound last year. Their names, however, he cannot remember.

##### United States and Jamaica.

KINGSTON, Jam, Aug. 27.—The terms of the provisional reciprocity treaty negotiated with Mr. Kasson, the American Reciprocity Commissioner, by a Jamaica delegation last month have leaked out. Under the new reciprocal agreement the United States is to reduce the duty on sugars by 12 1/2 per cent. and to remove from oranges, citrus fruits, and pineapples 20 per cent of the present tariff. Jamaica, in return, surrenders import duties on American goods to the amount of \$120,000 annually, twice as valuable a concession as the islanders expected a month ago would be made. This provision of the agreement is sure to be as distasteful to the British manufacturers as the United States' concession will be to the American sugar planters and orange growers, but Jamaica's prosperity has had to be consulted, and the Colonial Office is looking to subsidize steamship lines to nullify the arrangements effect prejudicial to British interests.

The provisional arrangement, besides being ratified by the United States Senate must be confirmed by the Colonial Legislature and the Home Government.

##### Statue of Mr. McKenzie.

OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 27.—The statue of Alexander Mackenzie, which it is proposed to erect on Parliament square, will be well worthy of the prominent position it is to occupy. Photographs of the statue and base have been received at the Department of Public Works. The Liberal statesman is represented in the attitude of addressing the House, his right hand slightly raised, his features betokening the grave earnestness which was his chief characteristic in debate. Two allegorical figures grace the pedestal, representing industry and integrity—a youth compass in hand, poring diligently over a chart, and a heroic feminine figure holding a shield which bears the legend "Duty was his law, and Conscience his ruler." From base to crown the statue will be at least 25 feet high.

##### NEWS NOTES.

The Venezuelan arbitration continues to drag its slow length along at Paris.

It is expected that the wheat crop of New Brunswick the present season will be forty per cent. greater than that of the past year.

Friday last was a hot day in London. The temperature went up to 90 in the shade and a dozen cases of sun stroke were reported before noon.

The shipment of new Manitoba wheat weighing 52 pounds to the bushel, is reported. The quality of the 1899 crop is likely to be as good as the quantity is great.

The United States official estimate is that every soldier in the Philippines costs a thousand dollars a year. With an army of 65,000 men in occupation, or trying to be in occupation, the rental will come high.

##### Boer Sympathy in Amsterdam.

AMSTERDAM, Aug. 27.—A meeting of 4,000 persons was held here on Friday, at which the president of the Chamber of Commerce presided, to give expression to the feeling of sympathy with the Transvaal in its dispute with Great Britain. A resolution was adopted declaring that the Transvaal had a right to sovereign nationality, and that those who were pressing for war were mostly wrong informed. It added that it was believed that a majority of the English people did not want injustice to be done to the Boers.

##### Rush of Americans.

LONDON, Aug. 28.—This city is crowded with Americans who express an intense desire to return home, and are unable to do so. The steamship offices are crowded to the doors every day, and the officials are worried out of their lives through their efforts to satisfy applicants for passages.
