OBITUARY.—By reference to the obituary column it will be seen that Captain Bernard McCarey died at his residence in this city yesterday. The deceased was well known in the community. He held the position of captain of the steamer "Heather Belle" for many years, and in this position—by his genial and obliging disposition—made many friends, who will regret to hear of his early demise.

A SPECIAL to the Herald says there is good reason to believe an attempt to steal the bodies of Napoleon III. and the Prince Imperial is just discovered at Chislehurst. Howard Vincent has sent down several special detectives from London to watch the Imperial Mortuary Chapel and hopes are entertained that persons who planned the attempt will shortly be apprehended. It is believed that the person in question is a woman and a personal enemy of the Empress, but nothing certain is yet known. The affair has of course been carefully kept quiet lest the criminal or criminals concerned should take alarm and escape.

THE funeral of the late Colonel McGill took place from his late residence to Sherwood Cemetery by train at 2.30 this afternoon. It was attended by four companies of the 82nd Battalion, in uniform, the Caledonian Club in regalia, and a very large procession of citizens.
