THE WRECKED ASSAYE.—A Yarmouth despatch in an American paper says: "Nearly one half of the cargo of the Elder-Dempster line steamship Assaye, Liverpool to St. John, which was wrecked on Blonde Rock April 5th, has been saved in a damaged condition. Eighteen hundred cases of oranges and a large amount of dry goods have been landed here, but much of the cargo was appropriated by hundreds of fishermen from Seal Island and vicinity. They looted the cabins and carried off all the furniture while the officers of the vessel were ashore. The loss on account of this coast piracy amounts to several thousand dollars. Orders have been issued to have the vessel condemned, and she will be broken up by the wreckers if a storm does not do it beforehand. The Assaye was wrecked on the identical spot upon which the steamers Ottawa and St. George came to grief several years ago."

THE MANUSCRIPT OF THE "MAYFLOWER."

The log of the Mayflower is to be given to the people of the United States, and to be deposited in Pilgrim Hall at Plymouth, Massachusetts, or in some other safe place to be designated by the President. Everybody knows about the Mayflower, but comparatively few Americans ever heard of the log. In truth the manuscript that is coming is not a log although it has received that nickname. It is an account of the voyage of the Mayflower, and a history of the Plymouth colony from 1602 to 1646, written by Governor William Bradford, and handed down in his family through at least four generations. Massachusetts was originally a part of the Diocese of London, and this manuscript with others, found its way to the library of the See of London, where it was discovered in 1846. It contains a registry of births, marriages, and deaths of Pilgrims, and records about their property. At the desire of the government of Massachusetts, the American Antiquarian Society, the Massachusetts Historical Society, the Pilgrim Society of Plymouth, and the New England Society of New York the President, through the Ambassador, asked that it be given to the United States. The Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of London backed the ambassador's request, and on March 25 a Consistory Court of the Diocese of London determined to gratify the President's wish, and to hand over the log to Mr. Bayard whenever he was ready to receive it. The only conditions of the transfer that a photographic, certified copy of the book shall be left with the present custodians of it, and that the original shall be put in a safe place where persons concerned can have access to it.—Harper's Weekly.

A By-law for allowing a Rate of Discount on the Assessments on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general civic purposes for the current year ending the thirty-first day of December A. D. 1897.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:— 1st. A discount at the rate of Two and One-half Per Cent shall be allowed to all taxpayers who shall, on or before the Fifteenth day of July next, A. D. 1897, pay to the City Clerk, at his office, the taxes severally due by them for the current year on Real Estate and Personal Property for civic purposes.

A By-law for levying and specifying the rate of assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property in the City of Charlottetown for general Civic purposes under Statute 51 Victoria, Chapter 12.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:— 1st. The rate of assessment on Real Estate for general Civic purposes under said Statute, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1897, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1897, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate, as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and of all persons liable to pay Poll Tax thereon made and duly returned by them on the fourth day of March, A. D. 1897.

2nd. The rate of assessment on Personal Property for such general Civic purposes, for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1897, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1897, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.

A By-Law for Levying and Specifying the Rate of Assessment on Real Estate and Personal Property and Poll in the City of Charlottetown for a Waterworks Fund, under Statute 50th Victoria, Chapter 8.

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlottetown as follows:— 1st. The rate of Assessment on Real Estate for a Waterworks Fund under said Statute for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1897, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1897, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Real Estate as assessed by the Assessors of the said City of Charlottetown in the general Assessment Book and Valuation Roll of all Real Estate and Personal Property liable to taxation in said City, and all persons liable to pay Poll Tax thereon made and duly returned by them on the fourth day of March, A. D. 1897.

2nd. The rate of Assessment on Personal Property for such Water Works Fund for the year commencing the first day of January, A. D. 1897, and ending the thirty-first day of December, A. D. 1897, is hereby specified and fixed at the rate of one-eighth of one per cent on every dollar of the value of Personal Property as assessed by the Assessors of the said City in the said General Assessment Book and Valuation Roll, made and duly returned by them as aforesaid.
