The Premier and Prohibition.

PATRONAGE IN THE CAUCUS ROOM

What will the Contractors Do?

OTTAWA, March 25.—At the Conservative caucus, held yesterday, it was decided to move an amendment to the Franchise Bill in favor of Federal control and a simple and cheaper method. It is proposed to do all that is possible in committee to bring about this result.

Senator Ferguson left yesterday to take part in the West Prince election.

Dr. Carman, with a Methodist delegation, waited on Sir Wilfrid Laurier to urge him not to mix other questions up with the plebiscite.

The Premier spoke at length but did not show much light unless by the words: "Everything incident to the issue must go in."

Hon. Mr. Fielding wanted to know if the delegation wanted to conceal the effects of Prohibition?

Yesterday a caucus of Liberal members devoted the whole morning to a discussion on matter of patronage, and the meeting was adjourned to renew the debate today.

The Government organs here have long editorials on the subject.

Now that the defeat of the Yukon bill by the Senate is inevitable there is some speculation as to the subsequent course of the Government and the contractors. What the Government may do is hard to say but the public need not be surprised if Messrs Mackenzie & Mann go in to build without the land grant. They believe that they have a good thing without a subsidy if no other road is chartered.

RUSSIA AND CHINA.

Russian Troops in Readiness.

50,000 Men to be Sent to the East.

LONDON, March 25.—The Pekin correspondent of "the Times" says: China has agreed to all the Russian demands.

St. Petersburg, March 25.—A correspondent of the Telegraph says: "All classes of the Russian Army Reserve have been warned to hold themselves in readiness to be summoned to service, and, on account of the difficulties in Korea, it has been decided to despatch to Eastern Asia a corps of 50,000 men of the first line of reserves."

NEW SPANISH LOAN.

Bank of Spain to Supply 200,000,000.

MADRID, March 25.—It is announced that the Bank of Spain is to loan the Spanish Government 200,000,000 pesetas, guaranteed by new treasury bonds.

pany's steamer Santa Rosa, from San Diego, the news was received of another terrible accident, indirectly attributed to the Alaskan gold excitement, which is believed to cost the

lives of forty passengers and sailors. Captain Alexander of the Santa Rosa, reported that early this morning, while nine miles off Point Bonita, at the mouth of the Golden Gate, he sighted a derelict, bottom up. The tug Sea Witch was immediately despatched to the point indicated, and found the derelict to be the barque Helen W. Ahmy, Captain Hogan, which sailed some weeks ago, with forty or more on board.

LONDON, March 24.—At the banquet of the London Chamber of Commerce tonight, the guests included the Canadians, Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, Mr. Richard Dobell, and Gen. John Wimburn Laurie, member of parliament for Pembroke borough. The Right Hon. Charles T. Ritchie, President of the Board of Trade in responding to the toast, "Her Majesty's Government" referred to foreign competition, and quoted figures showing that America was destined to be more formidable than Germany as a competitor. He declared that this was due to the energy and determination displayed by both masters and men in the United States, and that Great Britain would do well to imitate America in this respect. Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal echoed Mr. Ritchie's remarks.

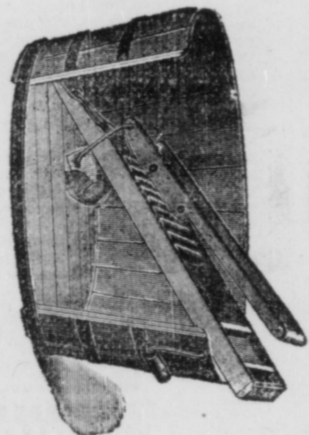
