It is stated that the vital part of the French demand for territory may include the whole of the left bank of the Mekong River. The terms of ultimatum sent by France to Siam and rejected, are as follows:

- First. A recognition of the rights of Annam and Cambodia, on the left or eastern bank of the Mekong river.
Second. The evacuation of the forts held there by the Siamese within a month.
Third. Full satisfaction for various aggressions against French ships and French sailors on the Meannan river.
Fourth. The punishment of the culprit and provision for the pecuniary indemnity of the victims.
Fifth. An indemnity of 2,000,000 francs for various damages sustained by French subjects.
Sixth. The immediate deposit of 3,000,000 francs to guarantee the payment of the fourth and fifth claims, or the assignment of the taxes in certain districts in lieu of the deposit of 3,000,000 francs.

THE TRADE OF CANADA.

The trade statistics which have been published show that the fiscal year ending June 30th was "The Banner Trade Year" for Canada. The aggregate of imports and exports was greater than that of the previous year by upwards of five millions of dollars, reaching the great sum of \$236,651,282.

Of these totals, goods the produce of Canada amounted in 1891-92 to \$96,013,843, and in 1892-3 to \$102,400,485, an increase of \$6,386,642, while goods, the produce of other countries, amounted in 1891-92 to \$14,781,529, and in 1892-93 to \$12,787,180, showing a decrease of \$1,994,349, leaving the net increase for 1892-93 \$4,392,293.

COST OF THE EXPERIMENT.

THE FRANCO-SIAMESE CRISIS.

Effective Blockade on Friday. Regret Expressed in England. A Meeting of the Cabinet. French Ambassador Leaves Bangkok To-morrow.

London, July 25. A despatch from Paris states that the blockade of the Siamese coast will become effective on Thursday or Friday next.

TELEGRAPHIC.

The Franco-Siamese complication has been the one absorbing topic in the lobbies of the House of Commons. The situation is regarded with apprehension by all parties. On all sides regret is expressed that the British warships in the Siamese waters were not reinforced a month ago, as British interests in Siam outnumber those of the French by a hundred to one.

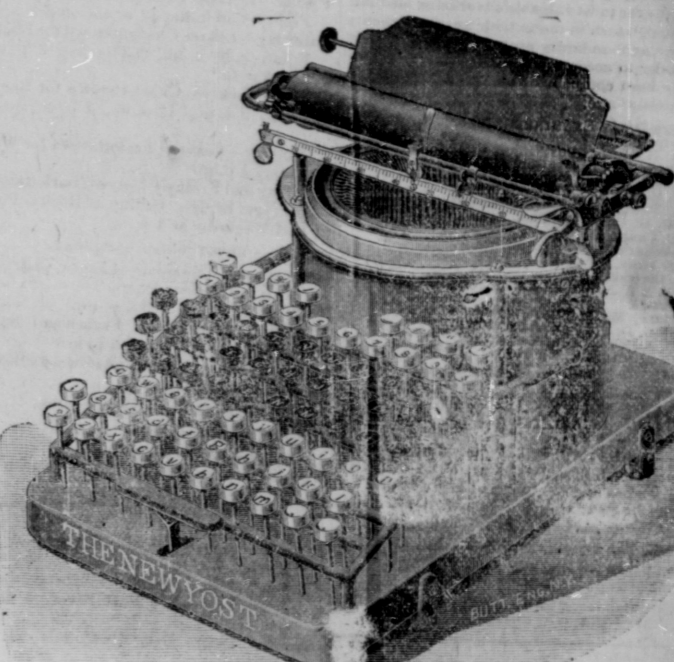
