

Local and Other Items.

The steamer *Flamborough* arrived from Montreal this morning, with a cargo of general merchandise.

The English mail via Canadian packet will be closed at the Post Office in this city at nine o'clock this evening.

A SUMMERSIDE correspondent of the *St. John Sun* writes: "There is a great deal of sickness in this place—I suppose in consequence of the weather."

The *Princess of Wales* returned from Picton at 11 o'clock, last night, with mails and the remainder of the Halifax excursionists.

MR. WILLIAM DOYLE, formerly of this city, has leased the extensive steam mill of Messrs. Longworth & Co., Mount Stewart, where he is now doing a brisk business in the furniture and blockmaking line. We wish him success.

A DESPATCH received from Picton this morning reports that the steamer *Worcester* broke her propeller, outside Picton Harbor last night. She now lies in Picton to await the arrival of a new propeller. Passengers will likely be forwarded to this place by *Princess of Wales* this evening.

The Stipendiary Magistrate's Court met yesterday evening at four o'clock. Michael Clinton and Peter Manley appeared for being engaged in a friendly "set-to" on Richmond Street. They were each fined \$1 and costs or 4 days; John Prentz was arrested for being drunk and incapable. He was fined \$3 and costs or 14 days; Bernard McCarey, arraigned for assaulting M. P. Rotchford a short time ago, was committed for 8 days.

A SAD drowning accident took place during the storm of Friday evening last, near Morris Island in Tuskent River, N. S. Three brothers named Frautten and a son of one of them attempted to leave their schooner in a boat. It is supposed that the boat was capsized by a squall, as she came ashore bottom up on the following Sunday. The bodies of the men have not been recovered. By this casualty four widows and fifteen children are left destitute.

ANOTHER terrible tale of the sea comes from London—the sinking of the German steamer "Pommerania" by a collision, and the loss of the lives of about fifty second and third class passengers, chiefly, it is said, Germans. The captain refused to desert his post, and heroically went down with the ship. The doomed vessel had no warning, and in fifteen minutes from the time she was struck she sunk, and with her a host of lives went down. It is an awful story as succinctly related by the survivors.

SMALL-POX AT ALBERTON.—Quite a flutter of excitement, says the *Pioneer*, was caused here this forenoon by the discovery that a man sick with the small-pox was lying in one of the boarding-houses in the centre of our village. The brig *Corinne*, from Newfoundland, came into port last Friday, and it appears her Captain (Koenig) had been ill for some days. On Saturday he took lodgings in the hotel in question, with the view of receiving better care and being near medical attendance. This morning (Tuesday) Dr. Bearisto made a professional visit to the patient and discovered that he was suffering with small-pox. It appears that the Captain's brother had the disease in Montreal recently, but having recovered, is now on board the *Corinne*. The discovery of such a fatal and noxious disease in the very centre of our village caused a good deal of excitement and running to and fro. The magistrates immediately placed the building under quarantine regulations, forbidding all ingress and egress; and at the time of writing we understand that preparations are being made to get the sick man on board and to move the vessel out into the stream where she will have to remain the twenty-one days required by the existing quarantine laws of the Dominion. For our own part we have no fear at all that the disease will spread, particularly at this season.

YESTERDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

DORCHESTER, Nov. 26.

This morning Mr. Palmer requested Dr. Campbell to be called to testify that the western bar-room door was not closed up. He had used it going in and out and knew others to, all the time he was there. Dr. Tuck then read the names of the witnesses for the defence, and saying that thirty-six of their depositions would be read to the Court and jury.

ARCHIBALD WILSON, DRUGGIST, Shediac, was the next witness sworn. His evidence was the same as before.

PHILIP CALDWELL then testified to pawing a hatchet with John Osborne for a drink last fall. His testimony develops nothing new.

WILLIAM RICHARD, hostler at the Weldon House in Oct. '77, testified to McChirly coming to the Weldon House, and putting his horse up. There was nothing new from this witness.

EDWARD MCCARTHY, blacksmith, Moncton, brother to deceased, next took the stand, gave an account of his brother's appearance, business and family. There were no new points.

Several witnesses arrived to-day, including Taddy Pordell and his wife.

After dinner the cross examination of Mr. McCarthy went on.

The receipt of the following telegram by Mr. Palmer created quite an excitement:—

CHARLOTTETOWN, Nov. 26.

To A. L. Palmer:

I slept at Waverley House on night of 12th October; was not in bed till nearly 2 o'clock. Saw McCarthy there; he treated before he left the house. I shipped next day in the "J. V. Troop" for Cardiff; think my evidence would help prisoners. I only arrived last night. Heard nothing of the murder till then. If wanted, telegraph immediately.

DANIEL STEWART MARSHALL. It is not yet known what action will be taken in the matter.

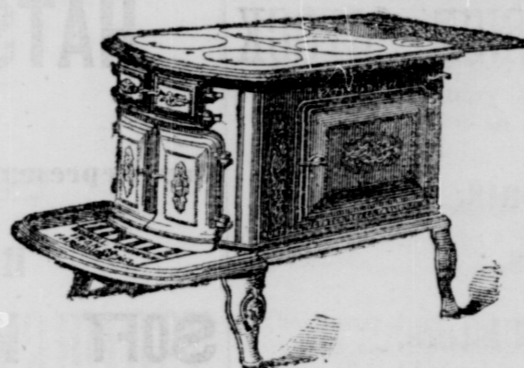
