Dealer Debt Written Off, Corporation Probe Told

By GORDON GRANT TORONTO (CP) — Debts of \$354,184 piled up with a subsidiary of Atlantic Acceptance Corp. by Ottawa car dealer George Blacklock were written off last year, the royal commission investigating the finance company's collapse was told Thursday.

Edwin N. Alfred, an accountant with Atlantic, testified that Mr. Blacklock had three accounts with Commodore Quality Acceptance, an Atlantic subsidiary which went bankrupt owing its parent more than \$34,000,000.

Atlantic went into receivership June 17, 1965, when it couldn't pay some debts. Commodore went under shortly after. Mr. Alfred said the three accounts written off were: 1. Blacklock Leasing Co. which owed \$51,606.

2. George Blacklock capital account, \$118,557. 3. Blacklock Mortgage which owed \$183,721. The Blacklock Leasing account was originally with Atlantic Acceptance, he said.

Mr. Blacklock owned a company called Valley Music which had an account with Atlantic's branch office in Cornwall, Ont. He said that when Valley Music had to make a payment on its debt, the Blacklock Leasing account would be debited and the Valley Music account credited. No money changed hands; it was a "bookkeeping entry."

The Valley Music account was "kept in line" but the Blacklock Leasing account climbed constantly, he said. Mr. Alfred said every time there was a transaction in the Blacklock Leasing account, interest would be calculated at the seven per cent. However, after Nov. 30, 1963 when interest charges were \$2,329 the company gave up hope of collecting and stopped working it out. In December, 1960, Valley Music sold its assets to Aurora Leasing and rented them back at \$4,000 a month. Frequently the rental couldn't be paid, so Atlantic would make the payments, and Valley Music's debt soared to \$153,000. Atlantic then sold the debt to Commodore for \$120,000.

Mr. Alfred traced the ups and downs in the Blacklock Leasing account and said it rose as high as \$203,252 in May, 1961. He said Mr. Blacklock built a food supermarket in Cornwall and then got a \$175,000 mortgage on it from Commodore Sales. The \$175,000 was used to reduce the Blacklock Leasing debt.

The mortgage was never repaid but the building is still held as security, he said. The George Blacklock capital account was used to raise money for construction of gas stations, but frequently it was debited in the capital account and credited in the leasing account without cash changing hands.

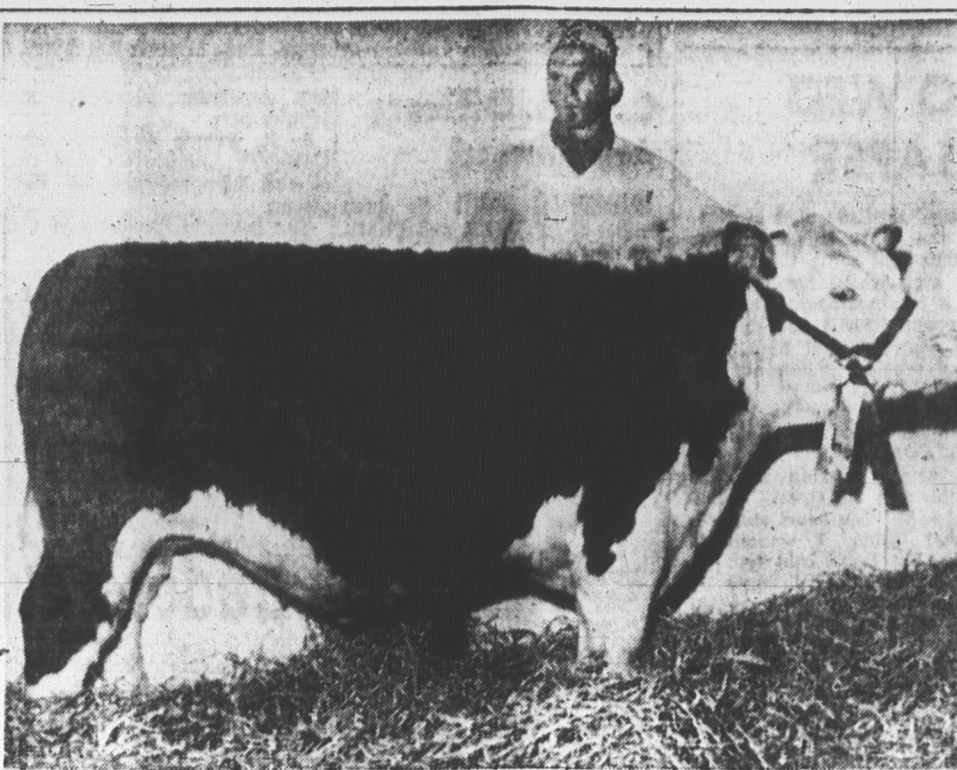

FACTS FOR FARMERS



Department Offering Short Course By TV

NEXT WEEK EVERY FARMER IN P.E.I. IS INVITED TO ATTEND A COMPLETE SHORT COURSE ON FORAGE CROP PRODUCTION IN HIS OWN HOME. This course will cover all phases of the production, harvesting and feeding of forage crops, pasture, silage and hay. The latest information is presented in these programs with special attention to animal feeding, crop production and agricultural engineering from Maine, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. The programs should be of great value to every farmer who has dairy or beef cattle on his farm. The information is the latest and best that can be obtained and this is an opportunity for each cattle man to make use of the latest research findings.

WHERE? This short course is being presented on all Maritime television stations by the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation and the three Maritime Departments of Agriculture. WHEN? March 29, 30, 31 and April 1 are the dates. The time of day is 10:30 to 11:30 a.m. This time was selected because it is the only available time on the Maritime TV network and the programs are used as a replacement for school telecasts in the other provinces. HOW? Television is used for this short course because it is one of the ways in which a large number of people can be reached in a short time. It is also used because most farm operators can be reached right in their own homes. This is the most convenient possible arrangement. Sometimes due to weather and other factors it is difficult to attend a meeting or more than one meeting. However, when the meeting is brought to you at home there is very little justifiable excuse for not making every effort to take part in the complete four day short course. WHY? Why should there be a television short course? As you are aware a lot of research is being done at Universities and Experimental Farms in Canada. To remain efficient and up-to-date

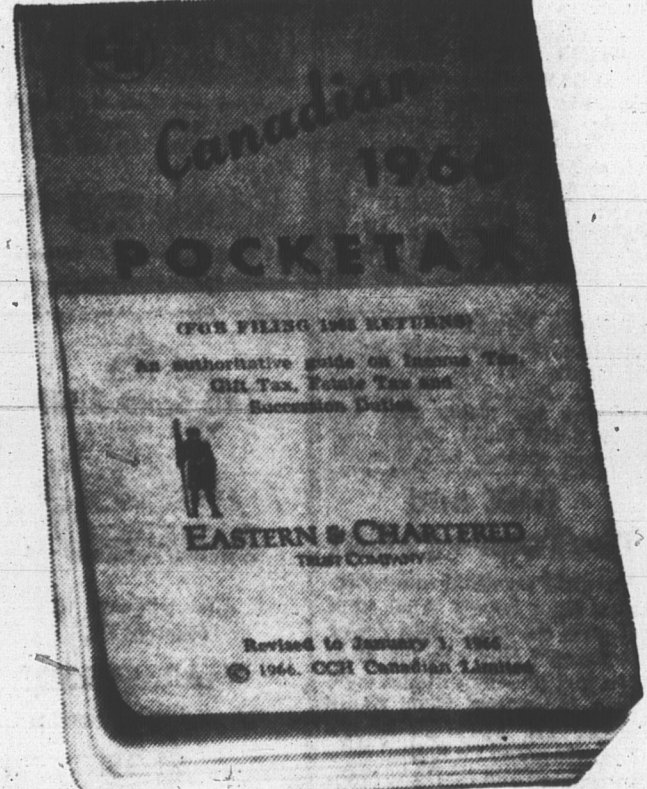
the farm operator must try to use the latest information ON HIS FARM. Extension Divisions of Departments of Agriculture have the responsibility of getting this information from the research station to the farmer. This television short course is simply one way of getting the latest and best information to those who can make use of it. The cost of the series to P.E.I. is over \$2000. Since the research and the extension services have done their part in presenting this information in a form available to nearly every farmer we feel that the farm operator also has a responsibility to take advantage of this opportunity. The farm operator should remember that although this comes as a free service to him it is not free and is costing the taxpayers of P.E.I. and Canada over \$14,000 to produce this series. What kind of information is presented in this series? The following descriptions should help to show you why this series is a valuable source of information. PROGRAM 1 The title of this program is "Livestock Profits From Quality Forage". Taking part in this first program are Dr. Bruce Poulton, who teaches animal nutrition at the University of Maine and J.E. Shuh, Vice-principal of the Nova Scotia Agricultural College. Topics covered are— How much production should a farmer try to get out of an animal? How does the animal make use of and digest feed? Why is the quality of hay and pasture feed important? How do you go about planning a forage program to give maximum quality and production? At the end of this program a panel of farmers including Wallace Wood, Marshfield, question Dr. Poulton and Ed Shuh: IF YOU HAVE CATTLE ON YOUR FARM DON'T MISS THIS PROGRAM! PROGRAM 2 The title of this program is "How To Plan A Quality Forage Program and How To Grow It." Taking part are Dr. Lloyd MacLeod, Research Officer at the Farm and Dr. Cecil Brown who

Should I have one system of machinery (hay) or two systems (hay and silage)? How many cows do I need before I have both hay and silage systems? What are the fixed costs in forage machinery? Also taking part and questioning the speakers is a panel of farmers including Charles Yeo, St. Elias, P.E.I. IF YOU HAVE FORAGE CROP MACHINERY ON YOUR FARM, DON'T MISS THIS PROGRAM!

PROGRAM 4 This program describes "The Use of Quality Forage For Maximum Livestock Profits." The feeding of forages to both mature animals and young cattle, dairy and beef will be emphasized. Guests are Dr. Bruce Poulton, University of Maine and Richard Huggett, Superintendent of Livestock, Nova Scotia.

A panel of three Maritime farmers including Wallace Wood, Marshfield, will question the two speakers above and also question Fred Richens, Mr. Richens is a dairy farmer from Oxford County, Ontario and has according to many people the best managed forage program in that province. This program tells what feeds are necessary, the value of quality forage and how to make up rations for dairy, beef and sheep. IF YOU FEED ONE ANIMAL OR MORE ON YOUR FARM YOU CAN'T AFFORD TO MISS THIS PROGRAM! Those of us who have seen these programs feel that there is a lot of good, practical information in each, which will be of value to every livestock farmer in P.E.I. If you don't have a television set then visit a neighbor to see these programs. If your television is broken, get it fixed in time! The only good excuse for not seeing these programs is if you have given up farming. We have done our part to present this information—you do your part and watch the series. Remind your neighbors too, for everyone should be interested in:
