The Hague, Sept. 16. Gardener, arrested here for forgery, has been examined, and intelligence from him has led to the seizure of many more counterfeit United States notes.

Liverpool, Sept. 16.—Evn'g. James Hewitt and Co. of this City have suspended payment. The amount of liabilities has not yet been ascertained.

Dublin, Sept. 16. James Bird, one of the Fenian leaders who had been concealed in Ireland since the last outbreak, was traced to Hawth last week, and his arrest was quietly effected there to-day.

Cadiz, Sept. 16. The United States vessels, which have been lying in this harbor, sailed to-day for Greece. Consols 5-20's 73½.—Markets unchanged.

Copenhagen, Sept 16th. Admiral Farragut was entertained at a grand fete given in his honor by the United States Minister, George H. Yeaman. All the Americans in the city, visitors and residents, took part in the festivities.

New York, 17th. Advice from Mexico via Havana to the 9th instant, and Vera Cruz 13th are received. Admiral Tegethoff appeared at the Mexican War Office on the 4th as the verbally authorized deputy from the relatives of the late Maximilian, to ask in the name of humanity the remains of the deceased.

France and Italy on the subject of what is known as the "Dreux" affair, a corps raised in France for the service of the Papacy, has at length evoked a plain and unequivocal denial on the part of the Italian Government through the Official Gazette of Florence.

The Dretto says it is informed on good authority that an arrangement has been concluded between the Italian Government and the Papal Government, in virtue of which should any violation of Pontifical territory be committed by bands of insurgents, Italy would be at liberty to occupy certain points of that territory not including Rome.
