

# Leafs Cut Red Wings' League Lead To 2 Points

DETROIT, Dec. 2 — (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs cut Detroit Red Wings' National Hockey League lead to two points tonight by winning 2-1 in a brawling, tight-marked game which saw 18 penalties before a season record house of 14,338 fans here.

The scoring came before the fighting. Toronto jumped to a 2-0 lead, Cal Gardner rifling a 15-footer in the first period and Harry Watson clicking from a scramble three minutes after the second stanza opened.

A minor brawl between Gordie Howe and Fern Flaman preceded Detroit's goal, and indirectly played a part in it. Flaman, who had drawn a five-minute fighting major to Howe's two minute minor, came back on the ice too early and earned an additional penalty.

While Flaman was away, Sid Abel flashed a 40-footer under goalie Al Rollins' outstretched leg for a goal.

A few minutes later the game blew up in a tangle. Eight players mixed in it. Tony Leswick, Marty Pavelich, Fred Glover and Leo Reize for Detroit; Fleming MacKell, Gus Mortson, Bill Juzda and Howie Meeker for Toronto.

Several times officials had the fighting stopped, only to have Meeker and Glover attempt to continue. George Gravel, the harassed referee, assessed seven assessed penalties, totalling 28 minutes to five men.

With Chicago short handed due to a tripping penalty on Gus Rodman, the Rangers hit for two

goals toward the close of the first period. Paul Ronty scored the first at 17:20 and Ed Kullman the other at 18:08 for a 3-2 edge at the intermission.

Babando's second goal of the evening at 2:33 of the second period tied the count again and at 17:22 Pete Horeck connected for a Hawk lead. That lasted until Ed Mickoski sunk one to bring it into a 4-4 tie at the end of the second.

**TORONTO 2, NEW YORK 2**  
TORONTO, Dec. 2 — (CP) — To 13,163 fans, Max Bentley's goal counted more than all the rest Saturday night when Toronto Maple Leafs went on a wild scoring spree and trimmed New York Rangers 2-2 in a National Hockey League game.

Bentley's goal was the 200th of the N.H.L. career he began in the 1940-41 season with Chicago Black Hawks. The fans gave it a tumultuous welcome, showering the ice with programs while Maxie snatched up the puck for a souvenir.

The 31-year-old wheat farmer from Delisle, Sask., teamed with Fleming MacKell on a double passing play for the goal. MacKell had almost as good an opening as Bentley but he passed the puck back to the old master for the important kill.

The Bentley goal—his fifth this season—overshadowed other developments in a game which offered more rousing minutes than the score might indicate. The Leafs, who bagged five of their goals in a dashing third period, piled up 22 scoring points. They moved to within four points of the leading Detroit Red Wings in the league standings.

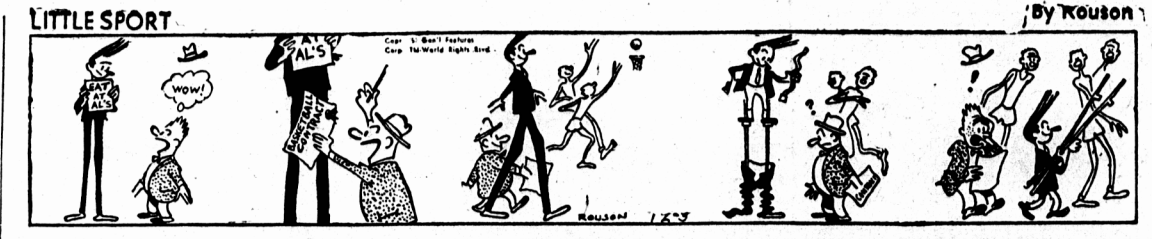
**MONTREAL 4, CHICAGO 2**

Seven weeks ago tonight the Maritime Major Hockey League schedule opened with the Halifax Saints meeting the Islanders here. Tonight the same two teams will be back in action at the local Forum but the faces who will be sporting the red and white of the Santarians will differ greatly from those who appeared with the Saints on Oct. 15. Since that game, eight of the fifteen men who turned out with the Saints, have been released and in their place are eight new and better players. Players released by the Saints include Frechette, Kelly, McAbay, Wilkes, Brown, Warecki and Poitras. To this list could be added "Muckle" Hollett, but Hollett did not start the season with the Halifax Club.

Each team has played 28 games or almost one-third of their quota in the M. M. H. L. To date the Saint John Beavers have built up a lead similar to the Islanders lead over the remaining teams in the Big Four a year ago. In the opening weeks of the schedule many observers thought that the Beavers would level off and be caught by the rest of the pack. But for the past month and a half they have been equaling the pace set by the Islanders with the result that there has been no gain on their 11-point lead. The chances of the Beavers wearing out on the long schedule are slim because Coach "Peanuts" O'Flaherty makes it a practice to rest three men every game. Usually he rests a complete line, but his selections of the players to sit out the game depend upon the injury list and the positions of the players.

The youngest member of the "Kid Line" became a full fledged man on Saturday. In hockey circles he was a man for quite a while but it was not until Saturday that Willie Marshall obtained his voting age. Willie has a twin down in Glace Bay in the person of Jim Anderson who also celebrated his 21st birthday on Saturday. Marshall fared off better in Saturday's game than Anderson as he assisted on one goal while Anderson went pointless. Anderson, however, was playing at home and received a birthday cake from the fans.

In Sydney there are no birthday parties or any other kind of parties as far as hockey is concerned. The Beavers 6-2 win over the Millionaires Saturday night was just a repetition of a game played earlier in the week at Sydney. In both games the pattern was the same. The Millionaires looked like a hockey team for the first period and after that they faded away like old soldiers. Old soldiers, however, never die, but unless there is a change in the Sydney fortunes the same will not hold true for the Millionaires. In the last Sydney-Saint John game at Sydney the fans cheered for the Beavers.

The Sydney efforts have been greatly hampered by injuries. Saturday night Bill Cupolo played on the Millionaires defense. Frank Bathgate and "Skippy" Frezell were playing but both were working with bad shoulders. Dunc MacIntyre, who almost had the top of his finger cut off in a game with Halifax some time ago, received a shoulder injury last week and has been sidelined since.
