### Father And Son

In the two sod class, Ed Wood of Pownal emerged the winner with Clayton Morrissey second and Fred Nelson and George Bruce tying for third position.

### OPENING CEREMONY

During the afternoon several speakers were heard including Mr. Neil A. Matheson, M.P., who is the honorary president of the Queen's County Plowing Match. Mr. Matheson recalled that he was present at the first meeting of this association when they came together to form plans for the holding of the first contest three years ago. He expressed pleasure at the progress this organization had made in the meantime. Mr. Matheson then called upon the Premier, Hon. A. W. Matheson, who heartily congratulated the directors of the match. The Premier said, "The large crowd that you have attracted here today, in spite of inclement weather, is indicative of the interest the people of Prince Edward Island have in plowing matches." Mr. Matheson was happy to see that other events of agricultural interest such as the exhibit by the Alexandra Calf Club were included in the program.

The Premier suggested that the organization look over their records and compare last year's results with the present year. "It is only by analyzing the achievements of the past that you can improve those of the future," said he.

Mr. R. R. Bell, Q.C., leader of the opposition, felt that a good way to keep interest in events of this kind was to include competitions between the various districts in the vicinity. These he said could take the form of a tug of war or other friendly rivalry. Mr. Bell remarked at the very large amount of high priced equipment

which was on the grounds. "We must make sure that the producer will get a fair price for his products so that he can keep up with the ever increasing cost of production," he said. Quality goods, he felt, was the answer to this problem.

Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture, said the plowing match was the place to meet friends and this he felt was a good thing since it gave farmers and farmer's wives a chance to exchange ideas and to discuss many of their problems. Mr. Baker made mention of the unusual weather experienced during the summer and referred to it as a "freak year" when one could go through the country and see three different kinds of farming operations going on at the same time, namely haying, harvesting and potato digging. He concluded by telling the directors that the Department of Agriculture was always willing to assist in such an effort as theirs.

"The basic art of being a good farmer is being a good plowman," said Mr. Angus MacLean, M.P., who pointed out that although farming was one of the most demanding of occupations, it was also one of the most rewarding. He urged them to continue their efforts to improve the show from year to year "and there is little doubt," he said, "that you will always have a large crowd in attendance."

### ENTERTAINMENT FEATURES

Pipe music, Highland dancing, step dancing and field sports added much to the attraction during the day. A 4-H calf club show by the members of the Alexandra Calf Club was keenly contested and attracted great interest from those present. The pipe band was under the leadership of Pipe Major MacLeod of Charlottetown and was sponsored by the Island Fertilizer Company. Gasoline for all the events was provided through the courtesy of Mr. Walter Carver, Imperial Esso dealer.

The two plowing judges were Messrs. L. W. Roper and David Schurman. These two men had a colossal task on their hands to complete the judging of all events before dark and many favorable comments were heard in regard to the decisions made.

Rodeo judges were Messrs. J. L. Dewar and B. B. Jones. Chief Supervisor, R. J. MacRae; Sports Committee, Messrs. Morris Deacon, Winston Smith and Rev. G. W. Tilley; Step dancing committee, Messrs. John Morrissey, John MacInnis and Joseph MacMillan.

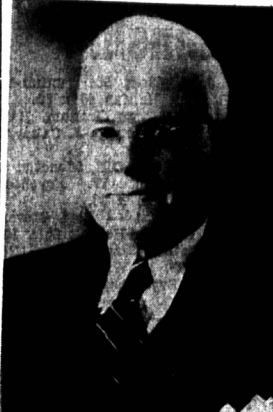
