S'side St. Paul's Credit Union Annual Meeting

The annual meeting of St. Paul's Credit Union was held last evening in St. Paul's Hall, Summerside and all the reports showed that the Credit Union is in a thriving and increasingly prosperous condition. The president, Mr. Cyrus Polier, presided and welcomed the large number of members who were present and also a number of visitors from Trinity Credit Union.

Mr. Polier gave the directors' report which showed that membership had increased since last year by 22 to 214 and the assets had increased to \$72,350.50.

Mr. Fred Gallant gave the treasurer's report and satisfactorily answered the large number of questions put to him by the meeting. Mr. Edward Gillis reported for the credit committee and said that 226 loans were granted last year.

Mr. Elmer Pineau gave the report of the audit committee. On the recommendation of the treasurer the meeting voted a two per cent dividend on savings.

The meeting also decided that Credit Union League dues for members under sixteen years of age will be paid by the Credit Union.

The slate of officers was re-elected as follows: Cyrus Polier, president; Leo Wood, vice-president; Ted Gallant, secretary, Edward Harrington, director, Mr. Edward Gillis was re-appointed to the credit committee and Rt. Rev. Msgr. G. J. MacLellan was re-appointed to the audit committee.

Among those who spoke at the latter part of the meeting were Rev. J. H. LeClair, Rev. A. J. MacLeod, Mayor Henry Wedge, Dr. H. E. Clark, president of Trinity Credit Union, Mr. Keir Duggan, a member of Trinity Credit Union and Mr. Fitzgerald, president of the Wellington-Richmond Credit Union.

Following the business meeting lunch was served by the ladies and musical entertainment was enjoyed.—S

Capture of the Red stronghold of Pyongyang undoubtedly broke the back of Korean Red morale; and on both the east and west coasts, the Allies were striking deeper toward the Korean-Manchurian border.

Troops of the U.S. 1st Cavalry Division were first into Pyongyang. They slashed into the eastern industrial section from the southern outskirts Thursday at 11:02 A.M. (9:02 P.M. E.S.T. Wednesday).

A column of the South Korean Republican 1st Division stabbed into Pyongyang from the east 18 minutes later.

The 1st Cavalry troops and the South Korean soldiers met at a bridge over the Taedong River which divides the city.

They joined forces and poured westward across the bridge to rout the few die-hard Reds still firing occasional sniper shots.

On the west side of the river, the Allied troops, forged along streets under Communist banners calling on Pyongyang residents to "defend this city to the last."

Pyongyang Deserted. But there was nobody to make a defence. The bomb-blasted old city seemed deserted by its estimated 700,000 or more inhabitants.

Brig.-Gen. Frank A. Allen, Jr. of Cleveland, O., met Gen. Paik Sun Yup, commander of the South Korean 1st Division, in the littered streets shortly after the link up.

"The 1st Cavalry Division wants to congratulate you on a wonderful job," said Allen.

Paik returned the congratulations, repeating over and over: "Damn good job."

F Company of the 1st Cavalry's 2nd Battalion, paced by 15 tanks, was first into Pyongyang.

The column jumped off from Hukkyo, 15 miles south, at 6:30 A.M. Thursday (4:30 P.M. E.S.T. Wednesday). The Red had fought hard for 24 hours to hold the bridge line at Hukkyo, but they lost five tanks under the 1st Cavalry's jump-off impact and crumbled.

The road was littered with bodies of North Korean troops too slow to escape, said AP correspondent, Don Whitehead.

The bodies were slumped in ditches, fields and haystacks along the way, he said.

"The column overran machine-guns, anti-tank gun bundles of Red clothing and columns of supplies in excelsis. There were blankets, overcoats and odds and ends of the sort carried by an army expecting a winter campaign.

"But there would be no winter campaign for this army. It was broken and beaten."

Roads Crowded. On the other side of the city, the roads northward were crowded with fleeing troops and civilians.

AP correspondent Jack MacBeth, who entered Pyongyang with the 1st Cavalry, turned to Quebec City on September 28.

The "C. D. Howe" is expected to leave here Sunday on her light-house supply trip. She will call on points along the west coast of Newfoundland and the coasts of Quebec as far as the Straits of Belle Isle. The trip will last about three weeks depending on weather conditions.

Advise Children On Safety Measures

The pupils of the Summerside High School and Academy were addressed yesterday on safety measures by Mr. D. O. Stewart, chairman of the School Board and Chief of Police Peter R. White.

Mr. Stewart advised the students that members of the teaching staff would be delegated to act as monitors on the school grounds during recess periods and before and after school. He asked the children not to engage in any activities in which some of them might be injured and asked them to be careful when using the playground equipment.

Chief of Police White warned the children against a number of practices which are dangerous to themselves and others and some of which are contrary to town by-laws. One of these is driving bicycles on the sidewalks and driving with two on a bicycle.

He also warned the pupils about walking in large groups on the streets which makes it difficult for motorists to avoid hitting them. Chief White said that one way that the older boys could be helpful is in helping younger children to cross the streets and also to give their assistance to old people.

Both speakers were introduced by Mr. Clarence Mercer, supervisor of the school.—S

troops of the 1st South Korean Division from the east, said:

"Pyongyang itself was the picture of what all of us think of as war. Burning buildings, blood and noises which in themselves would scare a normal man . . .

"More men may die before the Korean war becomes history but tonight (Thursday night) the United Nations has Pyongyang, thanks to a gallant group of South Koreans and Americans."

On the east coast, the South Korean 3rd Division rolled northward from the captured twin industrial centres of Hamhung and Hungnam, 110 miles south of the Korean-Manchurian border.

The South Korean Capital Division continued the occupation of the two towns. The division reported it took "numerous" prisoners in Hamhung.

Other U.N. forces expanded the arc from the east coast southwestward to Pyongyang.

Southwest of Pyongyang, the U.S. 24th Division continued its push toward Chinnampo, port for the onetime Red capital.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 18.—(CP)—A navy spokesman reported today that 206 mines have been destroyed around Korea to date. The spokesman said at a briefing that most of these were of the moored contact variety. He described them as of the Russian type.
