

THE VICE-REGAL VISIT

Expectations not Realized Last Night, but More Than Realized To-day.

An Enthusiastic Welcome to Lord and Lady Aberdeen.

RECEPTION AT GOVERNMENT HOUSE.

Great Convention at the Exhibition Building.

Ball at Government House and Fire-works This Evening.

Unavoidable detention of the ships of war of the Nova Scotia coast prevented the arrival of the Vice-regal party last evening, and caused disappointment to many thousands in this city. The ships left Halifax at midnight on Wednesday, but were compelled on account of fog to remain off that port until seven or eight o'clock yesterday morning. A heavy rainstorm would, however, have rendered the landing in this city last evening disagreeable. This morning the sky gradually brightened, the clouds breaking away as the distinguished visitors set foot upon our shores. The weather now is cool and pleasant, and there is a good prospect for a fine day to-morrow. Charlottetown was never gay; and never more thronged by residents of the country.

The flagship Blake, of the North American squadron, with their Excellencies on board, accompanied by the cruisers Tartar and Magicienne, arrived in port this morning about nine o'clock, and half an hour later dropped anchor. The ships were saluted in the usual way as they came up, and Captain McAlister, of the Tartar, sent a messenger to enquire what time their Excellencies would be ready to receive His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, and the other leading representative men who were to go on board. The reply was to the effect that their Excellencies would receive them at once. Accordingly His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. Fredk. Peters, the Premier of the Province, His Worship Mayor Dawson, and the reception committee of the City Council composed of Councillors Hazard, Robertson and Hughes, and Professor Robertson, Dominion Dairy Commissioner, promptly called upon their Excellencies and met them accompanied with the arrangements that had been made for their reception.

This duty performed the visitors returned and awaited the arrival of their Excellencies. About half-past ten their Excellencies, accompanied by Captain Kinderley and Mr. Erskine, A. D. C.'s, landed at Pownal wharf, where they were formally welcomed by His Excellencies, the Lieutenant-Governor and Mayor Dawson, the band playing "God Save the Queen." A salute was fired from the Blake as the party landed, which was replied to from Fort Edward. When their Excellencies landed they were received by a guard of honor under command of Captain Hooper, and as they came up the landing they were enthusiastically cheered by the large assemblage.

After their Excellencies landed, Katie, the little grand-daughter of His Worship Mayor Dawson, stepped forward and presented Lady Aberdeen with a beautiful bouquet. The presentation was graciously made and acknowledged, Lady Aberdeen kissing the child upon receipt of the bouquet.

The City's Address. His Worship Mayor Dawson then read the formal address of welcome from the city, a copy of which follows:

TO HIS EXCELLENCY THE RIGHT HONORABLE SIR JOHN CAMPBELL GORDON, VICEROY, VISCOUNT FORTMARRINE, BARON HADJO, METCHIE, TAVRIS and KELLIE in Peage of Scotland, VISCOUNT GORDON of Aberdeen in the Peage of the United Kingdom, etc., etc., Governor General of Canada: May it Please Your Excellency:— In the name and on behalf of the citizens of Charlottetown, we, the Mayor and members of the City Council, most respectfully tender to Your Excellency, as the representative of Her Most Gracious Majesty a right hearty welcome to our city.

We recognize in you a distinguished descendant of the House of Gordon, and we do not forget that to one of your noble House we owe it that one of the most important Provinces now forming part of the Dominion of Canada was secured to the Empire.

The many high and important offices in the state to which you have been called by the Sovereign, and the great distinction which has attended your discharge of the duties pertaining thereto demands our admiration, and we esteem it a privilege to welcome so distinguished a servant of the Crown.

We rejoice in the intense concern taken by you in all that tends to promote the social, moral and religious life of the community.

regretted exceedingly that their arrival had been delayed. Time and tide wait for no man, and the fog was not respectful to persons or ships, not even of the flagship Blake. Hence the delay. The address was most appropriate and I was greatly appreciated. He returned thanks for the many expressions of loyalty and good will contained therein, also for the personal references. The Agricultural Conference. The Agricultural Conference at the Driving Park this afternoon is attended by an immense number of people. Prof. Robertson, Dominion Dairy Commissioner, is in charge. The order of proceedings (subject to slight modification) is as follows:

- 1. Presentation of addresses to His Excellency the Governor General. 2. Reply by His Excellency. 3. Address by Hon. W. D. Hoard, ex-Governor of the State of Wisconsin. 4. Presentation of medals by Her Excellency the Countess of Aberdeen. 5. Addresses by Hon. George W. Howland, Lieutenant Governor, Hon. Fred Peters, D. M. McPherson, Esq., President Dominion Dairyman's Association, Prof. Fletcher, botanist and entomologist, Dominion Experimental Farm, and Prof. John Craig, horticulturist, Central Experimental Station, Ottawa.

An informal reception will be held by their Excellencies, the Earl and Countess of Aberdeen at the Exhibition building at the close of the Agricultural conference on Friday afternoon. This is by desire of His Excellency to afford an opportunity of meeting the farmers and the ladies of their families.

The Citizens' Band is in attendance with a splendid programme.

THE DAIRYMEN'S ADDRESS. The address presented by the officers and members of the various dairymen's associations of the province is as follows:

To His Excellency, the Right Honorable JOHN CAMPBELL GORDON, Earl of Aberdeen, Governor General of the Dominion of Canada, &c., &c.: May it Please Your Excellency,— The office bearers of the various dairymen's associations in this Province, on behalf of the patrons connected with those establishments, beg to approach and tender to Your Excellency and Lady Aberdeen a cordial welcome, on this your first visit to Prince Edward Island.

We rejoice to have in addition to the fitness that procured for Your Excellency the high post of Governor General of this Dominion, you have been intimately associated with leading agriculturists in the old lands, and that your proficiency in the science of government, unlike that of many of the earlier colonial rulers, has been acquired on other fields than those on which the nation's best men have been marshalled, and amid other scenes and surrounding than the carnage and desolation of its battle-fields.

The early immigrants to this Province, having settled in an unbroken forest, with slight means of subsistence at their disposal, apart from the fortitude and energy required to reclaim the wilderness and render the soil fit for cultivation, had little time or opportunity to devote to dairy pursuits, and whilst other branches of agriculture made rapid strides since the administration of Governor Ready, in 1825, the dairy industry remained in a languishing condition till the visit of Prof. Robertson in 1891, when by the introduction of the cooperative system, and the nascent energy and energy and stimulating activity of Superintendent Dillon, such an enthusiasm was aroused, and an impetus given to the industry, that from the experimental station at New Perth in 1892, eight factories are now in active operation. Not only was the dairy industry promoted, but the whole agricultural intellect awakened by the various addresses delivered by the Dairy Commissioner throughout the Province, and the headlines issued from the Central Experimental station at Ottawa.

We cheerfully recognize the timely assistance rendered by the Federal Government to the dairy industry, and by the further continuation of that fostering care, and the individual intelligence of the patrons, we earnestly look forward with bright anticipations to a less arduous and more scientific and profitable system of agriculture than has heretofore prevailed in this province.

We desire Your Excellency to convey to the Countess of Aberdeen our sincere gratification on this her first visit to our shores, and to assure Your Excellency that the laudable efforts of Her Excellency for the amelioration of life in Ireland during your term as Viceroy of that portion of Great Britain, and her noble exertions towards moral and social reform are sincerely appreciated by the dairymen of this province.

We can assure Your Excellency that in no part of Her Majesty's broad dominions are to be found a people more truly attached in sterling devotion to the British Throne, than the Dairymen of Prince Edward Island.
