Ottawa Notes.
OTTAWA, Aug. 7.
Action is to be taken with reference to the Labrador railway scheme sooner than was expected. A party of English engineers and capitalists is expected to arrive in New York next week en route to Canada, and the Government has been asked to loan the Arctic steamer Alert to enable the party to visit Labrador and the Straits of Belle Isle with a view to prospecting. Should they report favorably the scheme will at once be floated on the English market.
The new system of repairing depositors in post office savings banks has been found to work well.
Applications for entry for the Dominion Rifle Matches are pouring in, the Canadian Pacific offering the most liberal rates for travelling.
Convicts Revolt.
BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 7.
About three o'clock this afternoon the convicts in the harness shop of the Charlestown State Prison refused to obey the orders of the keepers and began throwing missiles in every direction. They made a dash for the guard and tried to scale the walls, but the sentinels fired on them. An alarm was sent out to the city police, and in less than five minutes forty-five officers arrived and shortly afterwards 150 more appeared. In fifteen minutes from the beginning of the uprising the men were safely under lock and key. One convict was considerably bruised about the head by an officer's club. None of the convicts escaped.
Loss of the Isabel.
QUEBEC, Aug. 7.
Tenders have been called by the owners of the barque Isabel to raise the vessel and cargo on salvage. It is now said that the total loss by the accident will not exceed \$20,000. The Isabel was partially insured, and there was insurance of \$18,000 in the Atlantic Mutual of New York on the cargo. The Isabel was a wooden vessel of 350 tons, built at Prince Edward Island in 1880.
Having a Bad Effect.
OTTAWA, Aug. 2.
Letters from Alberta say the example of the Mormons is having a bad effect upon the Indians. The Mormon village or settlement is situated adjacent to the Black Indian Reserve, and the Indians already call them "men of many wives," and claim that the Mormons have been telling them how good a thing it is to have more than one wife.
