Queen Of Sea Contest Judges Are Announced

SOURIS BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN Plans for the Souris Fisheries Exhibition and Regatta are now well underway and the latest development was the announcement last night of the selection of the judges for the Queen of the Sea contest. The double event is scheduled for July 3-4.

Milton Fitzpatrick, president of the committee said the three judges will be Miss Iphigene Arsenault, Charlottetown, the provincial commissioner of the Canadian Fishery Board, Herring, of CFCY radio and TV, and Brig. A.W. Rogers, Charlottetown.

The six contestants will be judged at 2:30 p.m. Friday July 5 from the coronation ball which will take place at St. Mary's Parish Hall. Friday evening at 9:30 will be the 1963 Regatta. Miss Carol Ann Powers playing the crown.

This will be followed by the coronation ball to be attended by Mayor C.E. LaVie and Mrs. LaVie and J.R. Macdonald, Lean and Mrs. MacLean, Hon. Leo Rosier and Mrs. Rosier, and Mrs. J. Macdonald, M.L.A. and Mrs. Macdonald.

Music will be supplied by the Mariners Quintet.

Warning Given On Sprinklers By Water Dept.

At in previous years, Frank A. Vanderstine, secretary for the Commissioners of Sewers and Water Supply, has again issued a warning regarding the use of lawn sprinklers, by city water users.

Although this is not a new regulation, Mr. Vanderstine said that attention of the public must be drawn to it every summer, as it seems to be easily forgotten. He pointed out that the regulation not only applies to sprinklers but it also takes in unattended hoses.

Mr. Vanderstine pointed out the warning does not mean there is a shortage in the water supply. Rather it is a protective measure against such a shortage.

The city hopes to avoid putting water meters in homes, but it may become a necessity if the tendency to waste water by such means as leaving a hose running overnight, continues. Mr. Vanderstine believes that the metering will have to come eventually, and estimates that some 4,000 meters at \$35 each would have to be installed if such a move were taken. It would also mean an increase in staff and various other changes in the Sewers and Water Supply Commission.

The water supply is now metered in some buildings in Charlottetown, notably public institutions. Mr. Vanderstine noted that the increase in water use in past years coupled with the gradual decrease in supply, due to deforestation and other factors, could necessitate the installation of meters, unless the people exercise more care in the use of water.
