Fishing Outlaws.

RELIABLE advices from Miminigash state that seventy sail of United States fishing vessels were engaged in fishing off Miminigash on Saturday and on Sunday.

The Government of the United States have taken care to warn these Sabbath desecrators and thieves that if they violate the provisions of the Treaty of 1818, or the laws of Canada, they will do so at their peril.

But what shall we say of the Canadian Government? Either they have not made sufficient provision for the protection of the fisheries, or the cruisers they have provided are not doing their duty.

It is pleasing to note that several British man-of-war are coming over. They, at least, will not shirk or fear to do their duty.

Flour.

The City Council.

The regular monthly meeting of the City Council was held last evening. All the Councillors except Councillor Haszard were present.

A letter from Messrs. Peters & Peters stating that they would make application for an injunction against the working of the stone crusher if some action were not taken by the Council in the matter of its removal.

Councillor A. A. McLean moved that the petition of Messrs. Stirling & Harris, asking that they be allowed to open a drain from the new Post Office to the shore at the foot of either Richmond or Great George Streets be granted provided the drain be opened in such a manner as not to cause a nuisance, and that it be maintained and repaired by the Dominion Government.

Councillor Morris gave notice of reconsideration at next meeting. Councillor Crabbe moved that the sum of \$100 be granted Mr. Arthur Newbery to assist in defraying the cost of the improvements on Queen Square.

A motion was unanimously passed ordering that the City Collector be instructed to collect all outstanding taxes without delay.

Canadian Fruit.

C. R. H. Starr writes from the Canadian Section, Colonial and Indian Exhibition, London, S. W.:

"The Canadian fruit, preserved in about 1,000 glass jars, continues to be one of the chief attractions of the Exhibition, notwithstanding many of the specimens have lost their natural colors.

"This Exhibition cannot fail to be of great benefit to Canadian fruit growers, as well as all other classes, and no efforts should be spared to supplement this collection with fresh fruits at the earliest possible date.

"All reports agree that the apple crop this season, in Great Britain and on the Continent, will be under the average, excepting in Spain and Hungary, where large crops are reported.

"Efforts are being made to extend the markets for Canadian apples directly to all the principal cities of Great Britain and on the Continent where it seems practicable.

"I hope to be able to report very shortly upon the prospect of success in this direction, as well as in the matter of cold chambers for fruit shipments in Canadian steamers."

The Russian Empire contains 884 penitentiary establishments.

Ned Buntline, the author, left an estate valued at \$20,000 and two wives.

A party of French artists and scientists are expected to visit Canada next summer.

Henry Ward Beecher is said to be the hero of a novel which a member of his congregation is writing.

Justin McCarthy believes the Home Rule question will be brought up at the present session of Parliament.

A number of the claimants to the \$15,000,000 Harlem Flats property reside in and around Belleville, Ont.

The German Socialist deputies found guilty of being members of a secret society have been sentenced to terms of nine and six months' imprisonment.

A woman was brought before the Recorder of Montreal the other day on a charge of playing the piano at two o'clock in the morning. There is some piano playing which is criminal at any hour.

Mr. Ralph Keddy, of Usborne, Ont., has a three months' old calf that weighs 350 lbs. For the last seven weeks it has gained something over three pounds a day.

Forest fires in Manathorn and Clark counties, Ill., have burned the town of Spencer and scorched Colby, while Chipewa Falls was threatened. Spencer is a town of 1,000 population. Loss is \$200,000.

The thirteen year old son of Rev. Wm. Aitken, Newcastle, N. B., accidentally shot himself last Friday morning. The ball lodged in the lower part of the abdomen. Hopes are entertained of his recovery.

Jas. F. Wolf, special Dominion agent of the Customs Department, has taken an action for libel for \$10,000 damages against the Montreal Witness for recent articles published concerning his connection with the \$4,000.

The Earl of Drumhvan has entered actively upon the duties of the Colonial Department. He takes especial interest in Canadian affairs. His advice has already been asked for in regard to the Canadian side of the fisheries question.

Paris contains 42,646 persons who call themselves artists, including painters, sculptors, designers, engravers, woodcutters, painters on porcelain, actors, singers, musicians, and public performers of all sorts. A little over 20,000 of this number are women.

The inquiry into the cause of the largely increased death rate in Ottawa during the month of July, reveals the fact that out of one hundred and forty-four deaths, one hundred and thirteen were children, the greater part of whom died of cholera infantum, which for some unaccountable reason, has prevailed to an alarming extent.

The wheat crop of Europe is slightly under an average one. In France it falls 12 per cent. below last year. In Russia spring wheat is a poor yield, but winter wheat is excellent everywhere. Oats and potatoes are big crops. The brewers are watching the hop news from America with great interest.

The Gloucester schooner Martha C., Capt. Cunningham, was at Cape Island lately on her way home from the Bay with a full fare of mackerel. One of the crew said he knew it to be a fact that most of the seiners paid no attention to the three mile line, and had not been invited to do so.

Last Friday night a hackman near Chestnut Hill reservoir, Boston, discovered an overturned tricycle and the prostrate forms of a man and a woman. The man was dead and the woman insensible. They were identified as Rufus H. Stickney and his wife, both guests at the Park Hotel.

A destructive fire broke out in the planing Mill of Simmons & Poole, Newcastle, Ont. The flames soon communicated to Simmons' dwelling and another owned by him and occupied by J. Stern; also destroying immense piles of lumber and two large store-houses containing a quantity of lumber.
