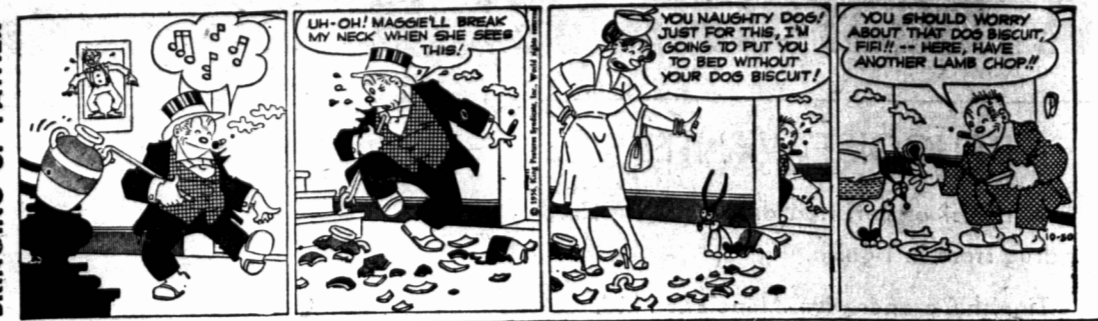

Whether a hand constitutes an opening bid is usually measured in terms of point count or honor tricks, but another important factor is the trick-taking value of a hand.
South's opening bid is completely proper (even though he has only 11 high card points) for two reasons. The probable number of winning tricks, with hearts as trump, is about six, which is more than most hands of greater point count promise. Also, there is available a convenient method of identifying the relatively weak opening bid—rebidding hearts each time in minimum quantity, if responder keeps on making forcing bids.
In the present case, South's jump of three spades warns part-

Pro-Egyptians Control Jordan's Army Now

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Pro-Egyptian elements were reported Friday to have taken complete control of Jordan's army. The last top ranking pro-Iraq officer, Division Commander General Ali Hayari, has been given two months leave and is expected to return to active duty, authoritative Jordanian sources in Cairo said.
The departure of Hayari is reported to have left the pro-Egyptian element headed by Ali Abu Nuwar, chief of staff, in unchallenged control of Jordan's armed forces and, indirectly, the nation.
King Husain or his civilian government tried to adopt a policy favorable to pro-Western Iraq, they would be opposed by the army.

U. S. Candidate Spends Tough Day Following Busy Farmer

NASHVILLE, TENN. (AP)—George Spence, a city dweller who thought he spoke the farmers' language, took a good rest after a long day down on the farm doing the chores.
The 31-year-old Republican candidate for Congress here was a bone-weary and tired from milking cows, spreading manure and doing other jobs that make up a typical farm routine.
Spence, who had claimed that American farmers lack "get-up-and-git," conceded that he learned a plenty after following the footsteps Friday of farmer Herbert E. Bernal, 50.
The pair worked from before sunrise to after sunset on a rainy day, mixing the chores with their views on politics, particularly farm policies. After it was over, each appeared as set in his views as before.
Spence's invitation to visit the Bernal farm came after he told reporters that "if a man is to make a living on the farm, he has to get off his butt and go to work." The White House quickly said that this did not reflect President Eisenhower's views.
ISSUES CHALLENGE
Bernal, adjured by Spence's views, challenged the manufacturer's representative to "come out and spend a day, any day, with me and if you can follow in my footsteps, I won't only vote for you but I'll also write a letter of apology."
Unannounced, Spence knocked on Bernal's door at 5:02 a.m. Friday. During the rainy day they milked cows, gathered eggs, slopped hogs, fed the chickens and seven-day-a-week chores as if they confined their work to odd jobs about the 327-acre farm. Reporters and photographers were unable to maintain the pace.
The talk was on farm politics. Said Spence: "Most farmers are farmers by free choice. If they can't make a go of it, I wouldn't see anything particularly wrong in their leaving the farm, would you?"
Bernal did not agree. "Look at the guy at the steel mill who says he's not making enough money," he replied. "Why doesn't he go back to the farm? No, sir, he strikes and gets his income up. He's not told to leave the business."
Spence said he thought the president's farm program sound but Bernal said he didn't "think it fair to starve one segment of the population out in what the government calls good times."
In bidding goodbye, Spence said: "I wouldn't have missed this for anything. My statement would definitely do not apply to Mr. Bernal."
Bernal may send Spence a letter of apology as he promised, but he definitely won't vote for him. The Bernal farm is located just outside Spence's district.

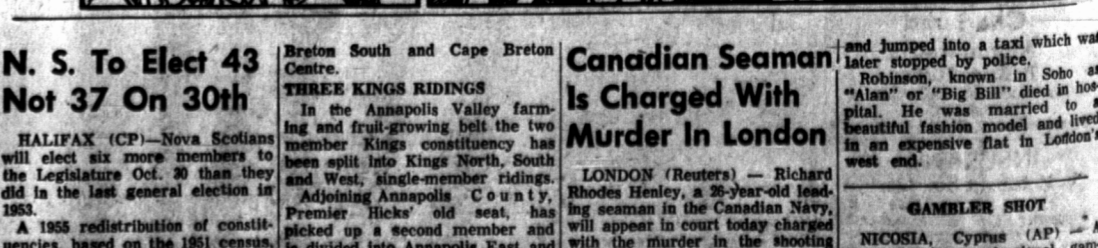

N. S. To Elect 43 Not 37 On 30th

HALIFAX (CP)—Nova Scotians will elect six more members to the Legislature Oct. 30 than they did in the last general election in 1953.
A 1955 redistribution of constituencies, based on the 1951 census, has boosted the number of assembly seats to 43 from 37.
Three new seats are in the fast-growing Halifax and Sydney suburban areas. Two are in the Annapolis Valley and one in the Lunenburg area.
The mushrooming town of Dartmouth and its environs on the east side of Halifax harbor comprise the new riding of Halifax County-Dartmouth carved out of Halifax East constituency, formerly the largest in the province.
A new Halifax northwest riding takes in Bedford, Sackville, Westley and other growing suburbs formerly included in Halifax West.
The Sydney industrial area gets a new member from Cape Breton Nova, created from parts of Cape Breton South and Cape Breton Centre.
THREE KINGS RIDINGS
In the Annapolis Valley farming and fruit-growing belt the two member Kings constituency has been split into Kings North, South and West, single-member ridings.
Adjoining Annapolis County, Premier Hicks' old seat, has picked up a second member and is divided into Annapolis East and West.
On the South Shore West of the Halifax former two member constituency of Lunenburg now returns three members—one each from Lunenburg East, Centre and West.
As a result of these changes Halifax County will have a seven-member representation in the house, Industrial Cape Breton County six.
Kings and Lunenburg join Cumberland and Pictou Counties in electing three members. Colchester, Inverness, Annapolis, Hants, Digby and Yarmouth counties have two representatives, either as two-member ridings or single separate constituencies.
To remaining six of Nova Scotia's 18 counties return one member each.

Canadian Seaman Is Charged With Murder in London

LONDON (Reuters)—Richard Rhodes Henley, a 26-year-old leading seaman in the Canadian Navy, will appear in court today charged with the murder in the shooting of a Soho book seller.
Henley is attached to the destroyer Iroquois, now berthed at Southampton.
An officer aboard the Iroquois said Sunday night the only address he knew for Henley was Halifax, where his wife is living. The officer said he did not have any home town identification because Henley's papers were not available.
Henley was charged Saturday night with the murder of 36-year-old John Alan Robinson, a well-known figure in Soho, London's cosmopolitan quarter.
Lunchtime crowds in Soho, London's cosmopolitan quarter, chased a man brandishing a gun through narrow streets after Robinson was found dying of gunshot wounds in the shop where he worked. The man eluded them and jumped into a taxi which was later stopped by police.
Robinson, known in Soho as "Alan" or "Big Bill," died in hospital. He was married to a beautiful fashion model and lived in an expensive flat in London's west end.
GAMBLER SHOT
NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—A Greek-Cypriot professional gambler, believed to have been regarded by the EOKA underground as an informer, was shot dead in the main street of Nicosia Saturday. The slain man was Panagiotis Tsoukadoros, 48. EOKA is the fighting arm of the movement demanding union of the British island colony with Greece.
VITAL IMPORT
