### OTTAWA NOTES.

(From the St. John Sun and other papers.)

#### DOMINION RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

The Council of the Dominion Rifle Association met to prepare for the annual meeting of the Association. The chief questions to be discussed are the following: regarding the change of the place for holding the annual matches; an addition to the number of the Executive Committee, and a question regarding the disqualification of the whole Ontario contingent of the Wimbledon team, owing to some irregularity in their practice, which took place in Toronto instead of Oshawa.

#### THE TORONTO POSTMASTERSHIP.

The reply given by the Postmaster General to the question relating to the salary of the Toronto Postmaster was a disappointing one to the Opposition. It had been announced in some of the leading organs that the salary of the new Postmaster would be \$4,000, an excess of \$500 over that of Mr. Leslie. The statement was made in ignorance, as was shown when Mr. Langevin announced that Mr. Patterson's salary would be \$3,000 per annum, or \$500 less than Mr. Leslie had received.

#### RETURNS OF EXPORTS AND IMPORTS.

The returns of exports and imports for the six months ending Jan. 1st, 1879, brought down for the guidance of Mr. Cartwright, show results as follows: Goods the produce of Canada, \$37,397,776. Total, including coin and bullion, and goods not the produce of Canada, \$46,379,116. Imports, total \$46,242,29; duty \$6,317,017. The returns, showing receipts and expenditures for the seven months ending 1st February, show as follows: Receipts, total consolidated fund, \$12,416,608.91. Expenditure, total consolidated fund, \$13,750,206.04. Deficit, \$1,303,589.13. The returns for the first twenty days of February, showing receipts generally for that period, result as follows: Customs, \$1,518,201.57. Excise, \$840,796.86. Other receipts on consolidated fund, making a total of \$2,659,053.61, and on loan accounts receipts brought up in addition to, and including above, makes a total of \$8,582,253.80.

#### VICE-REGAL VISIT.

It is generally understood that His Excellency and the Princess Louise will visit the Maritime Provinces during the coming summer. Reference was made to the subject in the Speech of the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick on Thursday last, and the Governor General in his recent interview with Maritime members has given assurance to the same effect. It is thought by the well-informed here that Her Royal Highness is disposed to spend a considerable portion of the coming summer in Halifax, where there are many interesting associations in connexion with the residence of the Duke of Kent in this country. There is no doubt that during the Vice-Regal tour, His Excellency and the Princess will visit all the leading places in the Maritime Provinces.

#### SENATOR HOWLAN.

Senator Howlan, of P. E. Island, is suffering very severely with his eyes, and it is stated that there are strong probabilities of him losing his eyesight altogether.

#### DEFICITS.

Our despatches from Ottawa this morning, announce that the returns brought down in response to Mr. Cartwright's request, show a deficit for the first seven months of the current fiscal year of \$1,303,589! This will make Mr. Cartwright's deficits to date as follows:—  
1875-6 ..... \$1,900,800  
1876-7 ..... 1,460,000  
1877-8 ..... 1,125,146  
7 months ending Jan. 31, 1879 ..... 1,303,589  
Total ..... \$5,792,535

#### A CANARD.

The Ottawa Free Press, which has been an organ of the Letellier party, says, this evening, that a meeting of Liberals was held in Montreal on Friday evening, attended by the most influential men of the Party, at which it was decided to depute Senator Thibaudan and Hon. Mr. Laurier to visit Quebec to induce Governor Letellier to anticipate the adverse vote of the Commons by resigning. The Free Press is earning an unenviable notoriety for inaccuracy of statement, and there is good reason for believing that there is not a word of truth in this reference to the Letellier matter.

#### THE LOBSTER TRADE.

A large deputation of Maritime Province members waited on the Hon. Mr. Pope, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, to-day, to urge the importance of measures for protecting the lobster trade. It was reported that, owing to the present system of "close time," large quantities of young lobsters were killed annually, thereby adding much to the danger of this fishery being completely exhausted. The Minister said he fully recognized the importance of the interest and promised to give the matter his immediate attention.

#### THE MOUNTED POLICE.

The bill introduced by Sir John McDonald contains some provisions of importance. The bill is to amend and consolidate, as amended, the several Acts and parts of Acts relating to the North-West Mounted Police. The Act provides for a free grant, not exceeding 160 acres, to all members of the force who shall have served five years continuously, and shall be certified by the Commissioner of Police. It also provides for the internal government and discipline of the force. The Superannuation Act is to be applied to the Commissioners of Police under this Act. The Act is also made to apply to the district of Keewatin, and the force shall be under the control of the Administration of that district.

#### EVERLASTING TALKER.

The Mail, commenting on the payment of \$343, to defray the travelling expenses of "Hon. David Mills and Secretary," to Manitoba, tells the following very good story in reference to the Philosopher:—  
"The country will not grumble at this, for it was on that visit, so runs the legend, that

the philosopher received a lesson in the art of public speaking, by which it is to be hoped he has profited. He was addressing an Indian band, through an interpreter, on general topics, and spoke from noon until 3.30 p. m. Then at 3.35 p. m., Paheskayhayhun, the Everlasting Talker, took the prairie to reply. At first he spoke slowly and deliberately. About 6 p. m. he warmed a little to his subject. At 8 p. m. it had become painfully interesting to Mr. Mills. At 9 p. m. the moon rose, and Mr. Mills sat down wearily. The braves round were in the Everlasting Talker's secret, but there was not a smile in the crowd. At 10.49 p. m. the secretary retired; and at high midnight Mr. Mills successively pleaded another engagement. *Non est vero e ben trevato.*

#### THE TORONTO POSTMASTERSHIP.

Mr. Hay's motion for a return respecting the superannuation of Leslie, late Postmaster at Toronto, led to a short and rather acrimonious debate in to-day's session of the House. Ever since the superannuation was made, the Grit Party and press have indulged in all sorts of wild accusations against the Government. In the first place, it was alleged that the salary had been increased, and the falsehood was persisted in until the Postmaster General effectually disposed of it by announcing to the House that there had been a saving of \$500 a year effected. Then, again, it was assumed that Leslie had been forced to resign, and with this idea the leading spirits on the Opposition were fully primed for a discussion on Tory immorality generally, as exemplified in this particular case. Mr. Huntington fairly boiled over with indignation at the iniquitous transaction, but he cooled down when taken in hand by the Minister of Public Works. He was not content when Hon. Mr. Langevin explained that Leslie had been superannuated at his own desire. When Hon. Dr. Tupper drew the attention of the House to some superannuations made by the late Postmaster General, and pointed out the gross injustice which was done, and asked that a committee should be appointed to investigate all superannuations, the hon. member for Sheffield, had good reason to fear that he would be hoist with his own petard. Quite a number of cases were specially referred to, showing the absurdity of Grit carping on the subject of appointments. Among these were the cases of the Wardens of the St. John and Halifax Penitentiaries, who had been thrust out of their positions in order to make room for Grit partisans. Mr. Robertson, of Hamilton, also presented the facts in regard to the superannuation of Eager, a former official in the Hamilton Post Office, who had received a retiring allowance of \$700, and immediately engaged as agent of an insurance company at \$1,000 a year. As Sir John Jolif has stated his intention of moving for a committee of investigation, the public will soon have an opportunity of deciding between the two parties on this subject of policy.

The Russian agents on the borders of Afghanistan seem to be trying to persuade the Ameer that his cause is not hopeless, and that he should resist to the last. They are at the same time seeking to make Europe and America believe that the Afghans are enthusiastic in support of the Ameer, and that they are resolved on maintaining him on the throne. Russia may be counted on to do all she can to frustrate the designs of England without actually going to war. Unfortunately for the Afghans, the moral support of Russia will not be of the slightest use to them; it is material aid they require and that they will not get from Russia.—*St. John Telegraph.*

The 72nd anniversary of the birthday of Henry W. Longfellow was observed at Boston yesterday by the presentation on the part of the children of Cambridge of a handsome chair carved from the horse-chestnut tree celebrated in "The Village Blacksmith."

The St. John "Globe" states that in twenty-four States of the American Union, the Parliaments only met biennially, and asks, "cannot the Provinces learn from the experience of their neighbors." The suggestion is certainly worthy of consideration.

ALDERMAN RIVARDS has been elected Mayor of Montreal by a majority of 270 votes over Mr. Beaudry.
