Dr. Barrass Back From Baptist Mission Board

Dr. E. J. Barrass, Minister of The Tryon Baptist Church, has returned from Toronto, Ont., where he was attending the annual executive meetings of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board. Eight sessions were held and members of the Executive were in attendance from all three United Baptist Conventions.

Most encouraging reports, he says, were received from the Mission fields of India, Bolivia, and Angola; extension work in all these spheres of Baptist missionary work being carried out at a most satisfactory pace.

Comparison of this year's receipts with the same period last year revealed a very commendable increase in the total contributions for Foreign Missionary work. This increased sense of the Christian stewardship of possessions is in line with the fact that last year Canadian Baptists sent out more new missionaries to other lands than in any one year in their history.

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Thoughts For Our Time

CHRISTIANITY IS BULWARK OF INDIVIDUAL FREEDOM

Now and then we are told that the men and women of our age are now discovering the tremendous importance of the individual person. No one will deny, for instance, that people nowadays are experiencing the demands of the personality. It takes the form of a desire to live, to express their inner feelings and to overcome the influences which hold them in self-destroying ruts and grooves. The aim of modern artists, authors, playwrights, even musicians, appears to be that of assisting and guiding the popular reaction against conventionalism and of fostering admiration for an exaggerated individualism among the young people in particular.

Despite all such efforts, the fact remains that the individual man counts for very little in these times. He is not recognized any longer as valuable in himself, but rather more and more in terms of his relationship to the nation, the state, the union, the industry or what-have-you?

In our world the great masses of humanity seem to be ranged against each other, the one side with its intense disregard for individual rights as part of its creed, the other, in opposition, submerging the individual and the personal, while attempting to defend them.

MAN RESPONSIBLE
In the face of these trends in the modern world, the Christian religion remains the stronghold of the individual against his attackers. It is there that we find an insistence upon the truth that a man is responsible for his own moral and spiritual actions.

Here is the essence of spiritual individuality. No one can take the human will by storm; no one can will for another; no one can make a decision for another when moral responsibility is involved. A man sins alone, and alone he takes the initial steps back to repentance.

Christ insisted always that a man's soul was more valuable than anything else in this world. The Divine pre-occupation with the soul of the individual man is the most striking feature of the Christian revelation.

Our Lord's ministry was confined to Palestine and His own people, the Jews. Throughout His hidden and public life He was in constant contact with individuals. He chose His Apostles one by one. He cured this one and then another. He went out of His way to convert the Samaritan woman at the well of Sichar and to raise Lazarus from the tomb. The essence of His great Commandment is contained in the words: "Whatever you do to the least of My brethren, you do to Me."

INDIVIDUAL DIGNITY
When Christ was born it was citizenship, not human personality, that was stressed. The human individual had been politicized, citizenized and institutionalized out of existence.

Into this situation came the teachings of Christ the Redeemer. The supreme worth and dignity of each man, woman and child was affirmed once and for all by the Christian doctrine of man's Redemption. The Christian believes in man as well as in God. He has such faith in redeemed humanity that he regards it as potentially divine. This is, indeed, the specific feature of the religion of Christ; this is its basic doctrine.

From the beginning, the Christian claim for human worth conflicted with the totalitarian claims of the State. The sharpest challenge to Roman despotism came from the lips of St. Peter: "We ought to obey God rather than man"; words which proclaim the sovereignty of the person and

his right to disobey a law which is in conflict with the claims of his conscience.

Words by themselves, however, are always insufficient; actions must follow. So it was that the Christian martyrs translated into deeds the dictum of Peter. They are always the greatest personalities, the truest individuals.

REDEEMED SOUL
Throughout the pages of Western history we see the development of the Christian doctrine of human dignity based upon the uniqueness and value of the redeemed human soul and personality.

Where modern governments and modern influences have departed from Christian teaching, there has been presented to us a picture of flagrant wrongs and crimes committed against the rights of private men. What is the significance of modern weapons of war, for example, if not to point out the low value placed upon a man's life? A world which has lost its respect for God, and in logical consequence, its respect for man, sees its people as just so much grist for the industrial, military and political mills.

The righting of the wholesale wrong to the human individual by modern society, the emancipation of the person from the social, political and economic ideologies which are enslaving it, is one of the great tasks that confronts Christendom now and in the years ahead.

If the challenge is to be accepted and the fight won for the rights of the individual man, it must begin on the personal, man-to-man level. Justice between individuals will bring justice among nations. Fraternal charity among men of this nation will, in God's good time, overflow into the hearts of all men.
